HIDDEN GOLD

No Warbler is a more common Canadian summer resident than the Yellow Warbler, found across the Dominion, north to the tree limit. Yet, unless you are smart enough to be on the watch before the leaves grow large, it will be a case of hidden gold, as far as you are concerned. Rarely is one seen before it is heard, but their little voices come from many of the trees that line the streets of our cities, towns, and villages. Beyond cultivation, they frequent willows and alders along streams and ponds; in the far north and the western grasslands they make their homes in any little woody plants that they are able to find.

Despite the fact that these Warblers have come all the way from the tropics, their spring date of arrival here is wonderfully regular, and now is the time for us to be on the alert. Because there are several types of the Yellow Warbler's song, the novice may be confused into thinking that more than one species is present. And so it is necessary to learn the characteristic, high-pitched, Yellow Warbler's voice rather than its exact notes. The song is composed of a series of sweet, clear "chewees." When thoroughly familiar with the Yellow Warbler's way of singing, it is less difficult to get to know the songs of its many relatives.

With a good view, it is possible to tell the sexes apart. He has many little reddish flecks on his breast; she has none, or merely a trace. They are but five inches long, and though no relation to Canaries and with much daintier bills, their general appearance is such that many people know them as "Wild Canaries."

According to scientists, birds have no intelligence; but certainly the Yellow Warbler has "something" that makes it superior. Cowbirds are notorious for depositing their eggs in the nests of other birds, thus shifting the responsibility of bringing up their children. Most foster parents take on the duties as a matter of course, even though it is almost invariably at the expense of their own families; but Yellow Warblers are seldom imposed on. They nearly always manage to wriggle out of the situation. A favourite way is to build a new nest directly on top of the old home, completely covering all eggs. Then the mother starts laying another batch, hoping for no future interference.
