NOT FOR KLONDYKE.—We clip the following from a Colorado paper: C. W. Caryl, the father of Wall Street camp, in this county, together with his attorney, John T. Bottom, both of Denver, and George H Toombs, of Prince Edward Island, came up from the capital to-day, and, with W. C. Ames of Denver and H. S. Badger, manager of affairs at that camp, immediately left for Wall Street. Another good strike has been made in the Gladys mine in that camp, and also a very fine one in the Ends of Orange. Mr. Caryl is to concentrate his working force, and, instead of having a few men at work on many mines—he owns about a hundred—he will devote his energies and his money to developing a few mines with a large number of men. By this means he expects to show that Wall Street is one of the best neighborhoods in the state for good mines.

The Montreal Gazette makes a good point when it remarks that "a fortnight ago the Yukon railway arrangement was deemed so important by the Government that the debate on the address in reply to the Governor-General's speech was interrupted to give opportunity to introduce the bill. After the address talk was finished the bill was made the one item of Government business to be dealt with, and ordered to be brought up day after day till it was approved of or rejected. Mr. Hardy's fix must be deemed a bad one when the Federal Government abandons for a whole week that which it has been holding of so much importance, for no other reason than that its members and supporters may have a better opportunity to take part in a provincial election contest.

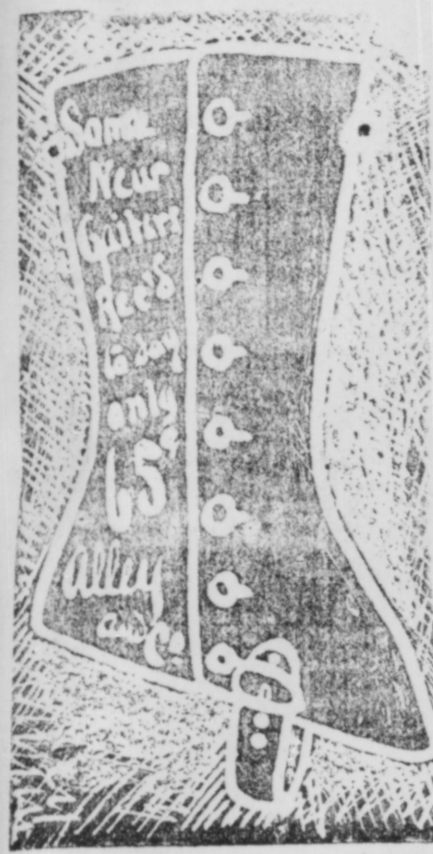
