Heroic conduct of P. E. Islander.

We learn from the Chicago Times of 23rd June, that on Sabbath the 21st a boat called the "Little Western" was making an excursion on the lake, and that she was upset, when two men were drowned, and the remaining number on board were in danger of being drowned also. The accident was observed from the shore, when "Mr. E. J. Fraser, who, being an experienced boatman," volunteered his services to take command of a boat and proceed to their rescue. Among a crowd of from 300 to 400 men, some of whom were accustomed to the sea, but four were found who would undertake what was termed a fool hardy enterprise. These four were university students, namely: E. J. Fraser, G. B. Woodworth, B. E. Blake, and J. S. Scott, who, stripping themselves to their pants, succeeded after considerable effort and risk in getting their boat through the breakers, pulling to the "Little Western," and rescuing the remaining number on board. The Mr. Fraser above mentioned is the son of J. M. Fraser, Esq., of St. Ellen's, whose humane and spirited exertions are highly commended by the Times, who says:—

"These four gentlemen deserve the very highest favour for their heroic and self-sacrificing attempt—an attempt which more than one old seaman pronounced, and, in the face of a success, would still pronounce, a useless and reckless risk of life."
