

Braves Win World Series

Defeat The Yankees 5-0 In Final Game Of Series

NEW YORK (AP)—Lew Burdette became the first world series pitcher in 52 years to pitch two shutouts as his 5-0 seventh-inning New York Yankees Thursday gave Milwaukee Braves a world championship on the first try.

The fidgety right hander touched off a roar that echoed from Yankee Stadium to delicious Wisconsin Avenue in Milwaukee when he retired Bill Skowron, the last Yankee batter, to end the seventh game.

Not since Christy Mathewson threw three shutouts for New York Giants against Philadelphia Athletics in 1905 had a man blanked the enemy twice in series play.

Burdette, an ex-Yankee, hadn't allowed a run in 24 innings while twisting the proud New Yorkers around his little finger.

SURGE ONTO FIELD
As soon as Eddie Mathews gloved Skowron's hard smash down the third base line and stepped on third for the force play that ended the game, a swarm of cheering boys and men surged onto the field. Mathews leaped high in the air to touch off the wildest victory celebration in many a year.

Working with only two days rest because his roommate, Warren Spahn, still was recovering from a bout with the flu, Burdette was simply tremendous.

The raw-boned gent from the hill country of West Virginia survived a first-inning scare and wobbled again in the ninth when the desperate Yankees loaded the bases.

Singles by Gil McDougald, Jerry Coleman and Tommy Byrne put three men on with two out in the ninth as the game mounted. The roof blew off when Skowron rapped sharply to Mathews for the force that opened every beer tap in Milwaukee.

COSTLY ERROR
It was the first time since 1948 that the world series had gone to a team from outside New York as the Yankees' error, which chipped away another chunk of the big city's baseball prestige.

Four big runs in a third-inning spurt in which the gates were opened, ironically, by an error by Tony Kubek, a Milwaukee boy, sealed the Yankees' doom. It hardly mattered when Del Crandall slammed a home run just beyond Enos Slaughter's reach into the lower left field stands in the eighth.

This will go down in baseball as the "Burdette series." The man the Yankees traded away to Boston in 1951 really came back to haunt them. Using a puzzling mixture of slider, screwball, curve and fast ball, the 30-year-old right-hander beat the Yankees almost all by himself.

The only other Milwaukee victory was earned by Spahn in last Sunday's 10-inning thriller.

GREATEST MOMENT
Burdette whipped Bobby Shantz 4-3 in the second game to square the series and his 1-0 victory over Whitey Ford in the game Monday at Milwaukee put his team one game up. And Thursday he bounced back, only 48 hours later, to lead the Braves to their greatest moment.

The last Yankee run off Burdette was a homer by Hank Aaron in the third inning of the second game. His streak of 24 23 scoreless frames is only five short of Babe Ruth's famous string of 29 24 innings stretched over two

world series.
And Fred Haney, the manager who was hanged in effigy when the Braves faltered in July, has hung a second world series defeat on Casey Stengel, who had won six of seven previous October tests. The Yanks now own a 17-6 series record and the National League now has won 20 to 34 by the American League.

Each winning brave will get about \$9,000 from the player pool, split 33 ways. The Yanks will take home about \$5,710 each, their smallest payday in years. Exact shares won't be known until next week.

FIELDING LAPSES
Jittery Yankee fielding must be blamed for much of Don Larsen's trouble in the big third inning for the perfect game pitcher would have been out of the inning if Kubek hadn't made an error.

There was one out and nobody on when Bob Hazle punched a single to left for his first series hit. Logan, a one-armed grounder to Kubek that had double play written all over it, Kubek hurriedly threw high, pulling Jerry Coleman off second base.

Coleman's relay to first was too late to get Logan although the Yanks, led by Stengel, beamed to umpire Augie Donatelli.

Instead of being out of the inning, Larsen now was in deep trouble with men on first and second and the feared slugger, Eddie Mathews, at bat.

Mathews ripped a double into the right field corner, a line drive over the head of first baseman Joe Collins, and both Hazle and Logan scored.

LARSEN TAKEN OUT
Stengel brought in Bobby Shantz, the veteran lefty, to replace Larsen.

Milwaukee, smelling blood, wasn't ready to stop. Hank Aaron singled to centre, knocking in Mathews, and Wes Covington, hit by Mickey, helped Lew off the hook by lashing the ball back to the

From that time on, until Coleman's single in the fifth, Burdette retired 11 successive batters.

TWO ON IN SIXTH
The next threat came in the sixth. With two out, Mantle singled to centre and Berra was safe when Mathews fumbled his relay. Again it was McDougald who ended the budding rally with a bunting rally to Mathews, who stepped on third.

In all their previous 22 world

happy Haney whispered with a choke in his voice. "You don't know what this means to me. Nobody does. This makes up for everything."

Casey had fended his way through a horde of reporters, photographers, broadcasters and newsreel men. He reached out, grabbed Haney's hand and shouted above the noise:

"I want to tell you something. You did a very wonderful and very efficient job all year and you ran that club very well during this series, too."

"You beat us and you beat us right. There's no question about it."

Later, Dan Topping and Del Webb, co-owners of the Yankees, came in to congratulate Haney. After they left, Fred was asked what they said to him.

"How the hell do I know," he replied. "I don't know what anyone is saying. I'm still numb. In fact, I'm sure I must be dreaming. If anybody told me we've got another game to play tomorrow, I'd believe him."

Remember When
Jake Gaudaur, one of Canada's greatest scullers, died 20 years ago today at his home near Orillia, Ont., at age 79. Early in the century he held the world title for five years, victor in scores of races against the best oarsmen of his time.

Kelly and Johnston are still a topic of conversation following the rugged contest they staged in the last card at Summerside, which was considered to be perhaps the best seen at the stadium this year.

Andre Carpentier is a member of the famous acrobatic team that came to Canada from France about a year ago, and worked with the famous Edward Champion, who recently broke a leg while wrestling in Chicago.

Bad man "Pirate" Roy Le Boeuf has been seen twice at the local stadium and fans will again be shouting their displeasure at his illegal tactics.

Bernier Fortin, partner of Carpentier has proved himself a crowd pleaser at a previous appearance at Summerside, while Breck Constantie, Partner of Le Boeuf in another tag team match, has reputation similar to that of the ferocious "Pirate," and this bout should be a rouser from start to finish.

GIANT FIREBALL

From Effigy To Stardom

NEW YORK (AP)—Four months ago they hanged Fred Haney in effigy. Thursday the same red-faced little guy was being eulogized as the greatest manager in baseball.

As late as Sept. 15, they had Haney on the way out as manager of Milwaukee Braves. Today his return as pilot in 1958 is taken for granted and his team is hailed as the scrappiest team that ever played in a world series.

This new appraisal of Haney and his Braves comes naturally. The team and Haney have been good all year. It didn't take Thursday's 5-0 triumph over New York Yankees in the final game of the world series to prove it.

The team and the manager proved it when they hung on to the top, or close to it, despite numerous injuries to key men that would have caused lesser men to quit.

When Casey Stengel, the losing manager, came to Haney's little room in the Braves' clubhouse after the game to congratulate him and the team on a fine job, Haney was deeply moved.

Nobody Knows
"Thanks Casey," the fired but

one as Coleman forced Covington at second on Frank Torre's grounder.

Shantz was followed by Art Dittmar, Tom Sturdivant and finally Byrne but the damage had been done. Whitey Ford who had asked for this start although he had only two days rest, like Burdette, was in the bullpen. He never got in the game.

Mickey Mantle played in a surprising last-hour switch by Stengel. When Mantle reported ready, he benched Andy Carey and put Kubek on third.

THREATEN IN FIRST
The Yanks had their best chance at Burdette in the first inning. Bauer, setting a series record by hitting safely in his 14th consecutive game, opened with a double down the left field line.

When Enos Slaughter grounded back to the box, Bauer was trapped between second and third. The Braves messed up the rundown, however, only to find Bauder sliding into second base on one side and Slaughter sliding in from the other. Logan touched Slaughter for the out.

Still the Yanks had Burdette in trouble with a man on second, only one out, and Mantle at bat. Mickey helped Lew off the hook by lashing the ball back to the

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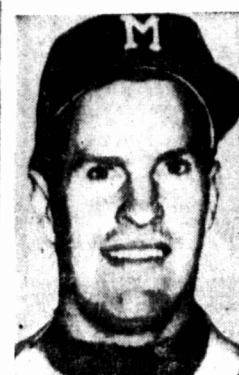

Although the crowd of 61,207 was below capacity, the series total attendance set a record. The figures showed 304,712 paid to watch the third straight seven-game series, topping the mark of 389,763 hung up by the Yanks and Dodgers in 1947.

Hank Aaron, home run and runs batted in champ of the National League, led the series hitting with 333 on 11 hits in 28 at bats. He stroked two singles in Thursday's finale and hit safely in all seven games.

There are two factors working against each other in the battle to achieve even balance. All the clubs want to see a close exciting race, but each of them would also like to be on the top of this dog fight with the other teams underneath. So naturally they try to build as strong a team as possible. 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St. Dunstons Defeat PWC

St. Dunstons University's football team walloped Prince of Wales College squad 47-0 in an exhibition game yesterday afternoon on St. Dunstons' field. It was the first Canadian Rugby game ever played in this province although there was an exhibition of intersquad football last year.

Packing more experience, more speed and more weight, the Red and White team outclassed their opponents. They used the forward pass to ad-

vantage at times for long gains smashed through the P.W.C. line with apparent ease, and ran for long gains around the ends when they chose to advance along the ground.

All told, the Saints scored seven touchdowns. They kicked for the extra points after touchdowns on four occasions and passed for the extra point on another.

Ray Hache of Bathurst, N.B. scored two of the T.D.'s, both of them on forward passes from

Collins. Hache played right end and Collins, who was running the team from quarterback at the time, also kicked the four extra points after touchdowns, and passed for another point. Collins is a Regina boy.

Jean Marie Bouchard from Arvida, Quebec scored another of the touchdowns from his position at halfback.

Pieton Billaudeau, an Ottawa product, also came through with a touchdown. A small player with an unusual burst of speed, Billaudeau is a former English rugby player who played with the Saints' last Maritime Championship team. A versatile player he played at both the offensive and defensive halfback positions when he was not directing the team from the quarterback spot.

Gerard Tingley of Campbellton is an end. He took a long pass in the end zone for one of the Saints' T.D.'s and dropped another long one after getting his hands on it.

Paul Arsenault, a Charlottetown boy at the halfback position, scored another of the touchdowns and the remaining one was scored by James Gallant who handles the Wingback position.

It was Brian Noonan, a Regina boy, who scored the extra point on the first touchdown. He caught a forward pass in the end zone from Gil Collins who elected to pass instead of kick for the extra point.

Although the Welshmen were pretty well outclassed they never stopped trying. They used trick plays on two occasions to good advantage. On one they pulled a sleeper play to move the yard

sticks. On another they made yards when they advanced the ball from a fake kick formation. The Saints are coached by A. J. MacAdam who coached their English rugby squads to numerous championships in the past.

"Mac" MacDonald handled the Welshmen.

The game was handled by referees Phillip Henry and Bill Phillips. Blair MacDonald and Gerald Coffin were linesmen.

A large crowd attended and their comments on the new game were many and varied, particularly from the veteran English rugby fans.

Series Notes

NEW YORK AP)—By taking the world championship to Milwaukee, the Braves became the first club to win the world series on their first attempt since the gashouse gang Cardinals of 1926.

Only a half dozen others have accomplished that feat.

The other clubs did it before the owners began providing opportunities for such a distinction by moving franchises around. And, of course, several of these guys were around when the Braves won their second, and last, pennant for Boston in 1918.

The Yanks B-B combination that slugged out their sixth game victory—Bauer and Berra—had no more power than BB guns Thursday. Hank opened the game with a double, then flew out twice and grounded out once. Yogi drew an intentional pass and got on base another time on Ed Mathews' error, but he didn't get a hit and hoisted a high pop fly to Frank Torre at the start of the ninth.

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
