An important case was decided yesterday by the Stipendiary Magistrate, sitting in the City Court, for the recovery of small debts. It appears that last spring, while a prominent life insurance agent was passing in front of a dry goods store, he collided with an empty case which the firm had left on the sidewalk. The pants worn by the insurance man were torn in the collision, and having the usual legal knowledge of the average insurance agent, he immediately gave notice of his loss to the dry goods firm, but they repudiated any liability under their "policy." The matter finally came before the City Court and resulted in the Magistrate giving judgment in favor of the insurance agent for the value of the pants and costs, the magistrate, we understand, being of opinion that the plaintiff was lawfully using the sidewalk, and that no person has the right to obstruct the sidewalk even against an insurance agent.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.) A Timely Move. THE HAGUE, Aug. 3. The Committee of the Second Chamber of the States-General which had the subject of working people under consideration, has recommended a measure restricting employment in factories and workshops of boys under sixteen and women under eighteen. "That night work for such persons be forbidden, and women not to be allowed to work for a month after childbirth." A qualified official will inspect factories and workshops, and measures effected to provide for workmen's families in cases of old age, illness, accident or death. Trevelyan's Victory. LONDON, July 3. Trevelyan's victory continues to be absorbing interest in London, and the provincial Conservative newspapers, which all agree that the election is an ominous fact, Gladstonian papers are confident that an immediate general election will return a Home Rule majority. The same view is shared by Ministerialists. The opinion prevails that the Government, being sure of a compact majority during the run of the present Parliament, will not risk a dissolution until the natural term of five years hence, when Gladstone will probably be dead or his power weakened.

ESSEX CENTRE, Ont., Aug. 3. Death of Rev. Father Perry.

Rev. Sylvanus E. Perry, the oldest priest in this province, died at Egmont Bay yesterday morning, about three o'clock. Rev. Father Perry was born at Tignish in 1802, and was consequently in his 85th year at the time of his death. He pursued his ecclesiastical studies at Quebec, and was ordained Priest at Rustico in the year 1829, or about 58 years ago. For a long time after he had spiritual charge of all that part of the Island west of Miscouche, at which place he resided. He was afterwards in charge of Egmont Bay parish for a number of years, and was finally stationed at Fifteen Point, where he remained fourteen years, engaged for the greater part of the time in the active work of his sacred calling. For the last ten years of his life Father Perry was blind, though he still performed many religious duties for about six years after he was deprived of sight. Four years ago he gave up all work, and has since resided in Egmont Bay, until death claimed him, when he passed to the enjoyment of the reward earned by a long and useful life—the life of a hardworking, energetic, earnest, pious and beloved missionary priest.—Journal.
