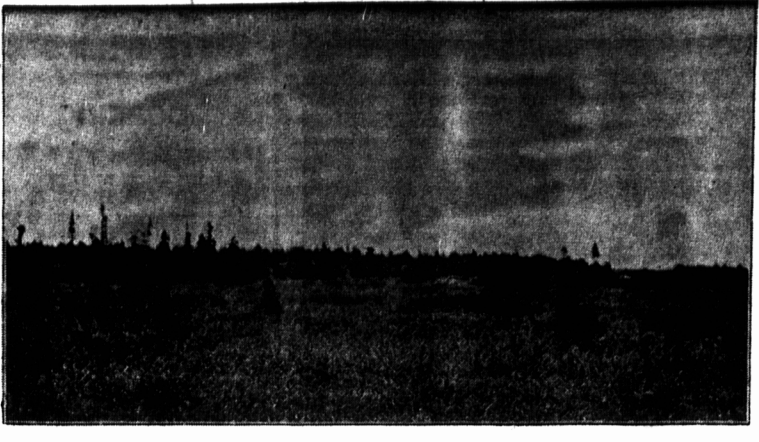

Mermaid Moss Factory An Oldtime Island Industry

In 1839 this Province could boast of a Moss Factory amongst its industries. This factory was founded at Mermaid by a Charlottetown merchant, John MacLeod, who was a native of Mermaid. The moss was gathered on a large peat bog and placed on trolley cars of a small railway which took it to the factory. It was then dried and pressed into bales and sold for horse bedding on the market.

The factory was built on land then owned by William Munn, but now owned by Russell Matheson. The moss grew on a swamp which was owned by the government to the south and west of Lake MacLeod in Mermaid. This beautiful thirty-acre lake fed the swamp moss which grew in abundance. The marsh, consisting of eighty-one and a half acres, was sold by the government for less than twenty-five dollars. The three men owned it as tenants in common not as joint tenants.

Continues Success As Organist In Edmonton

A host of friends and admirers throughout the Province will be pleased to learn that the success as a musician which Mr. Frank Johnson acquired as a church organist, choir master and instructor of school groups while here has continued since his removal to Edmonton, Alta. A recent Edmonton paper describes his early musical education in England where at the age of 15 he was appointed organist of a church in Harwood, Eng., and one year later when only 16 years old, he became one of the youngest graduates of Trinity College in London. While still in his teens, he was appointed choirmaster of St. James' Anglican Church in Bolton where he remained for three years, until the spring of 1940, when he joined the RAF.

Although Mr. Johnson served for six years with the RAF, he did not neglect his interest in music. During his military service of two years in Charlottetown, he frequently appeared as guest organist at Trinity United Church. He returned to England, but the people of Charlottetown didn't forget the young air force man's musical skill, and he was invited to return to the Maritime city as organist of Zion Presbyterian Church. With one foot in Canada, so to speak, he was naturally anxious to see something of the rest of the great dominion he was learning to call home. The opportunity came a little more than a year ago, when he was appointed organist and choir leader of McDougall United Church in Edmonton.

Mr. Johnson is a member of the faculty of Alberta College where he teaches piano, organ and music theory. He is a member of the Kiwanis club of Edmonton. His latest appointment is organist of "The Chapel of Chimes", western Canada's newest funeral home. It is so named because of the Maas tubular cathedral chimes featured in the chapel. THOUGHTS FOR OUR TIME

CHRISTIAN MUST DESIRE TO BE SOMETHING NEW "Put off the old man who is corrupted according to the desire of error, and be renewed in the spirit of your mind; and put on the new man, who according to God is created in justice and in truth" (Eph. 4:22-24).

These words of St. Paul are written on the gate through which all must pass who are to attain the end ordained for them by God. They contain the definition of that process which every man must undergo before that supernatural seed received at Baptism can mature and branch out to embrace the Omnipotent Creator of all that is.

A Christian must, therefore, be characterized by a willingness to change, to become something new, something different. By his very definition, a Christian must be discontent with what he now is and be marked by a strong determination to become something more.

Even men who lack religion, desire to change; to acquire skills they do not now possess, to cure vices and overcome bad habits. The Christian also desires to change in these ways, yet the desire to change which characterizes the Christian is something more and something radically different from this.

Whereas the man without religion looks to himself as both the cause and the term of the change, the Christian looks to God. Whereas the former desires a change to alter the nature of man and seeks as the term of the change to be merely a more perfect man, the latter seeks to become more than man, to reach out and grasp something totally beyond the power of man.

Instead, we must learn to judge all things in the light of Christ and make the prime motivating cause of all our actions to be the desire of reaching God and of being transformed by Him.

Until the decision is made, until the desire of changing in this way has taken hold of a person's will, that person can be no more than a Christian in name only. It is an essential part of Christianity that the universe and every creature in it is God-centered and not man-centered.
