Enman, Edgar Craswell, Charles McQuarrie. The business is very trifling and the criminal docket is confined to the case of McKinnon, against whom a true bill was found last term for stabbing.—Journal. The Court has since been adjourned. All the important cases were settled. There were quite a number of Scott Act appeals. When these were called on the appellant's counsel, asked to have them tried by a jury under the provisions of the Appeal Act. The application was granted, but as the jury panel had been discharged, the cases had to stand over until next July.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

The Presbyterian Synod.

NEW GLASGOW, Oct. 5. The business of the Presbyterian Synod this morning was an overture from the St. John presbytery concerning the management of the Widows & Orphans Fund. Mr. Willet appeared in support of the overture. There was a long discussion, but the recommendations of the St. John Presbytery had very few supporters and the matter was left in the hands of a committee and it is not likely anything more will be heard of it. The Synod in the afternoon considered a remit from the General Assembly on the subject of foreign missionary in the New Hebrides.

This was a memorial from the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, who guaranteed a year's salary if the Synod would send out another missionary. There is a good deal of feeling in the matter, and the Rev. E. Scott, of New Glasgow, moved the following resolution:—"The Synod having considered the remit of the General Assembly with regard to the appointment of a fourth missionary to the New Hebrides, records its continued interest in the work so long and so successfully carried on in the South Seas, and its unabated and hearty sympathy with our Missionaries in their discouragements and trials. The Synod would also express its appreciation of the warm-hearted zeal which prompted the Women's Foreign Missionary Society to make their generous offer of support for another missionary in that place, but in view of the circumstances of the case the Synod is of opinion that such an appointment would not be advisable." In support of this the mover made a long speech bristling with statistics. The main arguments in support of his contention were: 1st, the state of the funds did not warrant the assumption of new responsibilities; 2nd, the home missions and foreign missions nearer home required more attention from our church; 3rd, the New Hebrides now had more than its quota of missionaries compared with other foreign fields. Another resolution was presented to accept the offer of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society. When adjournment reached the debate was still in progress.

Turned Queen's Evidence.

DUBLIN, Oct. 5. Callinan, a moonlighter of the party that killed constable Whelehan at Lisdonvara, on Sept. 11th, and who turned Queen's evidence, was taken to Ems to-day to testify against his accomplices. He was escorted by a strong force of police. He swore to the plot against Sexton, and identified the seven prisoners as having participated in killing constable Whelehan. Callinan admitted that he had planned a number of moonlighter raids in Kerry and Clare. He said he had been in the pay of the police during the past five years. He received from Constable Whelehan just before raiding Sextons a small amount of money in payment as share for arranging the raid. The statement caused a great sensation. While returning to jail the prisoners were cheered by crowds in the streets, and the police charged on the people, using their batons freely.

Moonlighters Again.

DUBLIN, Oct. 5. Moonlighters last night attacked the house of a farmer named Kibon at Cranry Bridge, Kilrush. They drove the inmates out and levelled the building with crowbars, continuing the work of destruction for several hours. Eight arrests have been made. The Dublin corporation unanimously passed Dillon's motion to attend in state to-morrow the trial of O'Brien and Sullivan.

The West Indies Route.

OTTAWA, Oct. 5. Mr. Woods, of Halifax, has notified the Government that he contemplates establishing a steamship line on the West Indies route. He expects a subsidy, but nothing will be decided till Sir Charles Tupper's return.

Another Riot.

MOSCOW, Oct. 5. The workmen in a cotton mill at Klin raised a riot to-day and set fire to the factory, which was destroyed. Many persons were killed. Troops have been sent.
