THOUGHTS FOR OUR TIME

FANATICAL PATRIOTISM LIVES ON HATE
 Much of present-day material and spiritual suffering flows from the evil of what we know as Nationalism. We might define this movement of erratic or misguided patriotism as "an irrational and inordinate attachment to race or country without that due sense of proportion towards other purposes of human life, which, under God's Providence, are of higher value." It is easy to see how the menace of Nationalism is opposed to the principles of the Christian State.

It is a real force of evil, in reality nothing more than a paginated love of country. The nation is looked upon as the ultimate object of human worship.

words and actions by which it is manifested. Perhaps one of the most widely known of all forms of this Christian political theory is economic nationalism which often results in waves of propaganda piling up a spirit of insularity, of national hyperconsciousness, of antagonism toward neighboring nations, and excessive tariffs, embargoes and exchange restrictions backing up in practical form a "buy at home" advertising campaign. Once this tendency to build up nationalism and restrict world trade develops, we note the inevitable consequences of aggression (or defense) for economic reasons and increased poverty and unemployment.

His Holiness Pope Pius XI gives us a very clear outline in Quadragesimo Anno of the steps of decadence that follows limitation of free competition and the despotism of economic domination which flows from it. "First," he says, "there is the struggle for dictatorship in the economic sphere itself; then, the fierce battle to acquire control of the state, so that its authority and resources may be abused in the economic struggle. Finally, the clash between states themselves. This latter arises from two causes: (1) because the nations apply their power and political influence regardless of circumstances, to promote the economic advantages of their citizens, and (2) because vice versa, economic forces and economic domination are used to decide political controversies between peoples. . . . As regards the relations of peoples among themselves, a double stream has issued forth from this one fountain-head, on the one hand, economic nationalism or even economic imperialism; on the other, a not less noxious and detestable internationalism or international imperialism in financial affairs, which holds that where a man's fortune is, there is his country."

Now, this movement, threatening and discouraging as it is, is not without a remedy. In this regard, we would suggest the following thoughts. In the first place, due consideration must be had for the double character, individual and social of capital and labor, in order that the dangers of excessive individualism and collectivism be avoided. The mutual relations between capital and labor must be determined according to the laws of the strictest justice, supported, however, by Christian charity. Free competition and still more, economic domination must be kept within just and definite limits, and must be brought under effective control of the public authority in matters pertaining to this latter's competence. The public institutions of nations must be such to make the whole of human society conform to the common good, i.e. to the standard of social justice. If this is done the economic system, that most important branch of social life, will necessarily be restored to sanity and right order.

CHRISTIAN CHARITY
 In conclusion, we warn against confusing this evil love of country with the beautiful Christian virtue of patriotism. The right order of Christian charity does not disapprove of lawful love of country and a sentiment of justifiable nationalism; on the contrary it controls, sanctifies and enlivens them. If, however, egoism abusing this love of country and exaggerating this sentiment of nationalism, insinuates itself into the relations between people and people, there is no excess that will not seem justified, and that which between individuals would be judged blame-worthy by all, is now considered lawful and praiseworthy if done in the name of his exaggerated nationalism. Instead of the great law of love and human brotherhood which embraces and holds in a single family all nations with One Father Who is in Heaven, there enters hatred, driving all to destruction. In public life, sacred principles, the guide of all social intercourse, are trampled upon; the solid foundations of right and honesty on which the state should rest, are undermined; polluted and closed are the sources of those ancient traditions which, based on Faith in God and fidelity to His Law, secured the true progress of nations. In the light of this, who can deny the need for each one of us to labor against these evil forces, striving to replace them by true Christian principles which alone can make a state strong.

Ontario May Cut Down Use Of X-rays In TB Surveys

TORONTO (CP) — Use of x-rays in mass tuberculosis detection surveys may be sharply reduced in Ontario next year. The Ontario health department said Friday it has been conducting pilot studies in the use of tuberculin skin tests to replace x-rays for persons under 40. First results indicate the step will likely be adopted province-wide within a year.

The new policy has already been adopted by the National Sanatorium Association. The policy is aimed at:
 1. Reducing radiation exposure on the reproductive organs of persons who are still in their reproductive years.
 2. Obtaining more detailed information on TB incidence in the province which x-rays do not provide.

A health department authority emphasized that the move towards reducing x-rays should not be interpreted as condemnation of x-ray radiation hazards. Dr. H. L. McClintock, medical director of the National Sanatorium said the switch from x-rays to skin tests will give authorities a great deal of information which is not made available by x-rays.
