SCOTT ACT IN SUMMERSIDE. How it Was Enforced During the County Exhibition. On Thursday morning three ordinary drunks were brought before Stipendiary Magistrate McQuarrie, and one young lad from Alberton was charged with drunkenness and disorderly conduct and with carrying a concealed weapon (a heavy laden slug) with which he had been fit to arm himself in the hope of being able to inflict serious injury upon any one, police officer or citizen, who might venture to interfere with his own particular way of taking in the Prince County Exhibition. Justice was, however, appeased, and law satisfied, by the infliction of fines ranging from \$2 to \$10. But if all those who were drunk here on Exhibition day and evening had been taken care of by the police some special arrangements would have to have been made for their accommodation. This town is getting too much like Charlottetown, and a number of dives are springing up which ought to be suppressed before the nuisance becomes any greater. On a day like Exhibition day some hundreds of young men come into town with the best and most peaceable intentions possible, but they obtain in these dives a species of deadly poison which is unlawfully and fraudulently sold to them as "beer," "Scotch whiskey" or rum. Their good intentions are at once thrown to the winds and they, instead of being able to take in the Exhibition, make most revolting exhibitions of themselves, and offend the good taste and mar the enjoyment of sober, respectable people. If they were even sold decent liquor the results would not be so revolting, but the vile decoctions which they are able to obtain here would turn a priest into a fiend, or make a Job resent his sufferings. One local drunk which did not call for the interference of the police or offend the dignity of the law, has, however resulted in matrimonial infelicity. A resident of Summerside on Thursday returned home after being out all night and promptly ordered breakfast, but his wife having it unprepared and possibly not expecting him home so early unfortunately hazarded some trivial remark, for which the fiend of the poison which was in the man, and which had been fraudulently sold to him as whiskey, prompted him to knock her down. And up to the time of going to press that perfect harmony which alone can make the bonds of holy matrimony easy to sustain has not been re-established but when it is this one man at least should realize his folly and be able to judge the full measure of injury which was inflicted upon him.—Pioneer.

DRUNKENNESS IN CHARLOTTETOWN. "Fair Play," writes as follows in the Pictou Advocate under date of New Glasgow, Oct. 1st: "I note the remark in your paper made by a commercial traveller in reference to drunkenness in Charlottetown. On the opening day of the exhibition, in which he gives it as his opinion 'that never in all the towns he has visited during the past ten years has he seen such an exhibition of drunkenness.'" "The writer arrived in Charlottetown on Monday previous to the opening day, and had as good, or perhaps better opportunities of noting the amount of drunkenness, and my surprise was that there was so little, as I only saw about half a dozen during my three or four days stay. I drew the attention of a leading temperance man who accompanied me to the fact that exceedingly few people were intoxicated, and he agreed with me that it was remarkable. Your commercial traveller is further mistaken in supposing the Scott Act was not in force at the time, as it was not repealed until Saturday following; yet there were a large number of places where liquor was openly for sale. No man who wishes to state facts would make any such assertion as the one man in 'good faith' by your traveller." Commenting upon the letter the editor of the Advocate says: "We readily give place to the letter of Fair Play. The paragraph in question was taken, we think, from a Summerside exchange, but we inadvertently neglected to credit it. The testimony of Fair Play must be taken in the matter as he is a man of undeniable reputation."

THE VICE-REGAL VISIT. Addresses From City and Provincial Governments. ANOTHER FROM CALEDONIAN CLUB. Meeting in Opera House—Lady Aberdeen Speaks—Other Notes.

The exceptionally fine weather today added very materially to the success of the reception given to the Governor General and Lady Aberdeen, on this the second occasion of their visiting Charlottetown. Flags were flying all over the city in the brilliant sunshine, and together with the uniforms of the volunteers on the streets produced quite a holiday impression. This impression was heightened by the large crowd which assembled on Pownall Wharf to witness the landing of the Vice-Regal party. On the wharf was drawn up the Guard of Honor composed of a detachment from the 82nd Battalion under command of Capt. D. Stewart a detachment from the Charlottetown Engineers under command of Lieut. Geo. Moore; and a detachment from the 4th Regiment Canadian Artillery under command of Lieutenant C. Richards. At 1.30 o'clock the Dominion Cruiser Acadia under command of Commander Spain, with the Governor General and party on board, arrived in the harbor and anchored off Pownall wharf. As the Governor General stepped ashore he was received by the Guard of Honor at the "present arm" while the band played the National Anthem. Simultaneously a salute was fired from Fort Edward by No. 1 Company of Artillery under command of Lieut. A. A. Bartlett. The City Councillors and the Recorder, who were a member on the wharf to welcome the distinguished visitors, then presented Lord Aberdeen with the following address which was read by H. M. Davison, Esq., City Clerk. (His Worship Mayor Dawson was unavoidably absent through severe illness.) His Excellency the Right Honorable Sir John Campbell Hamilton Gordon, Earl of Aberdeen, Viscount Formartine, Lord Haddo, Methlic, Terves and Kellie, in the Peerage of Scotland, Viscount Gordon of Aberdeen, County of Aberdeen, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom, Baron of Nova Scotia, &c., &c., Governor-General of Canada: It is with much pleasure that we, the Mayor and City Council, on this your second visit to the city, embrace the opportunity in the name of its citizens to give you a most hearty welcome. As loyal subjects of the Empire we are proud to recognize in you the representative of our beloved Queen, whose Diamond Jubilee a few months ago, was celebrated with loyal pride and thanksgiving through out the vast Empire over which she has reigned so long and so beneficently; to whom through you we renew our loyalty and affection, praying a prolongation of her beautiful life to reign over a loyal and happy people. It is with great satisfaction that we have observed during your Vice-royalty the intense interest manifested in all that tends to advance the social, moral, educational, and religious life of the Dominion. Your journeys through the various parts of the country have familiarized you with its geography, history and resources; and we believe that your interest in Canada will not be abated, and that in the Motherland you will materially aid in assisting to make known the unrivalled resources of Canada as an agricultural, manufacturing and mineral country,—destined to be the happy home of millions yet unborn. The presence of the Countess of Aberdeen reminds us of her untiring efforts in founding and fostering the National Council of Women, and of her advocacy of a foundation fund for the establishment and maintenance of the Victorian Order of Nurses, which, if carried to completion, will be a worthy monument to her philanthropic labor, and a benefaction to untold people in the future. We would also congratulate Her Excellency upon the honor conferred upon her as being the only woman invited to deliver an announcement address to the Senate and Students of one of the leading Universities of the Continent. The efflux of time will shortly remove you from this Dominion, but whosoever the Queen's service may call you be assured that you carry with you the affection of the entire Canadian people. His Excellency made a brief reply, and then accompanied by Lady Aberdeen entered the carriage of Lieut. Governor Howland and escorted by the Guard of Honor proceeded to Government House. Large numbers of people were gathered to see the procession and Lord and Lady Aberdeen were warmly greeted. At three o'clock the Vice Regal party drove to the Opera House where a large

number of ladies and gentlemen had assembled. The stage was prettily decorated. Here His Excellency was presented with the following address from the Local Government which was read by Premier Peters: To His Excellency the Right Honorable Sir John Campbell Hamilton Gordon, Earl of Aberdeen, Viscount Formartine, Lord Haddo, Methlic, Terves and Kellie, in the Peerage of Scotland, Viscount Gordon of Aberdeen, County of Aberdeen, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom, Baron of Nova Scotia, Knight Grand Cross of Our Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George &c., &c., Governor General of Canada, and Her Excellency the Countess of Aberdeen. On behalf of the Government of this Province, I have the honour to tender to Your Excellencies a cordial welcome upon this your second visit to Prince Edward Island. Our people have to look for success in the future to making such improvements in their methods of agriculture as will enable them, to compete in the markets of the world with countries yielding articles similar to those here produced. We therefore recall with pleasure the advice and information given by Your Excellencies to our farmers and their families on your former visit, and we know you will be gratified to learn that such advice and information have been productive of good results. Your Excellencies will have found during your sojourn in Canada that its inhabitants are loyal citizens of the Empire, who hail with pride every successful effort to unite more closely the Motherland with its colonies. The jubilee of Our Gracious Majesty enabled the Canadian people to give clear expression to their sentiment of loyalty which we are assured, Your Excellencies will willingly testify is deep-rooted and universal. The great interest which Your Excellencies have on all occasions taken in the pursuits of every class of the people of Canada, has, we rejoice to know, been cordially reciprocated, and we can assure you that when your official connection with the Dominion of Canada ends, you will carry back to the Mother country the hearty good wishes of every loyal Canadian. Tomorrow morning His Excellency will visit the City Schools, after which he and his party will leave for Summerside arriving there about 12.45. They will be met at the station by Chairman Hunt, the Town Councillors and others. They will be driven around the town and will visit the Summerside High School, where the School Board will be in attendance to receive them, and the pupils of all the public schools will be assembled. They will then visit the Convent School on Central Street, after which an informal reception will be held in the town hall, where Mr. Hunt will read an address, and citizens so desiring will have an opportunity of being presented to their Excellencies. An address will be presented to Lady Aberdeen by Mr. Sprague on behalf of the W. C. T. U.

After the reception their Excellencies as the guests of the town will be tendered a luncheon at the Clifton. In the evening the visitors will leave by the cruiser Acadia for Point du Chene. PERSONAL. CITY COUNCIL.—The passing of a number of bills and similar routine work and a consideration of the reception to Lord and Lady Aberdeen was the only business transacted at the regular meeting of the City Council held last evening. Councillor Hooper presided in the absence, through illness, of His Worship Mayor Dawson. CHEESE WARE.—In the struggle between buyers and sellers the former are slowly but surely gaining ground. Of this fact business at Brockville on Thursday furnished additional evidence, for although nothing was done during the session of the board, important sales were made immediately after its adjournment at 8 1/2 to 9c for August, and 9 1/2 for September. About 6,000 boxes in all were sold at these figures, a decided triumph for purchasers. At Woodstock, too, business was more active. Factorymen were, in fact, urgent sellers of August goods at 9 1/2, and on this basis several important sales were put through. At Kingston, however, salesmen showed more determination, and positively declined the 9 1/2 bid. On spot on Friday morning there was some enquiry for finest western goods, and when holders were willing to let go at 9 1/2 for September and 8 1/2 for August.
