Local and Other Items

KIDNAPPED IN MONTREAL.—The days of romance seem to be reviving. At Montreal for instance, three masked men appeared one evening lately at the residence of Mr. Willam Horne, in the Mild End. "We are detectives," said they, as they forcibly seized Mr Horne, and carried him away. Since then Mr Horne has not been seen, and his friends have no clue as to mystery, nor knowledge of any reason to account for the strange visitation. The police are investigating.

T'WAS A PLEASANT TRIP.—The Christmas number of the Amherst Gazette has an interesting article from the pen of Mr. F. W. Donkin, barrister, descriptive of a shooting trip of four weeks made by him to Hogg Island, several miles from Summerside, last winter. Mr. Donkin brings the article to a close by saying that never during the twenty years he has been shooting has he met a more manly lot of sportsmen than it was his pleasure to meet on Prince Edward Island.

WAR PREPARATIONS.—Once more the correspondents detect war preparations at Woolwich, Davenport, Portsmouth and Chatham. There is a renewal of the activity which prevailed during the excitement of the Fashoda incident, but this time the public are left guessing as to the quarter of the globe in which the expected outbreak may occur. This much seems certain, however, that more war materials are being sent out by the Government to foreign stations than was ever known before.

SIGNS OF THE TIMES.—The Washington correspondent of the New York Tribune discovers that the United States government is sending a third-class cruiser to Guam, a collier to Samoa and a distilling ship to Manila. He accordingly announces with a brass band that the United States has arisen in might to "maintain absolutely the political geography of the vast Pacific." If the president were reaching for the tail of a rat that correspondent would think the United States had captured a herd of elephants.—Ottawa Journal.

THE HANGING OF WOMEN.—the usual attempt to save Cordelia Vian Porrier from the gallows because of her sex, will be made by the Department of Justice at Ottawa shortly. She had been convicted of murdering her husband at St Canute, Que., with the aid of her lover, Sam Parslow. She is the twelfth woman condemned to death for murder since Confederation, but if she suffers the penalty for her crime she will be the third woman hanged. The sentences of the other nine were commuted.

AERONAUTICAL JOURNALISM.—Journalistic enterprise has demonstrated that Andree would be able to steer his balloon. The London Daily Chronicle detailed one of its staff and a famous aeronaut to attempt the passage of the English Channel in a dirigible balloon of the same pattern as that used by Andree. The passage was made successfully yesterday. The steering apparatus consists of a sail 12 feet square, weighing 10 pounds, and a trail rope 500 feet long, with a hundred pound weight at the end. When steering becomes necessary the balloon descends until the rope trails on the ground, and the sail is brought round to catch the wind. In this manner a course four or five points from the direction of the wind can be sailed.

A GREAT INVENTION.—An Austrian engineer, by name M Demeter Ovetkovic, will rank as one of the benefactors of his race, if an invention by him proves to be what he claims for it. He claims to have solved the problem of preventing collisions at sea. His appliance consists of what he calls a marine brake, by which a steamship travelling at a high rate of speed is to be instantly stopped. Experiments have been made which are said to have been successful. One test was made, with the steam-ship Clothilde, of 2,000 tons and the vessel, it is reported, when running 12 knots an hour, was brought to a standstill within 30 seconds, and before she had travelled 40 feet, the engines still working ahead with full power. It sounds too good to be true.

LAND HUNGER.

United States Seize an Island in the South Sea.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 24.—The Government has determined to hoist the United States flag over another island far cut in the Pacific ocean, and orders were sent out late this afternoon to the commander of the Bennington, Captain Tausig, to proceed at once to take possession in the name of the Government of the United States, of Wake Island, lying in latitude 19 north, longitude 168 east. It is distant about 2,000 miles from Honolulu, the westernmost of the Hawaiian Islands, and 1,300 miles east from Guam. It is almost in a direct line between these possessions of the United States, and is admirably adapted for use as a station for a Pacific cable, to connect the Philippines with Hawaii, and the United States. It is about three miles in length, and encloses a lagoon of salt water. The average height of the island is eight feet above high tide. It is scarcely capable in itself of sustaining life, but it is expected that a cable station can be maintained without difficulty by the erection of a condenser to supply fresh water.
