A scheme is on foot in Halifax for the erection of a first-class hotel. The building is to be of brick, and the cost will be in the vicinity of \$30,000.

The steamer Fastnet, Captain Crews, left on return to Halifax via intermediate ports, at five o'clock last evening, with a cargo of oats, potatoes and lobsters, and one passenger.

No such harvest has been gathered in the west of Prince County for twenty years as is now being stored. Wheat, oats and barley are equally good; and also look well.

A Kentucky girl named Agnes Rankin put on a man's attire, hired out as a farm hand in Crockett county, and engaged herself to marry three farmers' daughters before she was discovered.

Graham, the cooper who floated through Niagara rapids in a barrel five years ago, is at present at Niagara Falls. He says that he and a man named Burns, belonging to Liverpool, intend swimming the rapids shortly.

Mr. A. E. Morrison, of the Anglo-American Telegraph Company, laid, on Wednesday last, a cable across the Hillsborough River for the P. E. Island Telephone Company. It is for telephone extension throughout Belfast.

There is a good deal of excitement in Quebec over the discovery of a stowaway named McCall, who hid in the hold of the steamer Colina, twelve days out from Glasgow. The man was alive but almost a skeleton, not having anything to eat or drink during that time.

This morning, when R. R. Fitzgerald, Esq., J. P. for the Province, was hearing of a prosecution presented by Conductor Ryan, of the Island Railway, against Robert Ellis, sr., of O'Leary, for obstructing him in the lawful performance of his duty, was adjourned until the 10th inst.

A meeting of Ministers and Christian workers will be held in the M. C. A. parlors to-morrow evening for the purpose of welcoming Mr. E. Wells Bliss to this city, and making final arrangements for his special services to be held during the coming week. In consequence of this meeting, the class for instruction in connection with the Sunday School Teachers' Association will be suspended on that evening.

Mr. Henry McCaull, of North Bedeque, had a 3-lb. bag of Prize Oats and a 3-lb. bag of Banner Oats sent him by Professor Saunders, from the Experimental Farm this spring. We learn from the Prize Oats that he threshed out 44 lbs. which weighed 44 lbs. to the bushel, and from the Banner 66 lbs. which weighed 37 lbs. to the bushel. So says the Sumnerite Farmer.

Ottawa advises of the 3rd prize that Captain Longworth, Sergt. Davison and Corpl. Baird were among the prize winners in the previous day's shooting. Captain Longworth and Corpl. Baird each made 31 points in the Rideau matches, and Sergt. Davison stands thirty-eighth in the Snider aggregate for those making the highest score in the McDougall, manufacturers' aggregate of militia, Dominion and standing matches, with 228 points.

A son of Mr. Peter Quigley, of Summerside, got somewhat badly hurt last Monday evening. He was leading a horse about dusk when the horse ran away and dragged the little boy some distance. The boy's face is badly swollen and it is thought that the animal struck the boy with his knee. Another little boy was on the horse's back and young Quigley held tightly on to the horse till his comrade got safely off—Farmer.

On the 29th ult., James Stewart of St. Peter's Road, was convicted by T. A. Dougan and A. McDonald, J. P.s, of having obstructed Alex. McGregor and John McDonald in the discharge of their duty as Reeves, and was fined \$10 with costs, \$9 more, and in default of payment forthwith to be imprisoned one month. Immediately after conviction he was committed to goal under warrant of the Justices. Yesterday, Stewart was brought up by the keeper of the goal under a writ of habeas corpus, before Mr. Justice Hodgson, who granted the writ on application of J. T. Bellish, Esq. for Stewart, Mr. Meilish moved for the discharge of the prisoner on the grounds, among others, that the commitment did not show for what the reeve was appointed, but simply that the offence was committed at Lot 35; that the conviction could not have been a legal conviction, and that it did not appear that the fine and costs were not paid. Mr. Peter opposed the motion and asked for adjournment. His Lordship stated that he considered the warrant undoubtedly bad, and ordered the discharge of the prisoner.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Another Division in the Commons.

GOVERNMENT MAJORITY, 22.

An Excellent Measure Introduced by Premier Abbott.

OTTAWA, Sept. 4. The debate on Cartwright's want of confidence motion was continued in the House of Commons all yesterday's session and until three o'clock this morning, when a vote was taken. The motion was defeated by 103 to 81, the Government majority being 22.

In the Senate, yesterday, Mr. Abbott introduced a bill to prevent frauds. The design of the measure is to punish public officials who accept bribes and people who may attempt to bribe them. Contractors who give bribes are debarred from government contracts.

LANGELIER EATS HUMBLE PIE

Withdraws Every Charge Against the Conservative Senator.

Cochrane Acquitted.

OTTAWA, Sept. 4. Before the Senate Railway Committee, yesterday, proceedings in the Bay Chaleur case were closed. Langelier addressed the committee and made a pitiable exhibition of himself. Before concluding, he was forced to retract every charge he had preferred against Senator Robitaille and to eat his own words. He tried to shelter himself under his imperfect knowledge of the English language, and said he had been misunderstood and his language incorrectly translated. The evidence before the special committee of the House of Commons completely acquits Cochrane of charges of selling appointments to officers made against him by Annias Cameron.

RICHMOND, Que., Sept. 4. In the Dominion match Sapper Moore and Sergt. Davison won \$6 each; in the Rideau match, Captain Longworth and Corpl. Baird won \$5 each; in the Quinnet match, Sergt. B. C. Prowse won \$5, and Sergt. Davison \$5. In the Snider aggregate Capt. Hooper won good prizes in 500 and 800 yards. In the extra series Lieut. E. A. Smith of John, won the Governor-General prize with 94 points, and Sergt. Rolston a second. Jas. Dover tied for third.

TORONTO, Sept. 4.—10 a. m. Winds mostly southerly, fair, stationary or higher temperature; some local showers or night or to-morrow.

Fishery Bulletin.

(Fisheries Intelligence Bureau Report.) HALIFAX, Sep. 3.—Quebec—Good catches of cod are reported to-day at Shelldrake, St. John's River and Seven Islands, and fair at Magpie, Long Point and Moisie. Lunenburg plentiful at Thunder River, Long Point, Seven Islands and St. Marguerite, and good at Shelldrake and Moisie. Cape Breton—owing to scarcity of bait and heavy weather at Lunenburg all fishing suspended to-day. Small mackerel are taking hooks at St. Peter's and at Arichat, and a few herring in nets at the latter. Nova Scotia—Cod are reported plentiful off shore and mackerel and herring scarce at Lunenburg. No other reports received to-night. New Brunswick—The only reports received to-day is from Port Escuminac, where but few mackerel are being taken. P. E. Island—Fair catches of mackerel were made at Mimmingash yesterday and to-day, and a few taken at Georgetown. Hake are reported very plentiful and cod fair at the latter.

Telegraphic News.

EDINBURGH, Sept. 2.—The recent storms which swept over the British Isles have half ruined the crops throughout Scotland, and the harvest is at a complete standstill. DUBLIN, Sept. 2.—The river Barrow, in Waterford, is overflowing its banks and destroying the crops. Houses and barns have been swept away, and great distress exists. BOSTON, Sept. 2.—The supreme court to-day sent down a decision that the Boston Chamber of Commerce must pay Neil McNeill \$14,500, which is the amount of damages that a jury found for McNeill some months ago in consequence of being refused the contract to build the new chamber of commerce building in Boston. McNeill was the lowest bidder for the contract. BRADFORD, Pa., Sept. 2.—A suicide mania has taken possession of the aged members of the local agnostic circle here. It was founded by the late Dr. Stuart, who himself led the way by taking his own life. Since then three other members of the circle have tried to kill themselves. Two succeeded. The last case occurred yesterday when Elias Hensley, aged 66, took a dose of poison and died from the effects.

TRICKS IN ALL TRADES.—The Halifax Recorder says: This morning a truckman was carrying a barrel reported to be swill, down a gangway from the steamer Halifax, from Boston. He slipped, and the barrel fell and overturned. Out of its mouth fell a lot of debris, refined biscuit, vegetables, etc., and they were accompanied by a number of boxes of cigarettes, which greeted the eyes of customs officers Geldert, who confiscated them.
