NEW YORK (AP)—Washington and Green Bay, the two unbeaten teams in the National Football League, have the revenge motive on their side in Sunday's most important game.

The Redskins, whose rookie quarterback Norm Snead was another victim last season in a 54-0 rout at Yankee Stadium last year, hope to even with New York. Giants now that Snead has matured as a professional player.

His Was Tough Job

DANNY DID his utmost for the success of the ISHL. Previous to his occupying the chair last season, he served as secretary under Ivan Docherty. Both as secretary and then as president, Danny's job was a tough one. There were times when his decisions didn't find favor with all the executive and all the team representatives but Danny ruled as he thought best and his decisions were always in the best interests of the league.

The league was indeed fortunate to have Danny's services since its formation. He was indeed keenly interested and that interest meant he kept on top of things throughout.

He Added Color

'DUCK' Acorn did his utmost to make Old Spain Penguins one of the drawing cards of the loop.

Duck led the Penguins into the Maritime finals in 1961 after winning the ISHL crown and the N.B.P.E.I. championship. His Birds had their wings clipped by Cape Traverse Eviscuders in last season's playoffs.
