THE management of the Canadian Pacific Railway are making arrangements for the running of a regular train between Montreal and Ottawa—a distance of about 120 miles, in two hours and a half—an average rate of speed of about 45 miles an hour. This is probably the fastest time for an equal distance on any railway in America, while few trains in England obtain as high a rate.

Carmichael & Co., are building a barge at New Glasgow, N. S., for persons in New York. Mr. James Kitchin, River John, N. S., has launched a ship called the "William M. McNeil," of 1,400 tons register, classed A1, 13 years.

ON Saturday judgment was delivered in the West Simcoe, Ont., election case, unseating O. J. Phelps, who was elected in February last by a majority of 29 over his Conservative opponent, Mr. Moberly. Their Lordships took the view that neither the charge of personal bribery nor bribery by agents had been sustained, but that the amount of liquor consumed on polling day had a demoralizing effect upon the electorate. They therefore declared the respondent unseated with costs.

A. A. BYNON, Esq., of the firm of Bynon & Co., editors and publishers of the Oxford Home Journal, No. 1068 Broadway, Oakland, Cal., is in Tryon, P. E. I., on a visit to his brother and other friends. Mr. Anderson has had charge of the Southport School during the last three years, and has taken a high place as a teacher. His genial nature and good character has made him many fast friends. Earl Spencer's Arrival at Cork.—

DUBLIN, Aug. 21. Earl Spencer, Lord Lieutenant, arrived at Cork last night and was respectfully received by the people. Policemen, in sight of each other, guarded the train of the Lord Lieutenant along the entire route from Dublin to Cork.

Socialistic Pamphlets.—

VIENNA, Aug. 22. A number of socialistic pamphlets, violently attacking the Emperor Francis Joseph, have been found in the vicinity of the Imperial summer palace.

Deaths Among British Troops from Cholera.—

ALEXANDRIA, Aug. 22. One hundred and forty deaths from cholera have occurred among the British troops in Egypt since the outbreak of the disease.

The French in Tonquin.—

LONDON, Aug. 22. The "Times" correspondent at Hong Kong reports that Hadoung, in Tonquin, was attacked by the French on the 19th inst.

A Disastrous Conflagration.—

ROME, Aug. 23. A disastrous conflagration occurred yesterday at Bersezia, in the Province of Como. Forty-four houses were burned.

A Riot.—

TRIESTE, Aug. 22. A riot occurred here on Sunday, between Italians and Austrians. Several of the latter were seriously injured.

Telegraph Building Destroyed.—

CHICAGO, Aug. 22. The fire which destroyed the telegraph building here is supposed to have caught from a defective flue.

A Billiard Match.—

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 22. Sexton won the billiard match on Monday night, scoring 1,000 to 518 by Wallace.

Cholera in Egypt.—

ALEXANDRIA, Aug. 22. There were forty-three deaths from cholera on Monday.

The Strike Ended.—

NEW YORK, Aug. 22. The telegraphers have returned to work.

Telegraph Notes.—

The Queen goes to Balmoral next Friday. The health of Her Majesty is much improved.

The vessel reported as having been lost off Beach Haven, carried a signal of distress and a black flag. The steamer in pursuit was an ocean steamer, undoubtedly attracted by the signal. She remained at the place half an hour to rescue the crew of the stricken vessel.

The Pope has written to Cardinal De Luca, the prefect of the congregation of Cardinal Pitri, and Cardinal Hergenrother, refuting the charges recently made that the papacy has any desire to stand in the way of the development of Italy, and urging them to defend the Church vigorously by adducing evidence from the archives of the Vatican, showing that the charges are unfounded.

The election in Sligo county resulted in the return of Nicholas Lynch, home rule candidate, by 1,596 votes, against 1,020 for O'Hara, the conservative candidate.

After the result of the election had been declared, O'Hara charged Sexton with resorting to vulgar personal abuse during the canvass, and with slandering the living and the dead. Sexton will make a public reply.

English Soldiers and the Cholera.—

It is strange that the first two victims to cholera among our officers should be artillery men. Their loss is particularly sad, as they were expected home by their friends some months ago. Poor "Beauty" Croft, as he was familiarly known in society, was near his turn for horse artillery when he sailed for Ismailia. He served through the campaign in a field battery, which was sent home soon after the grand review at Cairo. Croft expected to return with it, but at the last moment he was transferred to a horse artillery battery, in which a vacancy had occurred through the promotion of one of its subalterns. This battery was one of those left behind. Le Queane, on the other hand, never set foot in Egypt till long after all the fighting—such as it was—came to an end. He had not very long joined a battery at Woolwich, and was ordered out, very much against his will, to take the place of a subaltern invalided home from Cairo. His name, however, was left on the roll of the Woolwich battery, and he was given to understand that he would return to it when the battery he was attached to left Egypt. Notwithstanding this, a few days before it embarked for England, he was again transferred to another battery under orders to remain at Cairo for an indefinite period. "I don't believe," said the boy, when he was told, "that I shall ever see home again."—London Truth.
