The Miramichi comes here, and lands numbers of passengers, and quantities of goods, direct from Montreal, every quarter of which is said to be infected, and we submit that in the case of this vessel some quarantine regulation should immediately be applied. To allow passengers and goods to be promiscuously landed direct from the infected city is nothing less than courting infection, and if we do not want the plague in our midst, it is necessary to exercise some caution against its being brought in the Montreal boat.—Journal.

The Caroline Dispute.

BERLIN, Aug. 28.

A special commission from Spain to confer with the German Government regarding the Caroline Islands has arrived in this city.

MADRID, Aug. 28.

The Caroline Islands have not been seized by Germany. They are to be occupied by Spanish troops directly. The troops have arrived at Gap, the principal island in the group.

The Triple Alliance.

VIENNA, Aug. 28.

The New Free Press prints an account of an interview with M. De Giers, Russian Minister of Foreign Affairs, which says the Royal meeting at Kremsier cemented the triple alliance, and that the Emperor William was present in spirit though not in body. M. De Giers thought the questions at issue between England and Russia were in a fair way of being settled amicably.

Agrarian Outrages.

DUBLIN, Aug. 28.

Agrarian outrages are increasing fearfully in King County.

A magistrate and one hundred police went to Ballyfairshy, Kilkenny County, yesterday, to evict tenants. When they arrived the Chapel bell tolled. Two thousand persons assembled and attacked the officers. Many on both sides were stabbed.

The Cardwell Election.

MONTREAL, Aug. 28.

Yesterday, another great victory for the Conservative party occurred in Cardwell. Hon. Thomas White, the new Minister of the Interior was elected by a handsome majority—about four hundred and fifty. The Grits worked hard for their nominee—Dr. Allison.

Aquatic.

GENEVA, N. Y., Aug. 28.

In the rowing regatta to-day, Hanlan won easily in 21.38, McKay second and Hosmer third. The consolation race was won by Lee, with Ten Eyck second. Hanlan refused to make a double scull match between himself and Lee, and Courtney and Couley.

The Buchunaland Expedition.

LONDON, Aug. 26.

The British Government has recalled Sir Charles Warren, leader of the Buchunaland expedition, and appointed as his successor Judge Shippeno, of Cape Colony Bench.

Cholera in France and Spain.

MARSEILLES, Aug. 28.

Mortality from cholera in this city continues to decrease.

There were 4,777 new cases of cholera and 1,498 deaths from the disease in Spain yesterday.

To Vindicate Spanish Honor.

MADRID, Aug. 28.

It is reported that Don Carlos has offered the government of Spain the services of 100,000 Carlists to vindicate Spanish honor against Germany.

A Military College for India.

BOMBAY, Aug. 28.

The Gazette says Lord Randolph Churchill has sanctioned the establishment in India of a Military College similar to that at Sandhurst.

Disastrous Fire.

ROME, Aug. 28.

An explosion in a fireworks factory in this city yesterday led to a disastrous fire. Several persons were killed and many injured.

The Marshall Islands.

LONDON, Aug. 28.

A Berlin despatch to the Daily News says Germany will soon assume protectorate over the Marshall Islands.
