PARLIAMENT OF CANADA.

Hon. Mr. Foster's Able Speech.

A PREMIER OUGHT TO KEEP HIS PLEDGES.

Hollowness and Insincerity of the Government.

OTTAWA, Feb. 8.—In the House of Commons, yesterday, Hon. Mr. Foster's speech was the feature. He laid down the principle that the leader of a party should keep his pledges to the electorate when he came into power. Sir Charles Tupper had criticised the Premier's stewardship of eighteen months, and not one word had Sir Wilfrid Laurier ventured to say in reply. Instead he rose, in almost childish anger, seeming to have an idea that ailaution of eighteen months must continue to take the place of criticism. Mr. Foster, in an able speech, showed how Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his chieftains of the Grit party had violated their pledges. The hollowness and insincerity of their professions in the preferential tariff matter was strongly set forth.

Sir Richard Cartwright spoke briefly, and Sir Hibbert Tupper made a stinging reply. A Conservative caucus will be held on Wednesday morning.

BRITISH PARLIAMENT.

Forecast of the Queen's Speech.

Pacific Reference to the Chinese Matter.

LONDON, Feb. 8.—The following forecast of the Speech from the Throne on the meeting of Parliament has been announced. Referring to China, the Queen will speak favorably of the pacific relations between the Powers, and will then point out the satisfaction experienced at the conclusion of the treaty of peace between Greece and Turkey.

Dealing with India, complimentary allusions will be made to the valor and loyalty of the British-Indian troops.

The first place in the estimates is the development of army needs and the chief bills promised will be one providing local government for Ireland and the London Municipalities bill.

The Daily News says that the settlement of claims by the Behring Sea Arbitration Commission will give an opportunity for a cordial reference to the United States, whose sympathetic attitude on the Chinese question has testified to a better feeling between Great Britain and America than was expected at the opening of the last two sessions of Parliament.

It is pleasing to observe by the report of the recent practical chemistry examinations in the Faculty of Medicine at McGill University, that Mr. C. H. Dalton, of Tignish and Mr. J. E. Flemtaing, also of this province, won first year honors. In the past list we observe the names of four other students from this province, Messrs. J. J. Blake, J. Blaquiere, H. J. Hughes, and E. J. Mullally.

BACK FROM THE KLONDIKE.—Mr. J. W. Boyle, of Dawson City, is in Ottawa. Mr. Boyle left Dawson for the Dalton trail on September 25, and is reported in Dawson as lost. He was 58 days on the Dalton trail and travelled for 18 days on snowshoes. Mr. Boyle says if a man can take out a good outfit and provisions for 18 months, he can make money by going to Dawson. Work is plentiful, and men are scarce. Wages are \$1.50 per hour and lodgings \$1.50 per night. Nearly everyone lives in tents. When he left there were upwards of 1,600 people under canvas. Mr. Boyle has made his pile. He is part owner in four good claims in the Klondike.

—It is pointed out that Mr. Hughes, is himself a large city taxpayer. The taxpayers interests are therefore his interests, and will be safe-guarded by him.

CITY SCHOOL BOARD.—The regular monthly meeting of the City School Board was held last evening. The teachers' reports showed the enrolment for January to be 1375. The highest percentage of attendance in West Kent was in Miss Ashley's room, 91; fewest cases of tardiness in Miss Wadman's, Miss Ashley's and Mr. Owen's, two cases in each; in Prince Street, Miss Harris', 95; fewest cases of tardiness, Miss Snaddon's, Miss Scott's and Miss Gregor's, none; Queen Square, highest percentage, Miss Farmer's, 92; tardiness, Mr. Smith's, five. There was no action taken with regard to the appointment of a teacher of vocal music.

MONUMENT TO DR. WALL.—A very handsome monument is to be placed over the grave of Dr. Wall in the cemetery at Kinkora. The monument will be 10 feet 7 inches high, and the first and second bases will be of freestone. The bust, which will be of finest marble, will rest on these. The roof over the bust will be supported by four granite columns, and the whole will be surmounted by a Celtic cross. The work is being performed by Mr. Antoine Vincent, in his studio on Dorchester Street.
