NEW YORK (AP)—The stock
market started higher Monday,
changed its mind, and finally
closed mixed with a lower look.

The Associated Press average of
60 stocks declined 10 cents at
\$125.30.

The industrial component was
off 20 cents and rails were down
10 cents. Utilities, on the other
hand, advanced 10 cents to a new
high mark of \$60.30.

Stronger stocks were Eastman
Kodak, Anaconda Copper, Bullard,
American Woolen, U. S. Steel,
Homestake Mining, Illinois Central,
Cities Service, Seaboard Oil and
Greyhound Corp.

Lower were Bethlehem Steel,
Chrysler, United Aircraft, Admiral

inghouse Electric, American To-
bacco, General Dynamics, Texas
Instruments, Pennsylvania Rail-
road and U. S. Gypsum.

Canadian issues were mostly
higher. Hiram Walker added 1/2
and both Dome Mines and Inter-
national Nickel gained 1/4. Distill-
ers Seagram lost 1/4.

alite Oil fell 1/4.

Thus it was inevitable that some
large educational philosophy should
creep in to this gigantic evolution,
and it is trite to say that it is
much more difficult to eradicate it
than it was to let it take root.

In this environment St. Dun-
stan's has plotted its course for a
hundred years, influenced, no
doubt, by all the gross currents
around it, yet always trying to
keep an even keel and steer a
straight course, striving to avoid
the Scylla of an unchanging stod-
giness on the one hand, and the
Charybdis of losing touch with the
essential discipline of the humani-
ties on the other. We may not
have been always successful in this
effort, and we have had frequently
to make more or less radical
changes, but we have tried to be
true to our motto and to hold fast
to the essentials of faith and
knowledge.

Year's Enrollment

The total enrollment this year
was slightly over 300, with the
high school enrollment somewhat
higher than that of last year.
This was the first year we were
obliged to have two divisions in
Grade XI. Reverend Vincent Mur-
naghan and Reverend James Kelly
returned to the staff after two
years graduate work in the
University of Toronto. Reverend Fran-
cis Bolger, and Reverend Charles
MacDonald were added to the high
school staff, and it is hoped that
both of these men will proceed to
take graduate work next year.
Reverend Thomas MacLellan of
last year's staff was released this
year to pursue studies toward the
doctorate in philosophy at Laval
University.

The outstanding event of the
year was the opening ceremonies
of the Centennial Year, on Janu-
ary 19th. Most Rev. Maurice Roy,
Archbishop of Quebec celebrated
Solemn Pontifical Mass of thank-
sgiving on that occasion, and the
sermon was preached by
Rev. J. A. Murphy, former
Rector of the College. The privilege
of having the Archbishop of
Quebec for that day was highly
appreciated, and it renewed the
ties of affiliation which existed for
60 years between Laval and St.
Dunstan's.

Contributing to the academic
side of the celebration of the year
we had a series of lectures; the
first was by Roy Campbell, the
South African poet; the next by
Bruce Marshall, the British novel-
ist; the third by Louis Budenz,
former Communist, and now of
Yarham University; and the last
by Dr. Lynch of St. Michael's Col-
lege, Toronto. As the names of
the lecturers would indicate, the
topics presented varied greatly,
and provided much stimulating
food for thought.

It is difficult to be sufficiently
proud with the year's work to
commend it wholly. Certainly some
students work well and elicit a
satisfactory interest in study. As
usual we have a considerable
number of failures, some of which
could have been avoided by a little
more effort. The work as an en-
tirety need not be with such char-
acter and correct principles to
cope with the many crises that
constantly confront it. It is ever
on the verge of a state that will
demand again "bicou and sweat
and tears." If it is to be happy-
ly through these crises men must
use up with ideas and ideals sound
in Christian tradition and true
philosophy. The graduates we
present for your approval today
have great responsibilities and ob-
ligations to the society into which
they go. We wish these young
men and women godspeed as they
go forth.

Expresses Thanks

I wish to thank you all for your
presence here today; and the don-
ors of prizes for their generous
interest in our work. A new prize
has been established this year in
memory of William D. E. MacDon-
ald, a very promising sophomore
student who died during the year.
The prize has been established by
his parents Lt.-Col. W. J. and Mrs.
MacDonald. I wish to express our
appreciation also to Alumni ex-
ecutive and committees for their
untiring devotion and effort in
their preparation for the celebration
and ceremonies that will mark
our hundredth anniversary, to be
held August 2nd to 5th. We feel
sure that their careful preparation
will be crowned with signal suc-
cess. I wish also to give public
expression here of gratitude, and a
deep sense of obligation to the
Sisters of St. Martha, who for so
past 37 years have contributed so
much in almost every field of St.
Dunstan's College. Their assistance
and co-operation have been al-
ways generous and self-sacrificing,
and exemplifies true charity in
very many ways. They receive lit-
tle reward therefor, nor do they
seek it; their hope is a reward for
their exemplary charity in the
world to come. They may even
have to wait for a hundred years
to get another thank-you, but it is
given very sincerely now.

We are greatly honored today
in having the Honorable Sean
Murphy, the Ambassador of Ire-
land, and I won't attempt to say
that in Irish, come to us to ad-
dress the Irish graduates. It is the
first time I believe, that a man
from an Irish ambassador, Mur-
phy, a lawyer by profession,
and a veteran of the Irish Diplo-
matic Service, has had wide ex-
perience in his chosen career. We
welcome this representative of the
Emerald Isle to the Emerald Isle
of Canada; and although we Irish
not boast that our grass is greener,
as for a native Irishman, yet
grass is as green as Ireland's, yet
we do boast that our potatoes are
just as good. I wish to thank Mr.
Murphy very heartily for his gen-
erous consent to address the gradu-
ates today; we shall long remem-
ber his kindness.
