

## Litton: Uncovering the alternatives

A public meeting will be held on March 4 at 8:00 p.m. at the Charlottetown Hotel as a means of continuing to critically evaluate the implications of the locating of a Litton plant on P.E.I. This event is co-sponsored by The Island Way, a coalition of concerned persons and community groups that formed to address the Litton issue, and the recently formed UPEI group, University People for Peaceful Alternatives (UPPA).

Featured speakers for the evening will be nuclear disarmament activist Gif Gifford from Halifax and UPEI's Prof. David Weale. Gif Gifford was Director of the Schools of Social Work at Dalhousie University and at the University of Manitoba before his retirement in 1984. A veteran of World War II in which Mr. Gifford flew 49 bombing raids for the RCAF, he has been involved in the campaign for nuclear disarmament for close to thirty years. He has been Chairman and co-founder of the Veterans for Multilateral Nuclear Disarmament

and worked with international veterans' peace organizations. Mr. Gifford has appeared at numerous conferences, rallies and programmes to address peace related issues.

David Weale teaches in the Department of History at UPEI and is Acting Director of the

Canadian Studies Programme. He has an active interest in local history and is a member of the Institute for Island Studies at UPEI. He worked in government as a policy advisor to Angus MacLean when he was premier, and is actively involved in church and peace related activities.

"This meeting promises to be a major event in the campaign to take a serious and critical look at the Litton proposal," said Prof. Irene Burge, spokesperson for UPPA. "It's a special opportunity for University people to come out and show that they support an alternative to Litton, and to show

the community that Mr. Keating's presence here does not represent the views of many people at UPEI."

The public meeting is scheduled for the same night that Mr. Ron Keating, Canadian President of Litton Industries will be speaking to the UPEI Business Society.

## Keating to speak
