Also five brothers: Arthur, Raymond and Fred in Summerside; Raymond in Halifax and Russell in Hamilton, Ont. Two brothers predeceased her, Sydney in World War One and Gordon in Merrimack, Mass. Last April.

The funeral will be this afternoon at two o'clock from the Bonness Funeral Home to the People's Cemetery.—S.

Official Opening Of New Tignish Library

The new library at Tignish was officially opened yesterday afternoon by Dr. L. W. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Education. After the meeting in the Legion Hall the group proceeded to the library where, on the steps, the key of the building was passed to Dr. Shaw by the chairman of the library committee, Mr. Claude Kinch.

Dr. Shaw unlocked and opened the door and then installed Miss Margaret Conroy as librarian. The building was then inspected by the public. It is a single storey cottage type building which was built by the community and just completed. Its dimensions are 22 by 18 feet and it has grey stone siding with a red roof. Inside the color scheme is cream and green.

The meeting in the Legion Hall prior to the official opening was attended by a large number of people including the sisters of Tignish Convent, teachers of the schools of surrounding districts and pupils of grades 8 to 11 of the convent.

Speakers were: Dr. Shaw, Mr. Bramwell Chandler, director of P. E. I. Libraries; Mr. George Fraser, provincial director of public relations, Rev. Louis Dooley, Mr. J. A. Bernard, Mr. J. B. Morrissey and Mr. C. F. Morrissey.

Dr. Shaw commended the people of Tignish for erecting such a fine building which, he said, according to population, is one of the best in Canada. He gave a demonstration on the proper care of books which was very helpful to those present.

Mr. Chandler also commended the people of the district and in particular the library committee. Mr. Bernard said that he was the first library chairman in the district and he spoke of the benefits that the library had brought to the district.

Father Dooley said that a library brings good literature into a district and said that parents must accept responsibility for the kind of literature that their children read and not leave it entirely to the librarian who is very busy. He praised the librarian, Miss Conroy, for her efficient work.—S.

Meeting Decides On Co-op Store For Summerside

At a very enthusiastic mass meeting held last night in the Summerside High School auditorium, it was unanimously resolved that a cooperative store be opened in Summerside and the organization meeting be held on Wednesday, December 27th in the school auditorium at 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon.

The meeting was presided over by Mr. Allison Profit of Kensington and was addressed by various members of the cooperative movement in Prince Edward Island and by Rev. J. D. N. MacDonald of Dartmouth, N. S.

The resolution adopted at last night's meeting means that the option held on the hardware department of Messrs Smallmans Limited will be taken, provided that sufficient share capital can be raised by January 15th at which date the option expires.

It was the consensus of opinion last evening that the amount necessary \$15,000 — could be raised. This opinion was based on the report of a survey made in the surrounding districts during the past few days the response to which, according to Mr. J. G. Dennis, the secretary of the Cooperative Union were far beyond his expectations.

The principal speaker last evening was Rev. Mr. MacDonald, who was present on invitation of the Cooperative Union, and he chose as his subject "We are building today the world of tomorrow." He pointed out that "we can have the kind of a world we want in the future, whether it be a good one or a bad one."

Referring to the present day evil, Communism, he traced the conditions in Russia which laid its foundations and in order that this may not happen here the freedom of a free people must be safeguarded. "You can," he said, "open a cooperative store here which will be just as cold and heartless as any chain store. You've got to make it serviceable to the people for after all it is the people who count."

Other speakers were Mr. E. M. Gorman, Director Extension Dept. of St. Dunstan's University, Mr. J. G. Dennis, secretary of the Cooperative Union and Mr. C. M. MacLean, the manager of the Charlottetown Cooperative Store. — S.

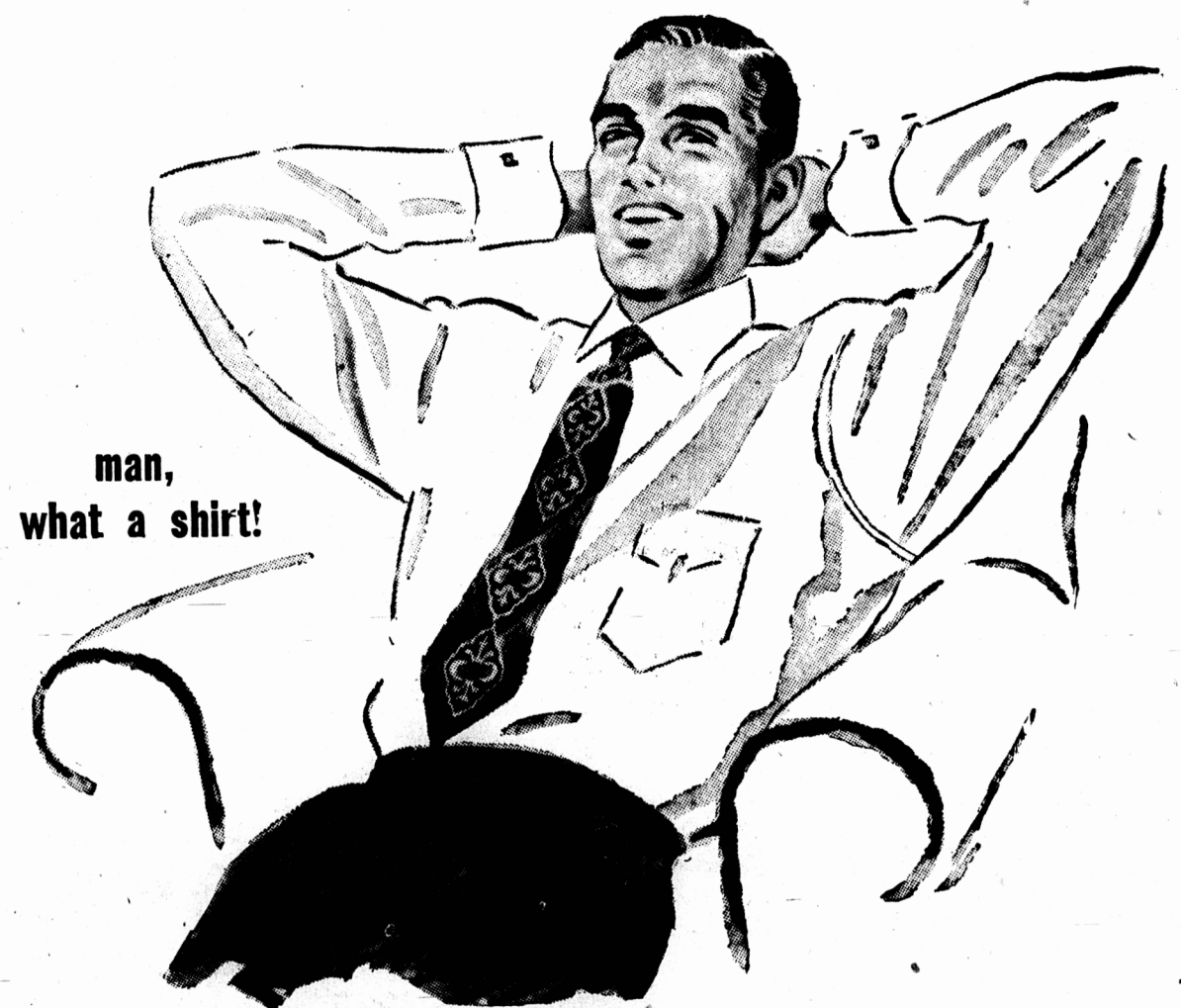
