## Walter R. Shaw Makes Comment

Premier Alex Campbell's announcement that a special session of the Legislature would be held in early November amazed Walter Shaw, leader of the opposition, who asked yesterday: "why the urgency of this special session?"

"I am not aware there are any financial agreements or commitments with Ottawa that demand immediate legislative action," stated Mr. Shaw. "By November this government will have been in power for about four months and was assured of administrative responsibilities since July 11."

"According to the Premier," stated Mr. Shaw, "little legislation is contemplated other than that involved in the creation of separate positions for a minister of labor and a minister without portfolio."

## CCGS Vessel Is Docked Here

The Wolfe, a Canadian Coast Guard Service vessel with the Department of Transport, tied up at the Department of Transport wharf yesterday morning at approximately 9.30.

The Wolfe is captained by Captain A. Piercey and carries a crew of 48. For the past three months the Wolfe has been working in the northern regions and at one time was a near 900 miles from the North Pole. The Wolfe is an ice-breaker and therefore spends a great deal of time leading supply convoys through thick ice to many northern communities. Besides this she carries out search and rescue duties and supply work.

A vital piece of equipment used by the Wolfe is a helicopter which plays an important role as a navigational aid and in search and rescue operations.



### RECEIVES CERTIFICATE

Sgt. J.O. MacKinnon (LEFT) is receiving a certificate of merit from Group Captain G.A. Berry, DFC, CD, Commanding Officer, CFB Summerside. Sgt. MacKinnon made an original suggestion concerning radar testing procedures which has been officially adopted by the service which will result in considerable savings over a long term period.

There was no immediate confirmation from government officials in Mexico City or Juarez, across the border from El Paso. The lawyers, Richard T. Marshall and Joseph J. Rey, said they met Thursday with a representative of Governor Praxedes Guier Duran.

They said they were assured a permit will be issued to allow the freight cars of food, medicine, farm tools and other materials from Lafayette, La., cross the international border within the next day or two.

Officials of Southern Pacific Railroad, which handled shipment of the cars, said the mercy train will not be moved from El Paso until the permit is delivered to them.

### Aid Being Sent To Starving Mexican Indians

EL PASO, Tex. (AP)—Two El Paso lawyers said here the governor of Chihuahua has agreed to let 10 railway freight cars of supplies go to a group of Mexican Indians reported to be starving.

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"From first reports of the 'loken invasion' of the Falkland Islands it appears that the Argentine government was not itself behind the landing."

The incident was evidently shaped to give publicity to the Argentine claim to the Falklands at a time when the United Nations has received a report on bilateral talks on the Falklands between Britain and Argentina.

Repeated Argentine claims to ownership of the Falklands, discovered for Britain in 1592, always have been rejected by the British. Talks on the issue are to be resumed in London next month.

### GOVERNOR AWAY

The hijackers' landing took place while the islands' government, Sir Cosmo Baskard, was in London for consultations with British officials.

The British government said it was seeking an explanation from Argentina.

The woman leader of the raiders was identified as Maria Cristina Verrier, 27, owner of a small theatre in downtown Buenos Aires.

Others in the group were said to include Dardo Manuel Cabo, 25, leader of the small pro-Peronist right-wing organization known as El Condor.

The raid came at an embarrassing time for Argentina's military president, Gen. Juan Carlos Onganía. He is host to Prince Philip, here on a three-week informal visit to Argentina. The Queen's husband, who is president of the International Equestrian Federation, came to attend the world horse-jumping championships.

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operation with South Vietnamese troops. So far there has been no significant battle.

The American activity in the delta, the northern part of which now is heavily flooded, came to light along with discovery by a South Vietnamese reconnaissance company of one of the biggest enemy caches of ammunition and explosives ever found in the war—70,000 rounds of small arms ammunition, 7,000 grenades, 4,000 anti-tank mines, 300 mortar shells, 160 rockets and large quantities of TNT and other explosives.

A special papal mission headed by Archbishop Sergio Pignedoli was welcomed to Saigon by Foreign Minister Tran Van Do and senior members of the Roman Catholic clergy in South Viet Nam.

The archbishop, apostolic delegate to Canada, said the visit was purely religious and denied reports from the Vatican that the aim was to advance Pope Paul's search for peace.

## Four Eastern Residents To Appear In Court Today

Four Island residents are scheduled to appear before Provincial Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, in Georgetown today on charges of voting while unqualified to do so in the last provincial election.

The charges state that Cyril Butler and Ronald Butler, both of Georgetown, Julius W.P. Nielson, Sturgeon, and Laurie MacLure, Murray Harbor North, did vote at an election in polling division 54 in the fifth electoral district of Kings County knowing that they were not qualified to vote by reason of their not being ordinary residents in the said polling division on the date of the issue of the Writ of the Election, contrary to section 147 of the Election Act, 1963.

The petition under the contravened Elections Act, has been filed with the Supreme Court by Allen MacPhee, Georgetown, contesting the election, in the same district, of Hon. George Ferguson, minister of highways, on the grounds that unqualified persons voted at his election. The hearing of this petition is still pending.

### Minister Attends Conference

Hon. Gordon Bennett, minister of education, has recently returned from Vancouver where he attended a conference of education ministers from the 10 provinces in Canada.

The minister said during the conference, considerable time was spent discussing research programs in education which he feels is necessary to develop an adequate program in education for the future.

"Other provinces are ahead of us in educational research. The important thing is to get people interested," he said.

Also discussed at the conference was the value of exchanging French and English speaking teachers within French and English speaking areas of Canada.

### Anglican Statistics Increase

The Anglican Church in Prince Edward Island is growing stronger according to statistics released last week by the diocesan office in Halifax.

Last year there were 1617 Easter communicants in eight P.E.I. Anglican parishes, compared with 1392 the year before, and 1194 in 1965. Last year 4373 members were reported on parish lists, an increase of 233 over the previous year. However, this figure is still more than 1500 fewer than the census figures indicate. Sunday school enrollment in 1965 was 925 compared with 774 in 1964.

Thirty-eight of the 163 members of the parish of Georgetown were added during the year, 12 baptisms and 26 by reception from other denominations.
