

The Oddfellows' Entertainment.

"OUR ODDFELLOWS" had their annual entertainment in Market Hall last evening. The Hall was made as attractive as possible; and, although the weather was unfavorable, there was a "full house." The Lieutenant-Governor, with his suite, honored the occasion with his presence. Mr. J. P. Irving acted as chairman. Mr. Earle presided at the piano, and played the accompaniment in his faultless style. The entertainment was well opened by the Quintette Club, though Mr. F. Mitchell, with his "sweet flute," was missed. Then followed the opening ode of the brethren, entitled "Friendship, Love and Truth." Instead of an address by the Chairman, Professor Caven sang the "Good Rhine Wine," and, as usual, brought down the house. After this, Mr. L. J. Williams sang a beautiful song, entitled "Where are the Hopes I cherished?"—his effort being equal to that of any of those by which he has obtained his high reputation. In the absence of Mr. W. C. DesBrisay, who was to have given a reading, Dr. Creamer sang "Killarney"—one of the most exquisite of songs. The Doctor is certainly one of the best vocalists we have, and we regret that he does not often favor us in the way he did last night. Mr. Rogers, of Montreal, then favored the audience with a comic song about "babies," and, for an encore, gave another about "twins." By this time those present were in anything but a proper frame of mind to appreciate the exquisite violin solo played by Mr. Vinnicombe. This was evident by the fact that the applause which greeted his masterly effort was faint, when compared with that with which they received more trash, rendered in the lively style of a popular singer. Mr. B. Davies, Jr., sang in character, the comic song about the "Limerick Races"; and Dr. Creamer followed with the good advice to "Look always on the Sunny Side of Things." Then came the stump speech by our punning friend Leonard—a great original effort. The "Skidmore Guards," by Mr. Williams, was a laughable character; and the "Rhein Waltzes," by the Quintette Club, were really beautiful. The remaining portion of the entertainment was creditable neither to the performers nor the audience. Good wholesome manly fun is always appreciated; but it is as astonishing as it is painful, to see an intelligent and respectable audience receive with apparent rapture, sickly puerilities about babies, nonsensical profanity about hen-pecked tailors, and downright "smut." We greatly regret that Messrs. Maynard, Williams and Longworth should have so prostituted their fine talents, and still more, that a large portion of the audience so far forgot themselves as to applaud where they should have hissed or remained silent. A stranger in the town would not, we fear, form a very high opinion of the taste of the town from the exhibition of last evening. We hope that, in future, the programme, as prepared, will be strictly adhered to.

Bismarck has neuralgia. The Emperor William advises the Czar to stay three months at Livadia, for his health, but the Czar declines to do so. King Theobald is not dead, but suffering from a dangerous malady. A great strike of Pennsylvania coal miners is feared. After the Afghan defeat at Ghuzni, there was some skirmishing, but the country around Cabul is quiet. The "Journal de St. Petersburg" invites Prof. Mariten's to discontinue his lectures on Central Asia, in which he advocates Anglo-Russian understanding in that region for the benefit of trade and the progress of humanity, because, as the "Journal" declares, the English Press is manifestly callous on the subject. It is expected that the Welland Canal will be open by Friday. Senator Brown is recovering. The "Times" Cabul despatch says: In consequence of the difficulty of ejecting Abdul Raham Khan from the strong position he already holds in Turkistan, and the evident preference for him of many influential chief, the idea of making him Ameer gains ground.
