

# Reports Of Electric Rate Changes Said "Premature"

Speculation on details of proposed changes in electric light rates charged by the municipally-owned Summerside Electric Light Department, were described as premature last evening by Councillor Dr. H.E. Clark, chairman of the electric light committee.

Dr. Clark expressed regret that rate figures had been published before his committee or the town council had made any decision on the matter. His remarks were made at a meeting of the council which adjourned from Monday evening.

Councillor Clark stated that, although the rates which had been reported were those which had been suggested in the report of Engineering Services Ltd., who have just completed an extensive survey of the electric light department, he said the details of rate changes are still being studied by the electric light committee and must still be taken before the council for approval.

Members of the committee agreed to meet again tonight to continue the study of amendments in rate charges which they hope to make effective in January.

### PROBLEMS

Some of the problems facing the committee in making the changes were indicated by Councillor MacCausland, chairman of the finance committee, who said that 93 percent of personal and real estate taxes had been paid.

This amounting to a collection of \$308,852, on a tax roll of about \$330,000.

The payment of the educational poll tax however, was described as a disappointment, with only 64 per cent having been paid. This amounted to \$16,936, of a total roll of about \$26,000, and he announced that it was the intention of his committee to have this matter investigated before the December council meeting.

He suggested that it might be well for the town to give consideration to the appointment of a tax collector, noting that approximately \$22,000 of the personal and property tax was still unpaid, in addition to the unpaid portion of the educational tax.

### RINK PAINTED

Reporting as chairman of the rink committee, Councillor MacCausland said the interior of the building had been painted, and was very satisfactory. He asked the other members of the council to visit the rink and have a look at the work which had been done there. He said 34 gallons of paint had been used at a cost of about \$200.

While admitting that roller-skating had not proven as popular as had been anticipated, upward of \$1000 was realized from this activity during the season, and over \$700 had been recovered from the \$1600 which had been used to purchase the roller skates, with the further anticipation that the entire capital investment in the skates would be returned within a year and a half.

### RCAF Wing 200 Will Renovate

**SUMMERSIDE**—At a regular meeting of R.C.A.F. Association Wing 200 held in the club rooms last evening it was decided that the room now used as a billiard and pool room be redecorated and in future, on a trial basis, used as a lounge room.

It was also decided that the pool table be dismantled and stored away until such time as arrangements may be made to reassemble it.

It was pointed out that the decision to convert the room into a tastefully decorated lounge was made in the interest of the general membership and with a view of providing better accommodations for the membership at large.

The reports of the various committees indicated that matters concerning the general good of the wing were being given the attention of the committees in charge. The report on the major project of the wing submitted by Bill Hickey showed that the Air Cadets movement in this area was active with excellent attendance and great interest shown by the cadets.

President Norman Hogg presided.

### POTATO OUTLOOK GOOD

Generally, he noted, P.E.I. had good crop this year except for potatoes. These were estimated to be down by from 2 to 27 per cent. Potato production across Canada as a whole would be somewhat less this year than consumption.

This, he said, means that Canada must look toward the importation of potatoes, as it has in other years. For several years now the imports of potatoes have been on a par with exports.

"Our feeling is that if not too many potatoes are brought into Canada this year," he said, "our own market should be excellent."

He noted that P.E.I. had financed several processing plants to enable Island farmers to market their products in the province. "Our food processing plant is one of the best equipped anywhere," he said.

Despite this, the Island is usually faced with surpluses and requires support prices. One way to overcome the need for support prices was through increased research.

"We have been told that too much butter is injurious to health, that the fatty substances cause heart attacks," he said, grinning. "Well, my father-in-law is 88 and he likes butter for dessert. And he does all right on it."

Through proper research, Mr. Cullen said, he felt certain it would be shown that more butter could be consumed with no ill effects. In this way surpluses could be disposed of.

### Diefenbaker Leaves Italy For Pakistan

ROME (CP) — The European phase of Prime Minister Diefenbaker's world tour ended Wednesday night as he boarded a plane for Pakistan after a one-day visit here.

The prime minister's crowded week in Western Europe, which combined talks with government leaders with inspection trips through Canada's NATO army and air bases in France and West Germany, will be followed by an easier-paced schedule as he returns to Commonwealth territory.

Wednesday, the Canadian leader travelled around Rome through intermittent rain for a meeting with the Pope, a meeting with Canadian Embassy officials, a call on President Gronchi, talks with Prime Minister Fanfani and members of his cabinet and some ordinary sightseeing.

He was accompanied by Mrs. Diefenbaker in his private 15-minute audience with the pontiff, whom he described afterwards as "a man of peace, deep humility and tolerance."

The prime minister also talked briefly with Msgr. Domenico Tardini, papal secretary of state. His schedule was complicated by an emergency meeting of the Italian cabinet, forcing a switch of the planned morning meeting with Fanfani to what was to have been a free afternoon, cutting short a proposed sightseeing tour.

A quiet evening was scheduled today after the long flight to Karachi.
