Few Back-Door Immigrants Seek To Legalize Status

OTTAWA (CP)—The immigration department's five-week open period during which visitors to Canada who wish to remain as immigrants were allowed to apply for resident status ended Monday at midnight with far fewer applications by back-door immigrants than expected.

A spokesman for the department said Monday that latest figures available up to Aug. 8 showed 4,078 persons had applied under the plan which was introduced in the Commons by Immigration Minister Marchand July 8. Final figures are expected today or Wednesday.

This was in contrast to the loose estimate by the department that 10,000 to 20,000 persons who had entered the country as visitors with the hidden intention of remaining for good were eligible to apply.

The plan to allow visitors to apply for resident status resulted from the application by more than 21,000 visitors to resident status in the 15-month period preceding Mr. Marchand's announcement, the spokesman said.

Irregular immigrants who do not meet three conditions face deportation but the department has indicated it expects the number of deportations resulting from the special policy to be small.

Visitors-turned-immigrants:—Must not be within prohibited classes listed in the Immigration Act such as criminals, security risks and persons of immoral character.

—Must not have entered Canada by fraudulent means other than by posing as visitor.

—Must fit into one of four categories: They would be acceptable if they applied normally abroad; they married a Canadian on or before July 8; they have established a successful business or been steadily employed for eight months; or they have had 10 years of schooling.

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada's wheat carryover at the end of the 1965-66 crop year July 31 totalled 422,900,000 bushels, down 90,000,000 bushels or 17 per cent from a year earlier, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported Wednesday.

Stocks of the five major grains—wheat, oats, barley, rye and flaxseed—totalled 671,700,000 bushels, 10 per cent below the 1964-65 carryover of 747,400,000 bushels and 18 per cent below the average since 1956.

A breakdown of farm-held wheat stocks showed 5,000,000 bushels in Manitoba, 70,000,000 in Saskatchewan, and 23,000,000 in Alberta.

The Prairie provinces continued to make up all but about 13 per cent of the farm-held carryover of grains.

Eastern Canadian elevators held 38,500,000 bushels of wheat and Lakehead elevators 36,600,000. Both totals were markedly higher than last July 31.

Stocks of oats at 129,000,000 bushels were about even with last year. Carryovers for the three other major grains were higher—barley at 98,555,000 bushels, compared with 88,775,000, compared with 8,302,000, and flaxseed at 10,958,000, compared with 7,141,000.
