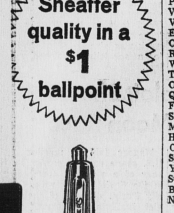
Local X-Ray Technicians Place Second

City's Enclosed Reservoir Fast Reaching 'In Use' Stage

The new 2,000,000 gallon Charlottetown reservoir is nearing the "in use" stage. Work surrounding the inside of the concrete walls, stretches an estimated 50 miles. The vast concrete vault has acoustics that cause a sound to continue for minutes after it is made. With a diameter of 160 feet, the eight-inch concrete roof is supported by 60 concrete pillars 16 inches in diameter and about 17 feet high.

The reservoir is safety equipped with overflow pipes to hold the water level at 16 feet and with drain pipes to empty it if necessary. In this event the water would flow into an ancient open reservoir nearby.

The whole great mass of concrete will be fully encased in earth with four feet of piled and leveled across the top for insulation to maintain even water temperature.

The reservoir was one of the most important phases in the implementation of the Pilotometer on the water situation in the city. The project was headed by chairman Sidney Green of the Water Commissioners said it guarantees the city a supply for all purposes for years to come. The water will leave the reservoir by a 20-inch main for distribution in Charlottetown.

New Dragger Arrives At Georgetown

GEORGETOWN — Recently launched in Bathurst, N.B., from the shipyard of Bathurst Marine Limited is the new dragger "Gulf Galant", arrived in Georgetown last week, under the command of Capt. J. G. Galt. The Gulf Galant is at present classified as a hull and will be finished in Georgetown by Bathurst Marine Ltd.

Here workers will install the engine, do the finishing work on the wheelhouse, crews quarters and install galley facilities. All so installed here will be line aluminum racks or trays known as pen boards, which are installed in the hold of the ship for storing the fish catch.

The ship is docked at the Railway Wharf. It is expected that she will soon be joined by the dragger "Gulf Garden" launched in Bathurst only several days ago. The Gulf Garden will also be towed here for extensive completion work.

Two Ferry Services Report Heavy Traffic

Heavy traffic was reported over the Thanksgiving Day weekend by both the CNR Ferry Service at Borden, and Northumberland Ferries Ltd., at Wood Islands.

Capt. Claude Hunter, president of Northumberland Ferries Ltd., said the traffic was the heaviest Thanksgiving weekend traffic on record for his company. This, said Capt. Hunter, was due to Northumberland Ferries having two large ferries in operation, where as a large and small ferry were used formerly.

A spokesman for the CNR Ferry Service at Borden and Capt. Hunter both said there were lineups of traffic awaiting ferries at both Borden and Wood Islands for the weekend.

Capt. Hunter said Northumberland Ferries Ltd. had extra crossings Monday and Saturday. Crossings were increased from the normal eight or 12, or from four and six crossings each way.

The CNR Ferry Service did not have extra crossings, it was reported. Normal CNR service over the weekend was five trips daily each way. Spokesmen for both the CNR and Northumberland ferry services said there was no delay or difficulty in crossings, due to the weather, while it was windy and choppy in the Northumberland Strait.
