The Sunday Dispatch (Ind.) asserted this would be "a happier August holiday than last year's" because, as Prime Minister Chamberlain said, "The nation is ready for an emergency."

The Sunday Graphic (Ind.) in the same vein advised Britons that "the best thing you can do for yourself and your family and country is to go on a holiday this week end and forget war-mongers. Compare 1914 with 1939—in 1914 we were not prepared for today we are."

There were two weekend developments in the talks with the Russian Government.

1. British and French Military Missions left for Russia for conferences with Soviet military leaders designed to parallel and speed negotiations for the proposed alliance treaty.

2. William Strang, special envoy sent to Moscow June 12 to assist in the pact negotiations, will leave this week for London though obstacles still exist among the three powers.

Sir William Seeds, the British Ambassador, will carry on the talks.

On Health Trip

A notable absentee will be Finance Minister Dunning, whose long illness has at last forced him to leave the office of his political and administrative responsibilities. He sailed Friday to England where he plans to take a long rest with the assurance of his physicians he may thereby gain complete restoration of his health.

Mr. Dunning resigned his portfolio and announced he would not be coming to the cabinet on Tuesday election, but Mr. Mackenzie King has so far refused to accept the resignation in the hope the ailing Minister would quickly regain his strength and return to the Government.

The Prime Minister and members of his cabinet will leave for Toronto Monday night and return probably on Wednesday morning. Thursday the Weekly Cabinet Council will be preceded by a conference with the Quebec Mayors and probably one or more Ministers of the Quebec Government on the vexed problem of joint measures to deal with and finance Relief Works.
