

Potato Board Is Opposed To Move

Opposition has been expressed by the Prince Edward Island Potato Marketing Board, to the proposed transfer of the Canadian National Railways despatching staff, and possible supervision of car service from Charlottetown to Moncton.

In a letter to E.J. Cooke, vice-president of the railway, R.L. Burge, chairman of the potato board, stated that: "We of the potato industry are against such a change, because of necessity it will deprive us of the on-the-spot assessment of our shipping needs, and the closer communication with local railway officials, which has in the past lent itself to easier and faster movement of our shipments."

On-the-spot watchfulness of our local CNR staff, coupled with the co-operation of our shippers, is giving a great deal of assurance to our industry. It is our firm belief that the proposed change would put our industry, at a great disadvantage, and we are hoping that you will give this matter your earnest consideration, and leave your local staff, referred to above, operating as at present in Charlottetown."

Salvation Army Officially Opens New Citadel Here

Provincial and civic leaders and ordinary citizens joined the Prince Edward Island Corps of the Salvation Army to officially open and dedicate the new Army Citadel in Charlottetown, Saturday afternoon.

A mantle of snow cloaked the scene of recent construction and provided a setting in keeping with the season. The day itself was cold and crisp, with the threat of snowflurries, but a shaft of sunlight shone through the glass entrance door and reflected off the bronze plaque which read: "Dedicated to the Glory of God, December 3, 1966." Col. Leslie Russell, chief secretary and second-in-command of the Army in Canada and Bermuda, officiated at the "Key Turning Ceremony" and unveiling.

Civic greetings were brought by Mayor Walter Cox who complimented the Army on its splendid achievement and its record of service to the city. In a more personal note he recalled that he had been a neighbor of the Army for 40 years and he hoped the association formed would continue many more years.

Following the turning of the key of the building to Col. Russell by Keith Pickard, architect, a prayer was offered by Major V. Marsland, public relations officer.

In the Service of Dedication, Col. Russell based his remarks on the text 2nd Corinthians, Chap. 13, "The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Ghost, be with you. Amen."

He expressed the hope that even as this new building was dedicated to God, that his dedication would rest upon it.

Col. Russell stated that great and love were two of the greatest words in the Bible, and together with communion the most closely linked.

He brought greetings and congratulations from territorial headquarters in Toronto, a gold tribute to those who made this "great day" possible. This was the day, he said, when the Army could truly echo and re-echo the traditional worldwide salutation and acknowledgment, "Hallelujah, Amen".

The chief secretary was introduced by Brig. J. R. Sloan, Saint John, divisional commander.

Premier Alex Campbell extended greetings from the government, and people of the province. He felt that the word "Citadel" was singularly appropriate in that it meant both a fortress and a haven of retreat.

R. G. Boyne, former chairman of the Advisory Board, was presented with a special award of appreciation from the Army by Col. Russell for his work over a number of years and his leadership in the Capital Fund Appeal.

In expressing his thanks for the honor, Mr. Boyne paid tribute to Brig. A. W. Rogers, provincial chairman of the appeal, W. R. Jenkins, city, chairman, and others who had contributed to the success of the campaign.

Premier Irked By Statement

"I hardly think Mr. Moe or plant manager Cyril Davis will agree with what he said," Premier Alex Campbell stated Saturday morning in reference to remarks made Friday night by Dr. Cyril Sinnott, M.L.A. (5th Kings). Dr. Sinnott had criticized the provincial government as a result of the closing of the Gulf Garden Food plant at Georgetown announced by the manager Friday evening.

A full statement of the government position in the matter was also given by Premier Campbell and appears below.

POLITICAL ARENA

Said the Premier Saturday: "I am very disappointed in the new member from Fifth Kings who has obviously endeavored to drag this matter into the political arena with his irresponsible and spurious statement. While Dr. Sinnott may be in possession of his faculties he is certainly not possessed of the facts of the situation. His remarks constitute a serious misrepresentation of the facts and confirms his misunderstanding of the entire situation."

UNTENABLE POSITION

"His attitude constitutes political nonsense bordering on the ridiculous and invites at the appropriate time a full disclosure by the government of his untenable position."

However, the Premier added, "my reaction to his statement is only incidental to the importance of the government statement of policy in this matter. We want the people to have all the background knowledge of it they can get."
