A GOLDEN TIDE.—Gold continues to pour into this country from Europe, more than \$5,000,000 having arrived in the past month. Much of the fevers supposed to be typhoid are, he says, but the usual low fevers with some typhoid symptoms. He also says that there has been but one case of genuine typhoid fever this season, and in that case the patient died. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.) The Belfast Riots Terrible Scenes. BELFAST, Sept. 21. Desultory rioting, accompanied by firing, continued throughout the city all night. Policemen were seriously wounded and a number of citizens injured. LATER. BELFAST, Sept. 21—3, p. m. Rioting was resumed at dinner time, by Catholic mill hands who stoned the police on duty to keep the Orange Queen's Island ship yard men from coming in contact with the mill hands. The police drove the mob back capturing a number. While the battle was going on, another mob stoned the Black Watch Regiment of Welshmen, although the soldiers were fully armed and in fighting array. The troops, with fixed bayonets charged on the mob and drove them from the scene, wounding a great number. The funeral cortege of a man named Boyle, while returning from the cemetery to-day, was attacked by a mob who assailed the mourners. The military charged on the mob and arrested a score of rioters. MIDNIGHT. The city is quiet at present. Another Earthquake. SAVANNAH, Ga., Sept. 21. Another distinct earthquake shock was experienced this morning. Hundreds of people were awakened and many were frightened badly, though there was no general alarm. CHARLESTON, S. C., Sept. 21. Quite severe shocks of earthquake occurred here this morning. Houses were shaken, and in many instances the plaster was thrown down. No one was injured. Ottawa Notes. OTTAWA, Sept. 21. A. H. Suet and Mallotte, two persons convicted and sentenced to death by the British Columbia courts, have been respited till the 1st November, in consequence of the action taken in the Sproule case. The Administrator of the Government has ordered that the 18th day of November next, be observed as a Day of Thanksgiving throughout the Dominion. The Troubles in Spain. MADRID, Sept. 21. Queen Christina returned to the city to-day. She was received with the greatest enthusiasm by the people. Large crowds attended the funerals of the victims of the revolt. All members of the Cabinet were present, and the Queen sent wreaths to be placed upon the coffins of a number of insurgents. Scott Act Decisions. OTTAWA, Sept. 21. It is understood that a decision has been reached by the Cabinet that in cities and towns where the Scott Act is in force, all fines for violation of the law shall go to such cities and towns for the purposes of the Act. The Yacht Race. NEW YORK, Sept. 21. The committee on the Newport races gave decision as follows: The Gitania takes schooner cup, the Mayflower wins in her class, the Stranger in the second class and Cinderella in the third class. Fighting in Mexico. GUAYAMAS, Mex., Sept. 21. Reports have reached here of a fight between the Mexican troops and Torquis, the Mexicans had 20 killed and 40 wounded and the Torquis 62 killed. Fate of Parnell's Bill. LONDON, Sept. 21. Parnell's Land Bill was rejected by a vote of 297 to 202. All the Gladstonians supported the Parnellites and the Unionists voted with the Government. A Gladstonian Denial. LONDON, Sept. 21. Gladstone published a letter again denying persistently the repeated report that he is about to join the Catholic Church. Another Strike. LONDON, Sept. 21. Ninety thousand cotton spinners in Burnley have resolved to strike against a reduction in wages. A Briber Fined. MONTREAL, Sept. 21. Walters, for attempting to bribe Customs Officer Brosseau, was to-day fined. Prorogation. LONDON, Sept. 21. Parliament will be prorogued on Friday. Weather Bulletin. TORONTO, September 22—10 a. m.
