Parliamentary Matters.

LONDON, Feb. 4.

J. Collins, Member of Parliament, whose "three acres and a cow" amendment to the Address in Reply to the Queen's Speech, caused the overthrow of the Conservatives, has been appointed by Gladstone Secretary of the Local Government Board.

J. Rigg, Liberal member, has been appointed Solicitor General.

The Earl of Aberdeen, Lord-Lieutenant of Aberdeenshire, Scotland, has been appointed Viceroy of Ireland.

Baron Wolverton, ex-Paymaster-General, has been appointed Postmaster-General.

The new Government is now completed, all the minor places being filled.

Charles Russell, Liberal member for Hackney South, the new Attorney General, in an address requesting re-election by his constituents, declares himself in favor of allowing Irishmen to deal with Irish questions on such soil, while at the same time he favored maintaining all the safeguards of the supremacy of the Crown.

An Untruthful Report.

OTTAWA, Feb. 6.

There is no truth in the statement that the Minister of Finance went to Montreal to obtain a temporary loan from the banks. He has no difficulty in providing all the money needed. The receipts of the Finance Department for January was \$2,000,585, and the expenditure \$4,900,000. Included in the expenditure is the amount paid in advance for six months' subsidy to the several provinces. The Customs receipts do not amount to as much as in January, 1885, but the excise receipts show a steady increase of those of last month, being \$61,000 more than in the previous January.

Shipping Disasters.

PRINCETOWN, Mass., Feb. 5.

The British bark Carrie Rhyman McNeill, from Turk's Island for Boston, with salt, came ashore at Herring Cove last night.

LONDON, Feb. 4.

The German ship Carl, at Bremen from Baltimore, lost three men in the storm of January 15.

The Italian bark Silvio, from Pensacola for Liverpool, has put into Palamouth. She experienced very heavy weather, during which Captain Benvenuto and the mate were drowned.

Servia's Reply.

VIENNA, Feb. 4.

Servia has handed to each of the powers her reply to their last collective note to her, demanding disarmament. The reply is exceedingly brief, and simply declares that Servia has taken cognizance of the contents of the note.

Profits of the C. P. R.

OTTAWA, Feb. 6.

The C. P. R. statement of the year's business, showing, as it does, a net profit over working expenses of nearly three and a quarter million dollars, was the subject of congratulation to-day in Ministerial circles.

The Fishery Treaty.

OTTAWA, Feb. 6.

The Government have received no official information as to the action of the United States Senate Committee on foreign affairs, respecting the Fishery Treaty proposed by the President of that country.

Burned to Death.

MCGREGOR, Iowa, Feb. 5.

Albert Cowley, a farmer residing three miles from here, with his entire family, wife, two boys and little girl, were burned to death in their house last night.

A New Governor.

LONDON, Feb. 5.

Sir George William Desvaux, K. C. M. G., Governor of Fiji, has been appointed Governor of Newfoundland. He is white, and about forty-five years age.

THE Halifax Herald says: The Archibald brothers brought up a bar of gold from their mines, Salmon River, yesterday, weighing 1,227 ounces, and worth \$23,000. This is 200 ounces more than the famous Albion bar brought in last summer, and undoubtedly the largest bar of native gold ever brought to the city, as the result of one month's crushing at a single mine. Mr. McNaughton, of the Rawdon Mine, also brought in a bar of 155 ounces.

The largest man in California is said to be a Canadian, by the name of Kean Archibald. He was born in Nova Scotia, and now lives in Herold County, Cal. He is over seven feet high, and built in proportion. He wears a No. 15 boot, and carries his own hat.

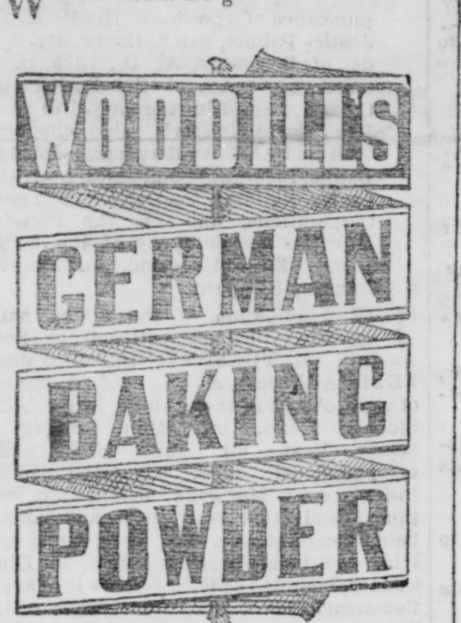

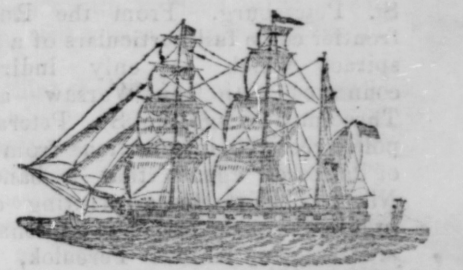
