# Cyrus Eaton Sees Chinese Too Long Ignored By West

 One of the great forces of our time, China, is no longer ignored by the West. The Nova Scotia-born millionaire spoke at the closing session of his latest Pugwash conference, the 25th meeting of school-industrialist Cyrus Eaton said here.

"We have been so busy with our own things of importance that we have neglected the first held here at his birth-

Guests at the closing session included Premier Stanfield of Nova Scotia, President James Beveridge of Acadia University, Wolfville, N.S., President Colin Mackay of the University of New Brunswick in Fredericton and Dr. C.M. Nicholson, principal of Pine Hill Divinity Hall in Halifax.

 Dr. Beveridge said the "thinkers' conferences" sponsored by the 81-year-old Mr. Eaton have been "a tremendous contribution to mankind."

Where there is easy communication between peoples, misunderstanding will be dispelled. In this connection we owe a great debt to him."

The conference participants adopted a resolution calling for greater college emphasis on "the universal human heritage, which includes not only our own Western culture, but also the civilization of the rest of the world, past and present." They urged additional conferences on the Pugwash pattern.

Premier Stanfield spoke of the traditional ties between the universities and colleges of New England.

"The people of the Maritime Provinces have felt just as close to the people of New England as to the people of other parts of Canada, although I think we've been pretty good Canadians," he said.

"I hope that continues."

**New Bond Issue Over-Subscribed**

OTTAWA (CP)—The federal government's new \$450,000,000 bond issue has been over-subscribed, Finance Minister Gordon announced Wednesday.

The offering, in three different maturities, went on sale Monday.

It included:

- \$100,000,000 in 5 1/2 per cent long-term bonds due May 1, 1990.
- \$200,000,000 of 3 1/2 per cent bonds maturing Sept. 1, 1966.
- \$150,000,000 at 5 1/2 per cent due Oct. 1, 1969.

The Canada took \$150,000,000 of the new issue with the remainder sold through registered dealers.

**Exploration Planned For New Subsidiary**

NEW YORK (CP)—American Metal Climax Inc. (Amx) announced Wednesday that it will conduct its long-established exploration activities in Canada in the name of a new wholly-owned subsidiary, Amx Exploration Inc. Exploration has been previously carried on through another subsidiary, Southwest Potash Corp., which will continue its Canadian operations.

Amx Exploration division maintains permanent offices in Vancouver and Toronto which will be part of Amx Exploration, Inc.

Amx recently announced a forthcoming \$3,000,000 expansion in its majority-owned Health Steele Mines Ltd., at Newcastle, N.B., and the Kawneer division of Amx has just completed an expansion of its aluminum fabrication plant in Toronto.

## French Canada Is Invited To Use World Organization

 HALIFAX (CP)—A Canadian diplomat has invited French Canada to use the resources of international organizations to help it realize its national objectives.

Paul Tremblay, Canadian ambassador to the United Nations, told L'Association Canadienne des Educateurs de Langue Francaise that this aspect of international co-operation has received little attention so far.

Some 600 educationists from all parts of Canada are attending the convention.

Mr. Tremblay said French Canada now is in agreement on the carrying out of three major goals: The modernization of its education system; the construction of economic and social structures to reflect its particular spirit and a real participation in the modern scientific revolution.

The diplomat speaking in French said the Quebec royal commission on education recommendations appears at first glance to have said all and given all the needed conclusions on the subject of teaching in the province.

**LEARN FROM ABROAD**  
 But it would be useful to place the recommendations in an international perspective, which presupposes the taking into account of that which has been done in foreign countries and a desire to adapt the progress which has been made there to French Canada's needs, he said.

It would be legitimate Mr. Tremblay said, to consider the use of services created by the United Nations and its specialized institutions for the advancement and diffusion of human knowledge.

He said he was thinking in particular of the UN Educational and Cultural Organization (UNESCO).

"I immediately concede that the use of UNESCO facilities will always remain a secondary and marginal factor in relation to the radical reforms suggested in the Quebec education commission report."

"But there is no doubt that the use of UNESCO could be of valuable aid in the renewal of thought and techniques which we are pursuing in the field of education," Mr. Tremblay said.

The United Nations could also be of use in the creation of economic and social structures essential to the harmonious development of the French-Canadian community, he said.

The social repercussions of rapid industrialization on the French-Canadian community, constitute a troublesome aspect of this phenomenon, Mr. Tremblay said.

"It is often forgotten that this problem exists on a world scale and that teams of sociologists and international experts are

applying themselves to its study.

The ambassador said French Canada would also be well advised to seek the aid of international organizations to help it realize its hopes in the field of scientific development.

This aid is all the more important because French Canada lacks scientists, having only 10 per cent participation in Canadian scientific professions and even fewer researchers he said.

Figures do not include the 1965 crop.
