

Spills And Upsets Mark Night Racing Program At Exhibition Track

The night racing program held Saturday over the local Exhibition track produced everything in the way of thrills, spills and close finishes. All told, twelve dashes were run off with Island owned horses winning eight events. The program was staged before a smaller than usual night racing crowd.

The first and third dashes featured the same horses but saw two great dash winners in the night. In the first heat Lil Frisco headed the starchy field to the wire in a close finish with Mary T. Clegg and Bob Canuck coming on fast in the last half to finish in the money. The second heat of the race saw Miss Commando and driver J. Llewellyn create one of the biggest upsets of the night when they nosed out Shy Ann 2d for top honors. Both Bob Canuck and the Ann mare came on strong in the stretch to just about nip the Montague-owned pacer at the wire.

Chocolate Dip had just too much for the other seven entries in the second dash of the night but in the fourth Toby Patch headed the same field and paid his followers to the tune of \$85.00 for a two-buck wager. The O'Brien-owned Dip was the place horse while Hilda Mac showed.

In the fifth and ninth dashes of the night Feather Duster trotted her way around the eight-horse field, making her bids in both heats as the trotters went up the back stretch the second time around. Lusia and Baron were close in the fifth while Bonnie Dale showed a great burst of speed in the last eighth to grab the place money in the ninth and Guy Harvester was third.

In the fast class of the night A. G. Scott had too much pace in him for the rest of the pacers. The handsome stallion finished out in front both heats with Miss Knox and the roan Clipper providing the opposition in the first heat and Johnny Kalmuck and Worthy Ermine chasing him to the wire in the tenth dash of the night.

It was in the seventh race of the night that the crowd was brought to their feet as the pacers hit the first turn with Quick Lick out to the front. Marjorie Budlong made a break and tried to go to the outside to settle down. "Rock" McCallum driving P. E. I. Budlong was just making his bid to go to the top of the field on the outside and both horses collided. Marjorie went down with the Budlong horse getting away from the entanglement to go on without a driver as McCallum was thrown off the sulky. Three other horses went down in the upset and only three finished the heat. Lucky Number, Jean Henley and Billy Conn all collided with Marjorie hurting her to such an extent that she was drawn from the next heat. Luckily none of the drivers was injured in the unfortunate accident. Quick Lick went on to win the heat from Eleanor G. and Rosalie H. The O'Meara-driven Quick Lick made it two straight heats when she won the eleventh dash from P.E.I. Budlong and Lucky Number. Billy Conn finished second but was placed fifth by the judges for interference on the turn.

Miss Donna Mae and Dale B. divided honors in the other two dashes of the night, with the Leitcher-owned mare winning the first heat from her stablemate Jennie Kalmuck, with New Look third. In the second heat Miss Donna Mae led for nearly the whole mile but had to yield to both Dale B. and Nell Kalmuck who roared down the stretch to grab the first and second monies.

Dale B. paid his backers \$28.90 for a winning ticket and \$13.80 for a place ticket. The Daily Double on Feather Duster and A. G. Scott paid over \$22.

Arthur King Winner Of 20-Mile Bike Race

Tall, bespectacled, 16-year-old Arthur King of Charlotetown yesterday won the 20 mile Labor Day bicycle race when he covered the distance in the remarkable fast time of one hour and 35 seconds. The event was sponsored by the Bike Shop.

Finishing in second place, almost four minutes behind the winner, was Lloyd Larter, also of Charlotetown. In third place was Albert Weeks of Winsloe who went the route in one hour, six minutes and 30 seconds.

It was the second win this year for the quiet-mannered King. On May 24th he won the ten mile event in the record time of 28 minutes and 35 seconds.

Starting near Frederickton the race got underway promptly at 10:30. King and Weeks each had a handicap of four and three minutes respectively. Both overtook the pack before Hunter River and it was in this vicinity that the pair battled it out for the lead. King, however, in the next two miles drew ahead and was never threatened thereafter.

There was a good crowd on hand to witness the finish of the gruelling grind and each and every contestant was given a hand on crossing the finish line. The youngest competitor, 12-year-old Wayne Bernard was the last to finish the course and he was given a rousing reception for his gameness and sportsmanship.
