The theme for this year's carnival is "Winter Wonderland," an appropriate one for the snow-laden campus at SDU.

Other officers involved in this year's production include vice-chairman Bob Hickey, a sophomore science student from Summerside; business manager Brian Dornan, junior arts, Montreal; John Driscoll, a junior arts student from Saugus, Mass., who is in charge of sales; and Carol Ann Power, a junior arts student from Souris, who is handling the carnival publicity.

Reports from the SDU campus indicate that this promises to be the biggest and best winter carnival yet with three action-filled days from Jan. 27-30.

**MONCTON (CP)** — Work crews were to stay on the job throughout Thursday night to clear the CNR track at nearby Port Elgin where 20 freight cars went off the rails early Thursday.

CNR officials here said the track would be open by noon today and trains 39 and 40 would operate as usual. The trains which carry passengers and express between Moncton and Charlottetown were cancelled Thursday. Passengers were moved by bus.

The 57-car freight was en route to Cape Tormentine, N.B., from Sackville, N.B., with cargo bound for Prince Edward Island. Cause of the derailment has not been determined. There were no injuries.
