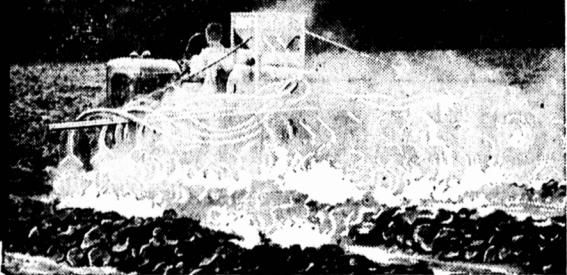

Citizens Of O'Leary Discuss Incorporation

There was a large attendance at the O'Leary Hall on Wednesday night, June 28th when a citizens meeting was held to consider matters relating to the Fire Department and to consider partial incorporation. Jack Matthews, President of the O'Leary Fire Committee presided and Albert Noonan was secretary. The Fire Chief, Lloyd Siliker presented to the meeting an itemized account of the equipment which the Department has at present. It was announced that the residents of Knutsford has donated \$23.00 towards the Fire Department's Fund for new hose, which was collected by members of the O'Leary Women's Institute, which makes the total now available for new hose \$433.00. It was finally decided to ask the Provincial Fire Marshall to survey the equipment and the O'Leary Fire Department would be guided by his advice in selecting the best hose possible. The roof of the Fire Hall was ordered repaired and Mr. J. M. MacWilliam was given authority to do this. Then the Fire Department meeting was adjourned and the meeting listened to a fine interpretation by Mr. Connolly of Charlottetown on "The Village Service Act" as recently passed by the Provincial Legislature. It is "an Act to enable the inhabitants of certain villages to supply themselves with certain services". These services include: (a) procure and provide street lights (b) procure and provide a suitable system of fire protection
