Dominions Reach Finals For Island Ball Title By Defeating Victorias 8-2

Showing a complete reversal of form after being routed 17-3 in the fourth game of the series, Dominions baseball team yesterday earned the right to meet Summer-side All-Stars for the intermediate baseball title of the Island as they turned back the Victorias 8-2 in the fifth and deciding game of the most bitter baseball series ever staged in this Island province.

Driving "Fiddler" McDonald to the showers after 2 and 1-3 innings with a four run five hit barrage that gave them a 4-1 lead, the new City champions, backed up the courageous pitching of "Skinny" McKinnon with a near air tight display to earn their verdict. Scoring two runs in the last half of the first and then seeing their opponents score a counter in the first of the second that reduced their lead to half, Dominions won their ball game and series in the last of the third with a four run rally.

But the game was much closer than the score would seem to indicate. Victorias had men on the base and but for the superb hurling of McKinnon in the pinches—a youngster who is at his best when the going is toughest—and the smart fielding of his mates the outcome might have been very much different than what it was. Twice during the game Dominions pulled off double plays that snuffed out dangerous looking threats.

But it was a sensational comeback by a team that scored only two runs before had committed the huge total of 17 errors. Last night they didn't appear as the same team at all and although they had seven miscues chalked up against them, not one of them led to any of their opponent's runs.

Dominions are very grateful to Roy Prowse who during the game after retiring the Victorias scoreless in the first half of the first, Dominions leaped in a one run lead in their turn at the bat. McInnis drew a base on balls; went to second on Squarabriggs's sacrifice hit; traveled to left.

There was one out in the third when the winners scored their first run. Squarabriggs and Whalen singled and scored on Whitlock's one-base blow; the blow meant the end of McDonald's tenure on the mound and McCormack came in.

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Two-horse Trotting Hitch Record Broken On Circuit

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Aug. 31.—(AP)—Peter Astra, 1939 Ham-bieton winner, lost his first heat of the three-year-old campaign but won the \$7,500 Governor's Trot and a 27-year-old world record was broken at today's Grand Circuit meeting at the New York State Fair.

The world's record was set by Greyhound, 1:55 1/4, and Rosalind, 1:56 1/4, the two fastest trotters in training, which were hitched to a pole and set a sensational mark of 1:59 for the mile oval, breaking the existing mark for a two-horse trotting hitch by more than four seconds.

The old record of 2:03 1/4 was set by Uhlan and Lewis Forest at Lexington, Ky., in 1912. Peter Astra won the first two heats of the Governor's Trot to insure first money but finished third in the final heat which Gauntlet, driven by Vic Fleming of Syracuse and Dundas, Ont., won. The victory moved Peter Astra's earnings for the year past the \$30,000 mark, as first place in today's race was worth \$3,113.50.

A light drizzle during the afternoon harpered the players. The final 36 holes in the medal play tournament will be played tomorrow.

Young N. B. Golfer And Veteran Nova Scotian Meet For Maritime Title Today

HALIFAX, Aug. 31.—(CP)—A good young golfer and a mighty good old golfer meet face to face tomorrow in their respective quests for their first Maritime golf title.

Bill Crawford of Saint John and Westfield, N. B., and Dr. P. O. Jarboe of Chester, N. S., and Boston, Mass., are after the tri-province crown in earnest. One of them will be wearing it after 36 holes of golf over the Ashburn course here tomorrow.

Crawford, who won his semi-final round with S. B. Goodman of Halifax this morning, is still rounding into shape as a tournament golfer. A natural athlete, he has concentrated more on basketball and track than on golf.

Next month, the former Mount Allison University star leaves to take up his Rhodes Scholarship at Oxford University and he wants to win the biggest tournament in the Maritimes before he goes.

Never Quite But— Dr. Jarboe, a veteran in the truest sense of the word, has never quite been able to win a golf title in the Maritimes. He has been runner-up for the Nova Scotia crown four years running, always missing his stride just too late for victory. He will be playing to win every inch of the way tomorrow.

The 51-year-old Chesterite played with deadly accuracy this morning to eliminate erratic Maurice Dowling of Charlottetown 5 and 4. The Crawford-Goodman match ended with big Bill two up and one to go.

Crawford has waltzed through the tournament so far using his irons on his tee shots. He stowed the woods away after they persisted in giving him short, hooked drives.

Whether or not his iron drives will match those of the hard-hitting Jarboe is a question which can only be answered in tomorrow's play.

Both players have been on in their putting this week, and there should be lots of excitement around the Ashburn greens when this twosome gets down to business.

Crawford was slightly off his game in eliminating Goodman. They were all even after 12 holes, but Crawford won out on the long back nine. He had won almost all of his matches on that back nine.

The Dowling-Jarboe affair was just a matter of time. The Island youth was wild in his drives, enabling the older player to win going away.

Aussies Team Planning On Tennis Tour

HAVERFORD, Pa., Aug. 31.—(AP)—Unless a European war develops, Australia's Davis Cup players expect to tour Japan after the challenge round against the United States here this week-end.

Captain Harry Hopman announced the plans today after a transpacific telephone conversation with Harry Pitt, acting president of the Australian Lawn Tennis Association, at Melbourne.

"If war should break out," he said, "our program would be changed. Both Adrian Quist and myself are members of the 6th Battalion in the army and we would probably be called home immediately."

Hopman said tentative plans call for the Australians to enter the United States championships at Forest Hills the week of Sept. 7, the Pacific southwest in Los Angeles Sept. 22 and perhaps the Pacific coast tournament in Berkeley, Calif., the week of the 29th.

After that the team will leave for Japan should they decide not to take part in the Pacific coast tourney, they plan to sail direct to Yokohama, then return home with a stop-over at Honolulu.

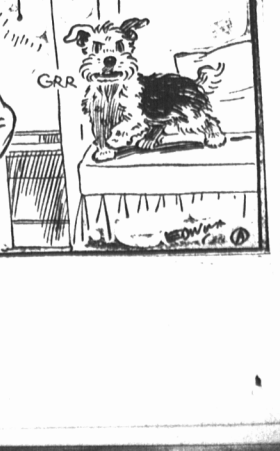

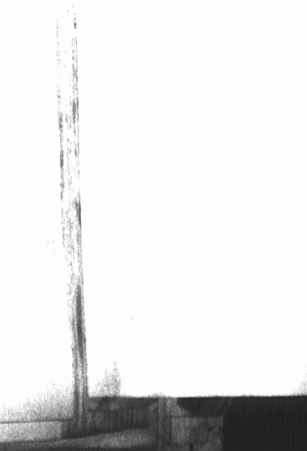
