The firm will then, it is understood, continue on with the other two projects, that of erecting an understructure to the present bridge, and the removal of the steel superstructure. The temporary bridge will be sufficiently wide to permit the passage of one car or a half-ton truck. No heavy vehicular traffic will be permitted to cross the temporary structure, it is understood.

The control of traffic during the time the bridge will be in use, will be a not inconsiderable problem. However, it is possible that a man will be placed at either end to assist the flow of traffic, and to prevent any delaying tie-up.

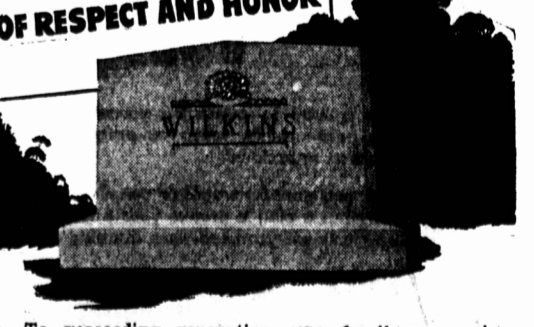
