The "Patriot" and the Franchise Bill.

It would indeed be strange if the editor of the Patriot should disapprove of the obstruction and unseemly babble of his political friends at Ottawa over the Franchise Bill.

There were several errors in THE EXAMINER'S article on the objections raised by Mr. L. H. Davies, M. P., to Sir John's motion that the poll books of last election should be made prima facie evidence of the rights of electors in this Province.

It is most unjust and most arbitrary, and calculated to impose a fine upon every man who seeks to get elected. What can he do, with 7,000 voters in the county, and with 1,500 to 2,000 of whom have voted on manhood suffrage?

Then, again, he doesn't like the revising barristers' clause. The barristers, he thinks, should be appointed by the courts. We decidedly think otherwise.

Then, the Patriot endorses and glories in the successful obstruction of the Grit Party to the public business of the country, and republishes the statement of the Guelph Mercury that the Conservative representatives of this Province have played "a contemptible part" in connection with the Franchise Bill.

As printed yesterday the words, "and my opponent would have to do it," were inadvertently left out. It will be noted that Mr. Davies is in a rather worse position than at first appeared; for he is guilty of saying—and that in Parliament—"the thing that is not."

TO-DAY we have the news that Mr. Gladstone has resigned. No doubt, the chief cause of his resignation is the divisions in his Cabinet, which are so great that the Government could not possibly present a united front to the country during an election contest.
