## NOW IT IS THE PICQUART CASE.

That is Making Paris Excited

### THE DECISION TO COURT MARTIAL COL PICQUART

Has Caused a Protest by Authors, Politicians and Others.

PARIS, Nov. 26.—The Picquart case seems in a fair way of raising a greater storm than the Dreyfus affair. The barefaced decision of the Military Governor of Paris, General Zurlinden, to try Picquart by court martial has caused a protest, signed by leading authors, politicians and journalists, to be presented to the Government.

NEW YORK, Nov. 23.—The feature of the night session of the Fasig horse sale was the sale of Creascus, the 2093 trotter. He was in the consignment from the Ketchum farm, Toledo, Ohio, which contained a dozen others of the get of McGregor, the sire of Creascus. Wm. Brown, of the Kalamazoo stock farm, Kalamazoo, Mich., secured the horse for \$14,000.

### A Big Strike.

ATLANTA, Ga., Nov. 24.—A special to the Journal from Augusta, Ga., says: The strike among cotton mill operatives here now affects 6,000 workers.

### THE ABYSSINIAN EMPEROR.

Is Advancing With an Armed Force

### The Air Clear Again.

LONDON, Nov. 23.—In a speech at Edinburgh to-day Sir Michael Hicks-Beach Chancellor of the Exchequer, said there was no reason, if the French were willing why they and the British should not unite in perfectly friendly negotiations to delimit their respective rights and duties in Egypt. The Fashoda incident, he added, had cleared the air, and the prospect of serious difficulty between Great Britain and France was now much further removed than for many years past.

### TURKEY MUST PAY UP.

An American Naval Demonstration Will Follow a Refusal.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 24.—Unless Turkey makes good the indemnity which the United States has exacted on account of the damage done to American interests and to the property of American citizens in the Armenian massacres, trouble may result between this Government and Turkey. While there are possibilities of danger in the situation, there is, however, no particular occasion for alarm. Minister Straus, in his recent advices to the State Department, expresses hope of success in his prosecution of the missionary claim. During the troubles in Asiatic Turkey in 1895 and 1896, American missionary property valued at \$100,000 was destroyed. Repeated demands on the Sultan to make good the amount have been urged by this Government. England, Italy, France, and Russia have made similar demands for like claims in larger amounts than that of the United States, and the demands of those countries have been rejected as those of the United States have been.

### Coaling Station for the States

LONDON, Nov. 25.—The Vienna correspondent of the Daily Chronicle says it is semi-officially announced there that negotiations are on foot between Great Britain and the United States with a view of conceding to the latter a coaling station in the Straits of Bab-el-Mandeb, the straits uniting the Red Sea with the Indian ocean. With this object in view, the Island of Socotra, in the Indian ocean, 120 miles east of Cape Guardafui, the eastern extremity of Africa, is to be leased to the United States, who undertake to erect a lighthouse east and west of the island, which must not be fortified. It is further stipulated that only warships are to be allowed to coal there, so as not to injure England's coal trade at Aden and on Parim island. The Daily Chronicle, referring to the despatch from its Vienna correspondent regarding the proposal lease of the Island of Socotra to the United States, says:—"We are doing a great deal for America, and everybody is glad of it. Naturally we hope she is going to do something for us." The Daily Chronicle editorially criticises the premature rejoicing of the English press over the alleged policy of the "open door" in the Philippines, because, it says, Washington can do nothing until Congress meets.

### The Dreyfus Case

PARIS, Nov. 25.—Search of a credit establishment in this city has led to the seizure of a number of Esterhazy letters and documents bearing on the Dreyfus case. These papers will be sent to Dreyfus to use in his defence.

Madame Dreyfus has received a letter from her husband in his own hand writing. It is reported that General Zurlinden, Military Governor of Paris, and former Minister of War, has signed a decree directing the trial of Col. Picquart by court-martial for forgery and divulging secret documents concerning the safety of the State. The trial has been fixed for December 12th.

A movement has started among the citizens of Strasbourg to present to Col. Picquart, as a native Strasburger, a sword of honour in recognition of his heroic conduct in the Dreyfus affair. Herr Gast, of Strasbourg, who is Picquart's brother-in-law, is heading the movement. The German Government is opposed to the undertaking, and it may possibly be forbidden.
