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## Reunion Of 105th Battalion Slated For Montague In July

Forty-seven years ago today Prince Edward Island's famed 105th Battalion marched off to war. The unit was actually supposed to leave June 12, 1916 but a heavy fog prevented the then new ferry St. Prince Edward Island from getting from Bordens to Charlottetown. Thousands of people lined the city's streets to watch the 1,100-man unit march to the wharf, but the ferry did not arrive until 11:30 p.m.

The battalion returned to barracks but mustered again at 1 a.m. and boarded the ferry at the Marine Wharf and left for Picton at 2:25.

A local paper of the time said: "The clang of the fire bell, the blowing of the steam engine's whistle, mingled with the crash of the band playing 'The Charge' and the tramp, tramp, tramp of marching men. It was a scene which will ever live in the memories of those who witnessed it."

The battalion arrived in Val Paradies, P.Q., June 12, 1916. On July 31 this year, survivors of the 105th will hold a reunion in Montague.

A meeting of the executive committee of the association was held here last afternoon in the office of the Vocational School, Charlottetown.

There was a large attendance, and George Gordon member from Montague reported that arrangements were pretty well completed for the reunion of the battalion which will be held in Montague July 31. Major Douglas Gowan will be the guest speaker at the reunion. Group Capt. A.G. Dagg will be the guest speaker at the reunion of the commanding officer. Group Capt. A.G. # S'side Seeks Revision In Water, Sewer Rates

**SUMMERSIDE** — The Public Utilities Commission chaired by Judge C. St. Clair Trainor yesterday heard a submission by the town of Summerside requesting a revision of water and sewerage rates.

The submission would study the application and reach a decision as soon as possible. He expressed regret but although it was a public hearing, only one man, Dr. H.E. Clark sat in on the proceedings.

Dr. Clark, a former member of the town council, was asked to comment and during his brief remarks stated he had hoped the town would adopt the meter system. He said he had had a water meter installed in his home several years ago and he felt this was the proper way for citizens to pay for water used.

Other members of the commission are W.E. Brennan and Stewart Vies.

George R. McMahon acted as solicitor for the town and others present included Con. D. Alex MacDonald; superintendent of water and sewerage, Walter Peavler; and Deputy Mayor George Key, Jr.

The application for a revision of the regulations, rates and charges of water and sewerage supplied to its customers was supported by the town in October 1962.

# Centennial Plans Outlined To S'side Board Of Trade

**SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN** — "We in P.E.I. by one of the accidents of history are the hosts of population, except P.E.I. next year," he said, and emphasized the importance of being good hosts, making people feel welcome, wanting to stay here and return again. "It's a privilege to have this honor and task and we hope every community will participate to the fullest in this operation."

**HOW RAISED**  
Referring to the Fathers of Confederation Memorial Building, Dr. MacKinnon revealed how the \$5,500,000 memorial will be financed. He stated the financing would be done by means of 15 cents per head of population by each government. That is the federal government will pay 15 cents for each resident of Canada and the provinces will pay

15 cents for each of their numbers of population, except P.E.I. which is donating the site as its contribution. He termed the fact that this is the first memorial to the Fathers of Confederation as a disgrace. "A whole century before we built a memorial to the founding fathers," he said.

He told his audience that nineteenth of this centennial is going to depend on local initiative. The actual success is dependent on local interest. He said "It's the live wires in the community who are going to make the centennial 60". Dr. MacKinnon commended the Summerside centennial committee in the respect for its initiative and leadership.

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
