

Leafs Defeat Habs 4-2; Bower, Plante Are Back

TORONTO (CP)—Centre Billy Harris, the slender stick-handler who has finally won himself Wood Off To Windsor

Plante and Toronto goalie Johnny Bower were both returning after layoffs. Plante, who had just recovered from an illness last week, returned af-

ter missing part of last Saturday's game against Chicago Black Hawks with a strained leg muscle. Bower had been on the sidelines for three games in favor of Don Simmons, who was out Wednesday night with the flu.

It was a relatively close game for the 14,429 fans, with seven minor penalties called, four to Montreal.

Bower kicked out 28 shots and Plante 26.

NEW YORK (AP)—New York Rangers banged in five goals in the first two periods to top Boston Bruins 6-2 in a wild National Hockey League game Wednesday night.

A Ranger led by Earl Langford, Andy Bathgate and Henry Bouchard scored three goals. Each scored once and Ingarfield added two assists.

The victory was the fourth for Rangers—and second over the Bruins—this season. Rangers, second last in the league, have 10 points to seven for the last-place Bruins.

Three quick markers by Doug Harvey, Dave Balon and Camille Henry late in the second period gave New York a 5-2 lead and put the game out of Boston's reach. In goal, Boston's Gordie Howe counted for Detroit the first of the trio at 15:49 and Henry the third at 17:43.

Russian Team Draws Praise From NHL Vet

OTTAWA (CP)—Russia's national hockey team whipped through a 90-minute practice at the auditorium Wednesday in preparation for the opening of the Canadian tour against Ottawa Montagsards tonight.

The team, believed to be the youngest ever led by Russia, drew high praise from two hockey veterans who watched the workout.

Howie Meeker, a former player and coach for Toronto Maple Leafs and now a minor league official in St. John's, Nfld., said he is impressed with the team's shooting ability. The players kept two goalies on the move with the speed of their wrist shots. Not once during the drill did any of the players try to stop the puck.

Jack Roxburgh, immediate past-president of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, said the team's fine physical condition could help it go through the nine-game tour without a defeat.

"They've been practicing since September and most of our teams have had only a few games under their belt," Roxburgh said.

Both Meeker and Roxburgh also praised the sharp passing of the attacking units. And both drew attention to the defence-men who seemed to do more checking than Russian teams have done in the past.

Only five members of the team have played in Canada before and coach Arkady Tuchakov explained that the Russians are putting the accent on youth this season.
