The Children Of India Receive Canadian Milk

Shipment from Montreal on the "City Wellington" has been completed of enough Canadian skim milk powder to provide about twenty million glasses of milk for hungry children in India. The milk powder was made available gratis to CARE by the Government of Canada from its surplus stocks and the shipment was made possible through a \$6,000 contribution from the Ontario Concentrated Milk Producers' Association and the Ontario Whole Milk Producers League to CARE of Canada, the international relief agency.

In India, CARE's Mission will arrange the distribution among school children and others in institutions throughout the country. Total amount of milk powder is shipped is 600,000 pounds.

Each bag in which the milk was packed is imprinted with the words "A Gift from the people of Canada through CARE".

The Ontario Producers groups hope that other dairy producers will take similar steps to make possible further shipments of the Canadian surplus milk powder.

Tomorrow's dinner: Cantaloupe sections with ham, ossi bucci with spring vegetables, beet endive salad, strawberries with cream, hot or iced coffee or tea, milk.

All measurements are level; recipes proportioned to serve 4 to 6.

Ossi bucci: Order 3 knuckles of veal, each cracked in 2 pieces. Dust with 1 1/2 tsp. flour, 1 1/2 tsp. salt and 1-4 tsp. pepper.

Brown lightly in 2 tsp. olive oil.

Add 1 minced peeled small onion, 1 1/2 c. celery cut in 2 in. stalks, 1/2 tsp. whole thyme, 1/2 tsp. whole savory, 1 (8 oz.) can seasoned tomato sauce, 3 c. boiling water and 4 tsp. broth powder or beef stock base. Cover. Simmer about 45 min. or until the meat is fork tender. Add 8 scraped small new potatoes and a dozen scraped small carrots when the meat is half done.

Serve with the natural meat gravy.

Beet endive salad: Combine 3 c. thinsliced cooked beets with 1/2 c. smallcut scallions, 2 heaping cups French endive or iceberg lettuce, cut in bit-sized clunks and tossed with wellseasoned not sweet French dressing. Garnish with chopped hard cooked egg and minced chives.

TRICK OF THE CHEF

Serve small sections of peeled cantaloupe (each with a lemon wedge), and 2 small thin slices chilled cooked ham with coarse ground black pepper.
