Rotary Dist. Governor To Visit C'town Club

W. Reuel LePage of Charlottetown, governor of district No. 729 Rotary International, a world-wide service organization, is scheduled to visit the Charlottetown Rotary Club on Monday.

In addition to addressing the regular meeting of the club, one of the 23 in his district, Mr. LePage will confer with the local president W. R. Jen-

Gregoire as calling for Mr. Gordon's dismissal.

Outside the Commons Albert Becharud (L. — Bonaventure), president of the Quebec Rotary clubs, issued a statement saying Liberal MPs from Quebec Toronto respondents. He said Mr. Gordon has made giant strides since last December in improving the status of French-speaking CNR employees.

Becharud referred to a CNR memorandum detailing its current program to increase bilingualism in the company and give French-speaking Canadians a better chance at advancement to top management jobs.

The latest controversy developed over statements by Mr. Gordon in his appearance last November before the Commons railway committee. The issue was over hiring and promotion of French-speaking employees.

In a Sept. 4 letter to Mr. Pearson, titled in French, Mr. Gordon wrote that it was "absolutely untrue" that he had disparaged the capabilities and qualifications of french-speaking Canadians.

CLAIMS DISTORTION

He said there had been "distortions" in news accounts of what he had said to the committee.

"It was alleged, for example, that I declared that French-Canadians were 'incongruent'! I did not make any such statement. I would not make such a statement. It does not represent my opinion."

He also denied having said to French-Canadians could be found who were capable of occupying senior positions in the CNR.

"It was reported that I had said that the French-Canadian will be appointed to a top position because these are awarded on merit."

"What I actually said was: 'There is not going to be a promotion by appointment matter just because a man is a French-Canadian.'"

"This statement simply declares that fact practice is followed in personnel matters."

Some 1,500 delegates from 110 countries — including Canada and the U.S. — attended the June, 1963 World Congress of Women in Moscow.

Hunter River Native Dies In West

The death of a former Island boy, Harry L. Hooper of Shannavan, Sask., who left here at the age of 13 years, occurred on Sept. 5 following a brief illness, in his 75th year.

Born in Hunter River, the son of the late David Hooper and Annie Craig, Mr. Hooper and his parents moved west in 1901, and first settled in Maple Creek, Sask.

Soon after arriving in the west he went to work as a cowboy. Then in 1913 he erected and operated the "Pigpot" hotel in Maple Creek, and later he operated a pool hall and bar-ber shop in the same community.

In 1918 he went into the dry business, in Maple Creek until 1929 when he moved to Shannavan and purchased a dry line in that town.

With the advancement of transportation methods, Mr. Hooper expanded his business into a trucking firm which he operated until his death and was known as Hooper's Transport.

Prominent in the Saskatchewan Truckers' Association, for the past two years he was honorary president of the organization of which he was also a director since 1959.

A member of the Shannavan Elks Lodge, he was also active in the sporting world, having his younger days he played hockey and baseball, and following his playing days, he managed hockey and baseball teams in both Maple Creek and Shannavan.

Mr. Hooper is survived by his wife, Josephine, a son Ray Hooper of Shannavan; a daughter, Margaret, Regina, and two grandchildren. Two daughters predeceased him, Clara in 1938, and Ethel in 1943.

The funeral services were held in Central Street United Church, Shannavan, interment was in Rosedale cemetery, Moose Jaw.

New Centre Has 11 Units

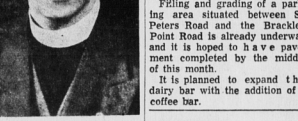
Scheduled for completion before the end of the year, the Ellis Bros. Shopping Centre, located on the St. Peter's Road, Sherwood, will house 11 departments.

He is responsible for club activities and organization in one of 22 districts, which contain more than 11,500 Rotary clubs, in 129 countries having a membership of some 535,500.

"The visit of the governor," Mr. Jenkins said, "is a time for examining the effectiveness of Rotary goals in community improvement, in youth work, in raising the standards of our businesses and professions, and doing what we can as a Rotary club and as individual Rotarians to help further international understanding."

As the governor of this Rotary district, Mr. LePage supervises the organization of new clubs in his area. Last year, more than 300 new Rotary clubs were organized in 46 countries, with clubs being formed for the first time in the West African country of Sierra Leone.

Before assuming his duties as district governor, Mr. LePage attended an eight-day meeting at Lake Placid, N.Y., held to assist Rotary governors to meet the duties of their office.
