MONTREAL (CP) — Toronto Maple Leafs, hustling every minute of the way, outskated Montreal Canadiens by a wide margin Thursday night and handed the National Hockey League leaders a sound 6-3 thumping.

Frank Mahovich and Dick Duff led the last-place Leafs in the goal-scoring spree with two each, while Tim Horton and Gerry Egan counted the others.

Defenceman I. A. Cushman, Dickie Moore and Ralph Backstrom scored for the Canadiens who, for the second time since the new year, have gone four straight games without a win. The present winless string embraces two ties and two losses.

Goalie, Jacques Plante, currently the NHL's leading netminder, had to leave the game after the second period because of a groin injury which had bothered him from the start. The

PUT A COLLEGE TEAM with limited ability against a much better team and you would expect the collegians would take a trouncing. That's true some of the time but there are many exceptions and Wednesday at Saint Dunstan's rink saw one of those exceptions. The fast-skating Aces from Summerside, the Aces who made shambles of the C and D league for such a long time, fell victims to the Red and Whites in a game that spectators will tell you was easily the most thrilling of the season.

Those who follow hockey at Saint Dunstan's will assure you that this year's edition of the Saints is certainly not one to get very excited about. They have looked anything but good in their previous games and they were supposed to be no match for the sturdy veterans. It was a game that was on the schedule and Aces and Saints did their part by showing up in order that the contest would be played as arranged.

AGAINST MOUNT ALLISON three weeks ago, Saint Dunstan's ran up a 3-0 lead in the first, then wilted badly in the closing stages. They lost that one 7-4. In their second last Charlotteville and District league start they led Garrison Juniors 3-0 but eventually lost the battle when the Juniors fired five unanswered tallies. On Wednesday they got a great 4-0 jump on the Summerside team in the opening period but the same story seemed ready to be retold. The Aces got two back in the second and by the 14-minute mark of the third had matters knotted at 4-4. Saints were doomed again to defeat. At least that's what everyone thought, except the Saints themselves.

THEY STARTED thinking what they did before they should be able to do again. They had scored four big markers in that opening session, so surely they could pick up one to put them in front. That was one problem facing them. The other was keeping the Aces from adding to that 4-0.

Exactly 85 seconds after Aces had knotted the whole affair, Saints were back on Ronnie MacDougall's doorstep and Jackie MacDonald beat the young netminder for what proved to be the winning tally.

The Aces stormed to the attack at this reverse. They kept pouring in but a stout S.D.U. defence plus fine goal tending by Earl Shephard proved too much for the surprised westerners to overcome. It ended 5-4 and Saints had their first victory of the 1958-59 season.

THE ACES had lost two games in the league before this one. Both Royals and Tars had grabbed decisions from them. But this one at Saint Dunstan's was the greatest humiliation the Steelmen had yet encountered. It was really hard to believe and Aces' players wore a puzzled look as they skated off the ice when the battle had ended.

Yes, Saint Dunstan's had certainly come through with a great victory and if they don't win another all season, you won't hear too much beefing. That victory Wednesday night was a mighty large one for the collegians and it won't be forgotten in a hurry.

WE HAVE ALWAYS maintained that a college team has an abundance of something called spirit that you just don't find in other clubs. Saint Dunstan's squad was loaded with this on Wednesday and it proved too much for the speedy Prince County boys. The Saints showed a real impudence and it must have annoyed the Aces to no end. They gave the Summerside crew the impression that they (Saints) were as good as anybody else. They played their entire game with this attitude and it was the formula for success.

Yes, Aces were downright embarrassed by the loss. But we think Saints were in a mood Wednesday night that they would have made any league entry nervous. They were doing things they weren't supposed to be doing, one of which was sinking five markers.

The other clubs are probably laughing at the Aces' misfortune but let them take heed. If the Red and Whites display similar form in their outings then Royals, Tars and Garrison Juniors are in for some very interesting evenings.

ACES could have the laugh on these other clubs before this schedule is completed.

THE SAINTS get their next taste of action on Tuesday at the Sports Arena with the Navy Tars as their opponents. Once again the collegians will be definite underdogs.

Right the Tars look like a tough team to beat. In all their recent games, they have displayed plenty of class. However, we expect the Navy to have a much tougher time than when they clashed with the Red and White on January 21. That night the Tars walloped the collegians 11-1.

It shouldn't be such a wallowing this time. Navy well knows the Saints are a far cry from that outfit that fell such easy victims to them a few weeks ago.

Things are sure picking up in this league.

Alas and Alack, four weeks ago the Aces were the talk of Island hockey fans. The only fault anyone could find with them was that they beat the opposition by scores that were too lopsided. Then the ballyhoo balloon started slowly to lose air, and at the fine, new Saint Dunstan's rink on Wednesday evening it finally burst with a bang that could be heard for miles. There's one consolation left. The Aces can go nowhere but up.

Well, maybe we shouldn't write that saga of the Aces yet. The last chapter is the only one that really matters in a story. We've seen Mike Hammer trussed up in an old cabin that was going up in flames? But in the nick of time he thought of something to get him out of there. The Saints trussed our Aces up Wednesday night and those ornery bad men from the Charlottetown Navy are galloping down here tonight with the matches and gasoline. Whether the Aces will end up raw, rare, or well-done is the big question to be settled at Civic Stadium tonight.

Every man jack of those Aces are thoroughly disgusted with their showing of late, and fighting mad to show their fans and also those who hoot that they are not the morning glories they have been accused of being. The Aces would rather beat the Navy tonight than win an Irish sweepstake. They're all keyed up, and figure that a victory over those high and mighty sailors who beat the Saints only a week ago by the score of 11-1, would redeem them in the eyes of sport fans. We think it is a very important game, and may be the detour that will take the Aces off the highway that leads to the port of derelicts and also-rans.

In other years, some of them used to go Intermediate "B" It should be fairly obvious to everyone that an all-star team coming from Charlottetown with three times the population of Summerside might quite fairly be put in a higher classification. On the other hand, we'd like to see the two centres battle it out in a final series for supremacy, especially if the Aces could make it interesting, but on this point many fans must be beginning to have very serious doubts.

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Parkdale Royals Defeat Orin Carver's Juniors 6-3

Allie Carver went on a scoring spree last evening, picking up four goals and assisting on two others in leading the Charlottetown Royals to a 6-3 victory over Orin Carver's Garrison Juniors. The other two goals for the Royals were scored by linemate Angie Carroll.

The first period saw the Royals outscore the Juniors 3 goals to 2. Allie Carver picking up all three goals: Vince Mulligan and Donnie MacCormack were the marksmen for the Juniors.

Royals scored two unanswered goals in the middle stanza, Carver and Carroll shared the honors. Both goalies Dillon for the Royals and Ward for the Juniors were outstanding in some steps.

In the opening period a goal scored by A. Carver was protested by the Juniors as being no goal. The referees after some dispute ruled it valid and the Juniors skated off the ice, protesting the referee ruling. Minutes later, however, they were back on the ice to continue the game.

Juniors' only marker in the final frame was scored by Mer-

When I started gunning for ducks in the early nineteen hundreds there were just four species of ducks to be found in my hunting area. Blacks, Blue and Green-wing teal and Ring-necked ducks. For want of a better name we called them white-winged teal. Father used to speak of a flight of grey ducks that visited the Old Home Lake around the middle of September. From what I have learned since I think they must have been Pintail as this species is becoming

water and some yards farther on the round hole in the snow from whence she had been lifted.

RECALL EVENTS
A week or so ago I talked to Hedley Jenkins, Mount Allison, an old school mate of mine. He told me that Harry shot the duck with an old single barreled muzzle loader he had borrowed from him when he saw the ducks alight in the swamp creek. As I mentioned winter black ducks were a rarity in those days. In January 1926, when I was farming at Mount Allison I saw a flock of 7 or 9 blacks. I don't remember which without looking up my old diary, flying nor east in the direction of Peakes and the head of the Morell river. It was at sundown on a clear, frosty evening well below zero. I had finished the chores and had stopped at the pump to empty the water from the horse tub when I saw the ducks. It was a typical winter night in the making. The barn cracked with the frost and the ducks gave me the impression they were homeless and forlorn so clearly outlined against the blue sky to the eastward already assuming the dark tinge of night.

I learned later that they, or a
