Wrist-Slapping Reported In 'Flying Circus' Event

OTTAWA (CP)—RCAP headquarters has administered a sharp wrist-slapping to RCAF air division headquarters in Europe for putting on a special air show for the survivors of Baron Manfred von Richthofen's, First World War "flying circus," informed sources said here.

The defence department and air force headquarters declined to discuss the incident officially, apparently on the grounds that West Germany is a NATO ally of Canada.

But it was learned on good authority that air division headquarters at Metz, France, was rebuked for its red-carpet welcome of Richthofen's old squadron and also for not telling RCAF headquarters in advance of its plans.

Massey Medal Is Presented

OTTAWA (CP)—Governor-General Vanier said Wednesday that Dr. Diamond Jenness of Ottawa "has staked his claim to a place in the tradition of great pioneers."

The Governor-General made the statement when he presented the former chief of the anthropological division of the National Museum with the Massey medal for 1962 of the Royal Geographical Society.

The citation to Dr. Jenness, 76, said he has made "an outstanding contribution to our knowledge of Indians and Eskimos through numerous scientific expeditions which he has undertaken from coast to coast and in the Arctic."

The New Zealand native was appointed anthropologist to the Canadian Arctic expedition led by Dr. Vilhjalmur Stefansson. He studied various Indian tribes and conducted archaeological excavations in Alaska and Newfoundland in 1926 and 1927.

NFLD. CLAIMS CNR INCURSES

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—Has the CNR spoiled the name of its new passenger-cargo vessel correctly or incorrectly?

Many Newfoundlanders think the CNR—which spelled it Taverer—is wrong.

The ship, launched at Colliwood, Ont., Monday by the wife of federal Works Minister Walker, bears a name commemorating a Second World War Newfoundland tragedy, and will go into use on Newfoundland's rugged coastline.

It is named after the late captain Benjamin Taverer (or Taverner), skipper of the Caribou, a 2,200-ton vessel which operated between Sydney, N.S., and Fort aux Basques, Nfld., during the war.

About dawn of Oct. 14, 1942, a German submarine scored a direct hit on the Caribou. A total of 137 persons, including the captain and two of his sons, went down with the ship.

But how should the name be spelled? Most people, including relatives of the captain living here, say it's Taverer.

And local CNR officials agreed, until they began checking their personal files. They came up with the birth certificate of a Taverer who turned out to be son of the captain.

Proponents of Taverer argue the name was probably spelled wrong on the birth certificate, and point to newspaper stories of the tragedy. They — and The Canadian Press — called it Taverner.

At any rate, the CNR resisted the 310-ton vessel's historic name.

HISTORIC COLLEGE
King's College at Windsor, N.S., now associated with Dalhousie University at Halifax, was Canada's first university in 1827.

Uranium Output Down This Year

OTTAWA (CP)—Eldorado Mining and Refining Limited announced Wednesday that Canadian uranium deliveries for the first quarter of 1962 totalled 2,148 tons of uranium oxide valued at \$44,782,094.

Deliveries for the corresponding period last year were 2,744 tons valued at \$52,250,930.

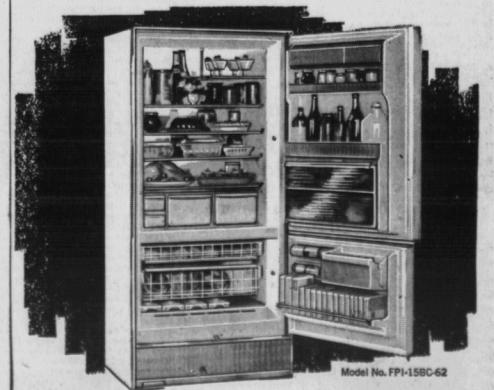

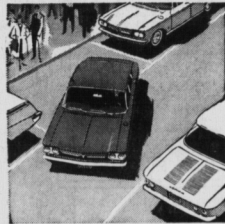
