NOTICE TO INCORPORATED COMPANIES

Mayor Key To Re-Offer; Morrison Withdrawing

SUMMERSIDE — Mayor George Key, Jr., announced yesterday that he will re-offer for the position of chief magistrate in the civic election here February 22.

In a surprise move Councillor J. Ernest Morrison stated he will not be offering for the mayoralty. When he ran for councillor last year, Councillor Morrison stated he wanted to get back into town business in preparation for the mayoralty race this year.

Mr. Morrison's announcement gave pressure of business as his reason for not offering. As president of P.E.I. Concrete Products, he stated "I am far too busy at this time to offer but perhaps another year I will". He added that at this time his plant is in the midst of a big change-over.

He is in his ninth year on the council, having served seven as councillor and two as mayor. He was defeated in the last mayoral race by retired mayor W. E. Jenkins.

Although only 34 years of age, Mayor Key has been on the council for six years and for the past five months has been serving as mayor due to Mayor Jenkins' retirement for health reasons.

When first elected to the council at the age of 29, Mayor Key was the youngest man in the history of the town to be elected.

To date only one other person has declared his intentions to offer for the top civic position. Councillor Eric Johnstone announced some time ago that he would offer for mayor but about a month ago there was some doubt as to his intentions due to health reasons. However, he stated yesterday the condition of his health would not prevent him from running.

With these announcements only one councillor remains undecided. Councillor Grant Mollison has yet to declare his intentions.

10 City Students To Visit Quebec

One hundred high school students from nine Maritime cities will exchange visits with 100 French speaking high school students from the Province of Quebec during the period of July 7 to the 21 living with his or her partner in Quebec where he will be required to speak French as much as possible and to learn something about the French way of life. Then, on July 21, the Maritime students will return home with their French speaking partners for a two-week period during which time the French Canadian students will be required to speak English as much as possible.

To be eligible, Maritime students must have studied French for at least two years, be between 15 and 18 years of age and have a sincere desire to improve their ability to speak French. The CCCJ will subsidize the fare of the students. The cost of their visit will be \$25.00 return to their destination in Quebec. Their only other expense will be pocket money. There is no charge for room and board because it is an exchange visit.
