SCOTT ACT IN MEMBERSHIP.—The Farmer says: Daniel Noonan on Monday laid out the town funds for the last fine obtained against him for violation of the Scott Act. This makes a total of \$749.42 in fines and costs obtained from violators of the Canada Temperance Act since the present Council were elected. Of those convicted of violations there remain five fines yet to be collected. Up to the present time there have been 47 cases before Stipendiary Magistrate for this civic year—about six and a half months—and out of these there have been 21 convictions.

BATTLE OF THE ALMA.—This is the anniversary of the battle of the Alma, fought in 1854. The Russian fleet on that occasion consisted of 11 transports and 64 gunboats, 12 steamers, 6 large and 6 small, 4 frigates, 5 corvettes or brigs, 82 vessels of inferior size, and 12 steamers—in all 108 sail, mounting 2,290 guns of every description, with 50,000 men on the heights of the Alma. The English forces consisted of 25,000 men and five regiments of cavalry. There was also a large fleet of warships, English, French and Turkish. The foregoing particulars are taken from an interesting list kindly furnished THE EXAMINER by Sergeant Allan, who took part in the principal battles of the Crimean War, and is still hale and hearty. We hope to give the list in full in a future issue.
