**Of Special Interest to our Farmers**

**Barley and Corn as pig Foods.**

An instructive pig feeding experiment was recently conducted in Germany. The objects of the experiment were to determine (1) whether feeding with barley was deleterious when given in large quantities, and (2) to compare the feeding properties of barley and corn, both given with skim-milk. Eight pigs, about seven weeks old, were selected for the experiment, and they were fed as follows: During the earlier portion of the experiment the first pair were given whole barley, the second crushed barley, the third crushed corn, and the fourth crushed corn with whey. Numbers one, two, and three were also given equal quantities of potatoes; and the weight of whey given to the fourth pair was about three times the weight of potatoes given to the third pair, equal amounts of corn being given. The same quantity of skim-milk was given throughout to all. At the end of nine weeks several variations were made in the quantity and kind of food given, and by about the end of four months it had been established that crushed barley had produced better results than the whole grain; also, that up to this point the crushed barley had produced better results than the crushed corn. The general result of the experiments led to the conclusion that giving barley in whole, rough grain is harmful, and that is not advisable to feed pigs under four months too freely on maize. After that age, and when rapid fattening is desired, the corn proved itself a better food than barley.—Farmers Advocate.

**Selecting the Ram.**

Many sheep breeders will be select—and their rams now. It is important work and needs judgement. Much of the success of the future stock depends on the sire. He is only one, the ewes are many. Therefore in buying do not begrudge a few dollars extra to get a superior animal. Such a sum would not go far in purchasing good ewes, but it will make a great difference in the quality of the ram that can be purchased, and it is through the superior quality of the ram that most farmers count to improve the quality of their flock. By getting really good rams it is astonishing how quickly the quality for a flock can be improved. We are not likely to see the high prices for wool that once prevailed; therefore the more need to give special attention to the mutton qualities of the sire. A heavy fleece is all right if it goes with the fibre.—Farming.

**Our Beef Cattle—More Blood Wanted**

Mr Duncan McEachern, Chief Live Stock Inspector for the Dominion, as a result of his observations at British ports of landing while on a visit there during the past season, came to the conclusion that our beef cattle, compared with others, are degenerating for want of fresh blood, and says that something ought to be done to encourage more importations of pure-bred bulls. The Argentine stockmen have been the most energetic purchasers of British pure-bred stock of late years, and their cattle, a result show great improvement on reaching the British markets. "To get the benefit of our nearness to the English market," concludes the Doctor "we must produce cattle of the most improved and most profitable breeds."—Exchange.

**Dairying Notes**

Winter dairying has many advantages, as has often been noted in these columns. It furnishes profitable employment for the farmer and his men at a season of the year when, without it, the farm hands have to lay idle or work for low wages, and it furnishes a means of income that it is a folly for the farmer to overlook.

It will pay the dairyman to raise his own cows. By this method he is apt to get better cows if he understands breeding and selection thoroughly. The best way is to start with your own herd. Weed out the cows that are not returning a profit and then use a bull of some recognized dairy herd who comes from a strain of milk producers. By a method of this kind, carefully and intelligently practised, a dairyman will in a very few years be in the possession of a good dairy herd.

Sudden changes in the cow's rations usually decrease the milk yield, even when the new ration is better than the old. When it is necessary to make a change in the ration the change should be made gradually, taking at least two weeks to make any radical change.—Farming.

**A USEFUL VOLCANO**

**Miners in the Atlin Gold District Favored.**

TACOMA, Wn, Dec 12.—Further information of the active volcano discovered in the Atlin gold district in British Columbia is to the effect that the volcano furnishes the miners light by which to work their claims during the long darkness of the Arctic winter. The glare from the sprouting lava, reflected back against the sky, gives an almost continuous light to the upper end of the Atlin district. From Dr W B King-lowe and T H James, mining men of Denver, the best and apparently the most authentic description of the Alaskan Vesuvius. "The mountain in eruption," said Dr Kingslowe, "is the second range of four towering peaks lying about 50 miles south of Lake Gladie and a slightly shorter distance from Atlin City. These mountains are all of at least 14,000 feet altitude, the crater resting a trifle below its three brother peaks. It was in the early part of October that the smoke was first seen issuing from the mountain. With the thought of a volcano farthest from their minds the miners attributed these first signs of eruption to clouds hanging about the peak. So constant, however, was the cloud that it became an object of daily observation from Atlin City. Then on November 8 the mountain burst forth in flames. Through the smoke clouds there shot a stream of molten lava, boulders and ashes that brightened the sky a radius of nearly 40 miles, and sent its reflected light through the darkness down upon the men working on Birch, Discovery, McKee, Pine and other creeks, the sides of whose banks turn towards the volcano. A panic ensued among the miners when the ashes began falling upon them. The ashes fell to a depth of several inches and the stream down the mountain side increased in magnitude. The fall of ashes later stopped and the men returned to work. When we left the miners were working nights, gladly profiting by the mellow twilight caused by the volcano's glare, which turned night into day. No name has yet been given the mountain, but when we left the Canadian officials at Atlin were preparing for an expedition to the volcano and will undoubtedly christen it."

**NOTES AND COMMENTS.**

—Montreal's bonded debt has increased from \$11,270,000 in 1888 to \$27,500,000 in 1898. The Montreal newspapers are not putting up a red flag too soon. It is evident that there are men of the stamp of Tarte in the civic government of our metropolitan city.

—The Engineering News reports the railway construction in the U. S., during the calendar year, at nearly three thousand miles. This is a considerable increase over the construction of 2,094 miles in 1897, 1,663 in 1896, and 1,603 in 1895.

—The losses of shipowners on the great lakes last year were \$2,500,000, which shows the magnitude of the shipping interests on the inland waters. It is said that more vessels were built this year for use in the great lakes than for the Atlantic and Pacific oceans combined.

—John Sherman, who let the public know that as a member of the McKinley cabinet he was opposed to the war with Spain, now announces that he is against the annexation of the Philippines. Ex-President Cleveland also declares himself opposed to expansion.

**DIED.**

At Mt. Stewart, Dec. 4th, Katie Gillis, daughter of Allan Gillis and Penelope McDonald, departed this life after a short illness, at the youthful age of fifteen. The close attention of a skilled physician, aided by tender parental care, failed to restore her health, and she quickly gave way to the call of the silent but sure-to-convictor—Death. Being a quiet and most industrious, as well as being of a mild and cheerful disposition, her death is a cause of sorrow to her disconsolate parents and sisters. The funeral to St. Andrew's was largely attended by the neighboring community and relatives of the deceased, among whom was Rev I R A McDonald, P. P., of St. Teresa's. After High Mass of Requiem, celebrated by Rev Monsignor McDonald, P. P., and the usual funeral service, her remains were interred in the parish cemetery. May her soul rest in peace.

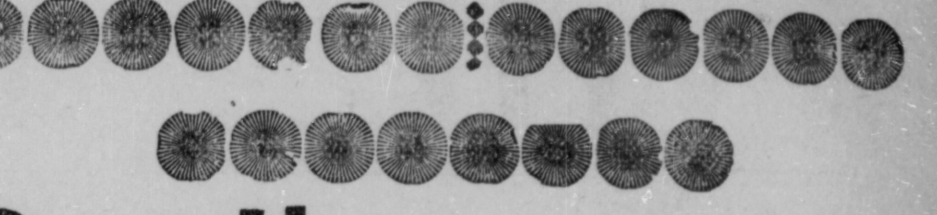
