THE WEATHER.—Fresh to strong north westerly winds; fair, and decidedly cool today and tomorrow.

A RARE OP OPPORTUNITY.—Rev. Charles Ladner of Rosslad B. C. is in the city, and will speak this evening in the First Methodist Church at 7.30 o'clock. THE GIBRALTAR.—There is a possibility of another first-class cruiser coming to Halifax. It is reported at the Dockyard that H. M. S. Gibraltar will be attached to the North American squadron next spring. Should the Gibraltar be commissioned she will make a most formidable addition to the North American squadron. The Gibraltar is a steel, copper sheathed, first-class cruiser, and was launched in 1892. She carries as her principal armament two 22 ton guns, protected by steel shields. Her speed is 19.7 knots. The two torpedo destroyers recently commissioned for this station will not likely leave England until the spring. H. M. Tartar is to be relieved this fall, and will go home to pay off.

WORMWOOD MONKEY THEATRE.—Prof. Wormwood and his wonderful troop of trained monkeys will play at the Opera House, Tuesday and Wednesday, Oct. 5th and 6th. There are thirty-one of these mischievous beings. They turn somersaults, ride bicycles, dance, do contortion acts, fight a prize fight with boxing gloves. They have a supper scene in which the monkeys acts as waiters. They have running and trotting races, where dogs acts as horses and monkeys as drivers. This is the most wonderful troupe of trained animals in the world. Prof. Wormwood has the only talking monkey in America, Bob, is his name. It is not only amusing, but instructive to old and young. In addition is two trained anteaters, also Lumiers Cinematograph Co. of Paris, with the animated pictures of the Queen's Jubilee Parade. See the Queen as she now looks. He is the only ventriloquist singing Emmetts cockoo song.

AN EPIDEMIC OF CRIME

Many Mysterious Murders Committed in London Lately.

LONDON, Sept. 25.—The present extraordinary epidemic of murders, suicides and outrages upon women in London and its vicinity is unqualified since the days of "Jack the Ripper."

Daily for a week past the public has been startled by an atrocious murder and the alarm is increased by the fact that the perpetrators of the crimes have all baffled the police and have escaped without apparently leaving a clue as to their identity.

The murder in a railroad carriage of Miss Camp, in February last, the perpetrator of the crime not being discovered, has been followed by another railroad tragedy in which Mrs. Bryan, the wife of a Dr. Bryan, of Northampton, has been killed under circumstances pointing to murder.

The Rev. Dr. Aubrey Prince, a well-known divine was killed by burglars at his residence on Monday, a little boy has been kidnapped and murdered in the suburbs, a rich miserly woman has been found cut to pieces at her residence, B-thal Green, and a farmer's daughter, Emma Johnson, has been murdered at Windsor under peculiarly atrocious circumstances. Her body was mutilated, stripped and thrown into the Thames.

The authors of all these outrages are still at large and there seems to be no traces of them, although the murderer of Emma Johnson is believed to be a maniac whose actual identity is not known but who for months past has frightened and assaulted persons on the road from Windsor to Maiden Head and who has always managed to elude capture.

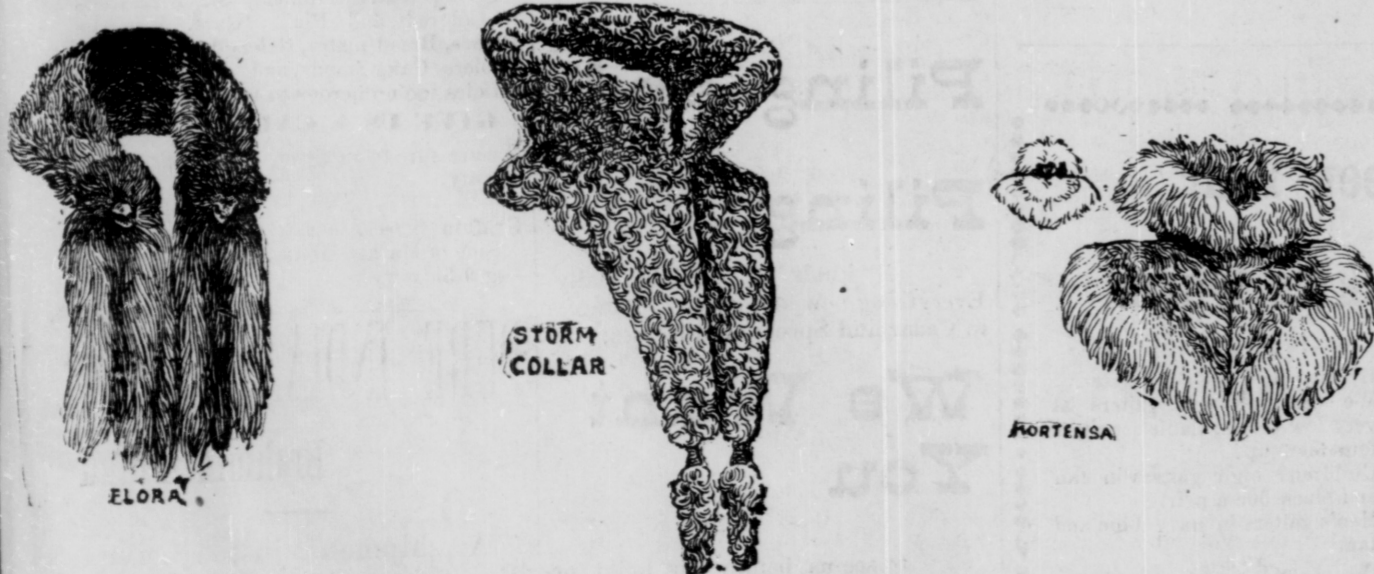
