Location Of Schools Cause Of Quarrel

EDMONTON, Sept. 2. (CP)—Police are investigating a bizarre clash between school authorities and ratepayers which saw some ratepayers drag two wooden school buildings from one town to another because they contend that the new site is more central.

The two wooden buildings were reported missing from near Falher in the High Prairie school division in Northern Alberta when teachers began preparations for school opening Tuesday.

The persons responsible for removing the schools will be ordered to put them back—and will likely be charged with theft, said Dr. W. W. Cross, acting Alberta premier.

Two weeks ago the buildings were dragged by bulldozers to the Parish grounds of the Roman Catholic Church at Girouxville. Board officials who tried to move them back were "guarding" the buildings. The board retreated.

Bishop Henri Roulier said the dispute did not arise from a religious clash. Residents had sought to have the schools more centrally located but the board refused. He said the schools were placed on the parish grounds because a dormitory is nearby.

Dr. J. W. T. Wood, board chairman, declined comment.

'MAGISTRATE'S COURT AT GEORGETOWN—Stipendiary Magistrate for King's County, Joseph W. MacDonald held court in the Court House in Georgetown on Friday, Sept. 1st at 2 p.m. Constable Beveridge of the R. C. M. P. detachment, Montague, prosecuted the cases. The first case involved a resident of Victoria Cross, who was charged under section 20, sub-section (1) of the Temperance Act, with unlawfully having liquor in his possession in a place other than in his residence. The party pleaded guilty and was fined \$20 and costs or in default of payment to 30 days in King's County Jail.

The second case was that of a Montague resident who pleaded guilty to unlawfully having liquor in his possession in a place other than in his residence—under Sec. 20, sub-section (1) of the Temperance Act. He was fined \$20 and costs of \$3 or in default to serve 30 days in King's County Jail. In the final case, a resident of Cardigan Head pleaded guilty on behalf of another resident of Cardigan Head, who did unlawfully operate the first party's motor vehicle without first obtaining a license, under section 8, sub-section (1) of the Highway Traffic Act. He was fined \$1 and \$2 costs or in default to serve 10 days in the King's County Jail. Court was adjourned to Friday, September 8th at 2:00 p.m.

Russia May Be Ready For Total War Next Year

NEW YORK, Sept. 2.—(AP)—Russia may be ready for total war by late next year, Nicholas Nyaradi, former Finance Minister of Hungary, announced.

Nyaradi served in the Hungarian coalition government as a representative of the anti-Communist Smallholders' Party before the Communists seized control. He now is lecturing and writing in the United States.

In an article in Fortune Magazine, Nyaradi said information gained while he was in the Hungarian Government and since that time "led me to conclude that the Russians hoped to achieve maximum military and economic preparedness by the end of 1951."

"Kremlin measures in satellite countries aim to ensure by that time two-year reserves of grain, metals, oil and rubber," he said. "I still believe that Russian preparations for total war are unfinished. But they may be complete by late 1951."

Nyaradi said that according to estimates of the Hungarian Communist Party, the Soviet bloc by the end of 1948 could produce approximately 75 to 80 per cent of the raw materials and industrial products it would need in a war.

"Deficiencies were mainly in machine tools, ball bearings, industrial equipment, locomotives, railroad cars, nonferrous metals (especially copper and zinc), electronics and precision instruments, and pig iron," he continued.

But Nyaradi said shortages are not major obstacles to Soviet war production and "in emergencies Russia can manage."

A brown-haired green-eyed gal, Pat has a nice but average face. She's of medium height, 5 feet 5 inches, weighs an ordinary 115. But it's the way those pounds are distributed that makes Pat distinctive.

The brief garb in which Pat poses artfully shows off her perfect proportions. The measurements? Bust 35 inches, hips 35 inches and waist 24 inches.

Pat's shapely legs have been voted the world's most beautiful by several photographers' associations (all male, of course) and even her feet have been titled. She has decorated thousands of calendars, millions of blotters and advertisements and scores of magazine covers.

Just a little over two years ago, Pat could hardly get a job. They said she was too fat. Models were supposed to be lean and long. The first assignment handed Pat was modeling maternity wear.

But Pat is shrewd and she was determined to be a model. When a photographer asked her to pose in a swim suit, she brought along one of her own abbreviated suits. After that Pat was in constant demand. Now she has 150 suits as her working wardrobe.

More Healthful Pat has no false modesty about posing in such brief wear. She is convinced that the French suit will some day be standard beach wear.

"I think the French suit is more healthful," she said. "Those slide-type suits hold a girl's figure in and give her a nice line, but she isn't using her own muscles. In the French suit she has to rely on herself. Besides, she can get more sun."

Pat, who was born in Aberdeen, Wash., and admits to 23 years, has also established herself as a swim suit designer. She would like to become a movie actress but so far has played only extra parts.

55 Killed In Plane Crash In Egyptian Desert

By EDWARD POLLAK BIST EL ASHRAFF, Egypt, Sept. 1.—(AP)—A Trans-World Airline Constellation crashed and burned in the desert sands west of the Nile delta today and all 55 persons aboard perished. Twenty-three Americans and an Egyptian film star were among the dead.

The four-engined "Star of Maryland" went down .68 miles northwest of Cairo, near the village of Etay Baroud at the rim of the Western Desert. Searchers found the wreckage strewn over 500 yards. They trekked 15 miles over hot sands to reach it.

The airliner plummeted to earth shortly after the takeoff from Cairo on a regular Bombay-New York flight. Little of the plane's wreckage escaped the flames.
