

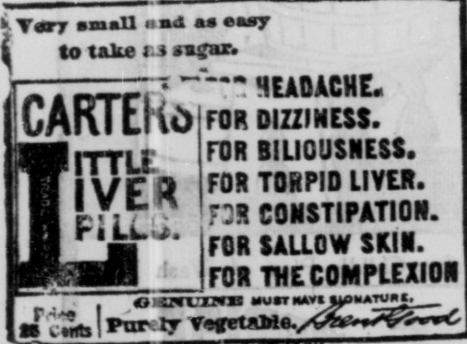

### THE APPROACHING ELECTION.

COMMENTING on the prospects of an election in October the Montreal Gazette remarks:

"It is true that Parliament has nearly eleven months of its legal existence before it, and that it would be possible to call the members together again at the usual time for another session. It is true, also, that some members are anxious for this to be done. There have been five sessions already, however, and the last one was not a profitable one, either for the country or the Government. Control of the House of Commons has passed out of the hands of the ministers. Business drifted; it was not directed. On occasions when it was important for the party that it should stick together members revolted and made an unfavorable impression of the Government's doing worse. There is not the slightest hope that another session would show an improvement in this respect, while if it did not it would leave the Government at its end on the verge of an appeal to the country without supply for 1901-2, and with another year's blunders to carry. There is not much to encourage the ministers in the hope that an election this fall will bring them anything but disaster; but there is nothing at all to indicate that a postponement to next summer would do ought but make the outlook worse. There is no surety about the date given. As has been said repeatedly, anything is possible with a government that does know its mind. Those who are interested would do well, however, to count on a September campaign and an October polling day.

These remarks are very much to the point. We are glad to note that conventions are to be held forthwith, and trust the various districts of the country will select good delegates, without prejudice, and that these delegates will nominate good men to contest the election in behalf of the Opposition to those who have added \$15,000,000 to the public expenditures and \$8,000,000 to the public debt, while they take from the pockets of the people as taxes \$12,500,000 more than their predecessors did. The need of prompt and united action on the part of the Opposition is imperative. Let it be well taken.

An exchange states that when the great depression which affected all the world was at its worst in the United States in 1893 and 1894 the savings banks deposits of the United States decreased \$7,000,000 in one year. Between 1896 and 1899 the savings banks deposits of the United States increased by \$482,000,000, or over \$160,000,000 a year. The figures for the whole of the United States for the year 1900 are not yet to hand, but those for the State of New York has just been published. On the 1st of July, 1895, New York's Savings bank deposits amounted to \$643,873,574. On the 1st of July, 1900, they amounted to \$922,081,596.

The Island Farmer: The fault is that we educate our girls to spend money and not to earn a living for themselves out of the resources which the province affords. They grow up in large numbers as mere parasites upon society, little help to their parents and no helpmate to a husband in their own station of life. Too many girls, whose mothers work hard, are fitted only upon leaving school for a life of leisure (which only wealth can supply) and refined companionship, which is not always to be secured in their family surroundings. They may have a good education, we admit, but not always of that sound type which makes the hands the worthy allies of the intellect.

### HONEST MILK.

Sir,—I want to suggest that the City Council do appoint a competent person to handle a Babcock milk-tester—to whom patrons and milk vendors could bring samples of their milk for testing. This is a progressive age and it ought to be an honest one. The gentlemen who vend pasteurized milk in this city say: he will guarantee that the milk he supplies contains 4 per cent. of butter fat. How are we to know that this is correct? The City must own a Babcock tester and appoint a competent man to operate it at the City's expense.

## THE BRITISH EMPIRE LEAGUE.

### Sir Charles Tupper's Speech at the Mansion House Meeting.

At the third annual meeting of the British Empire League held at the Mansion House in London, after the Duke of Devonshire, Sir C. Rivers Wilson and Lord Brassey had spoken, Sir Charles Tupper, in seconding the resolution heartily congratulating the Australian Governments and people upon the approaching establishment of the Commonwealth of Australia, remarked that, when assisting at the dinner which was given to Lord Brassey on his acceptance of the position of Governor of Victoria, he ventured to express the hope that his Lordship would be the last Governor appointed under similar circumstances to that colony, for the reason that he hoped and believed that by the time Lord Brassey's period of office had expired he would be succeeded by a Governor General of the great Commonwealth of Australia. (Cheers.) He was glad to know that that hope had been realized. As one of the few remaining persons who had helped to originate and carry through the confederation of Canada, he was able to speak with authority as to the advantages of confederation to the people of Australia. Since confederation Canada has advanced by leaps and bounds. What were once isolated, weak and scattered provinces had now been united into one harmonious whole; while from east to west ran the Canadian Pacific Railway. The late Mr. Bayard, United States Ambassador to Great Britain, has said that the construction of that great railway from ocean to ocean had brought the United States face to face with a nation. Proceeding, Sir Charles said he had been glad to hear Mr. Buxton bear eloquent testimony to the valuable services rendered by the Imperial Federation League, which was established by the late Mr. Forster in 1884. The League had performed two great services. In the first place, by the employment of Dr. Parkin to lecture in Great Britain and Australia, they had enabled the people to realize the value of a united Empire. Then, after careful examination of the whole question, they had arrived at the conclusion that the federation of the Empire upon a parliamentary system was impossible.

Sir Charles then went on to speak of the assistance which had been rendered by Canada and the other colonies in the South African war. When in Boston recently some one had suggested to him that Canada was not united on this question. His reply to that was that there were cranks in every country. The state of feeling, however, could be best gauged by the fact that the vote for the South Africa contingents was carried in the House of Commons with only three dissentments. The way in which the colonies had come forward at this crisis had, Sir Charles said, been a surprise not to the Mother Country alone, but to the whole world. What was it that caused this patriotic zeal? It was not religion, it was not language, for they differed in various parts of the Empire, but it sprang from the solid foundations of a desire to sustain the crown of the grandest Queen that ever sat upon a throne, and whose sovereignty was a security for life and liberty that was to be found nowhere else.

### Legation Life at Peking.

All of these legation compounds are surrounded by high brick walls that effectually cut off the sights, and most of the sounds and smells, from without, but there are numerous back gates and narrow passages, and no other city in the world offers such facilities for 'underground' means of communication. The British legation is adjoined on the west by the Imperial carriage yards, and on both north and south by the compounds of friendly Chinese, while one of its back gates opens into a native market. So it is unlikely, if it were besieged, that there would be any difficulty in smuggling in ample supplies and provisions, and it could hardly lack for water, since there are no less than six or eight wells within the legation grounds. There are in the British legation not only the establishment of the minister and separate establishments for the first and second secretaries, but extensive quarters and barracks for consular students and military escorts, the minister's private stables, and general stables for the rest of the legation. The legation, in fact, is such a large establishment that it has its own doctor and hospital and its own chapel and chaplain. The other legations except the American are all maintained on the same general plan, though not on so elaborate a scale.—Leslie's Weekly.
