FALSE PROFESSIONS

OF ECONOMY.

The Patriot is trying to get away from present issues by charging extravagance against the Sullivan and McLeod Administrations. This does not fit very well with Mr. D. A. McKinnon's statement at St. Mary's Road meeting, that the Sullivan Government was the best the Island ever had. Either the Patriot is speaking untruly in saying that Mr. Sullivan (now Chief Justice Sullivan) wasted the public money in the administration of justice or Mr. D. A. McKinnon was trying the effect of bribery on the Irishmen of St. Mary's Road. There can be no doubt about the blarney, for Mr. McKinnon lost no opportunity of opposing and denouncing Mr. Sullivan when he was at the head of the Government. Verily, Mr. McKinnon is an apt pupil of Sir Louis Davies. When addressing a French-Canadian meeting in Quebec Sir Louis not only praised a Frenchman (Mr. Tarte) but declared he was of French blood himself. It would not suit our new Attorney-General to go that far at St. Mary's Road and say he was an Irishman, because there were Scotchmen within hearing, with their ears open, and such a declaration would rather spoil his canvass amongst the Caledonians on the ground that he is Scotch, while his opponent is an Englishman.

But the Patriot's comparison between Liberal and Conservative expenditures in the Administration of Justice is childish and unfair. The organ says that the expenditure for the year 1891 had been to a great extent incurred when the Liberals came into power, but it makes no abatement for the year 1879, when the same state of things occurred, but the position of parties was reversed. By charging 1879 against the Conservatives, and omitting the figures for 1877 and 1878 it trumps up a comparison which seems favorable to Grit management.

Here is a statement including all the years since 1876, putting 1879 in the Grit column and 1891 in the Conservative one, which the Patriot admits is the right way of presenting the case.

or \$19,635.41 per annum for twelve years.

This shows that the average savings in the Administration of Justice under Conservative rule amounted to \$691.90 per annum or an aggregate saving of \$8,302.80 as compared with Grit expenditure for the same purpose.

Any pretensions to economical management on behalf of a party which, after extracting nearly a quarter of a million dollars from the people in direct taxation, has, in seven or eight years, increased the debt to about half a million, is too ridiculous for serious consideration. The greatest saving effected by the Grits has been brought about at the expense of hard worked and badly paid teachers of this Province.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

The London Statist reviewing the financial position of the Transvaal, points out that the Boers have during the past five years expended £6,000,000 under three heads, namely, "war department," "public works" and "special expenditures," making an average annual outlay of £1,200,000. Following these the next largest expenditure is placed under "fixed salaries," which increased from £419,775 in 1864 to £1,080,282 in 1898. In other words, with a population about equal to that of Manitoba it spends on war preparations nearly as much as Canada with five millions, and on salaries quite as much as Canada.

CHERRY VALLEY

A large meeting was held at Cherry Valley on Monday night, Wellington Young, Esq., was in the chair.

The first speaker was Mr. A. A. McLean. He exposed the new borrowing policy of the Government and asked Premier Farquharson to come on the platform and explain what he was going to do about paying the \$600,000 debt.

Mr. Irving spoke for a few minutes. Mr. John McDonald, of Cherry Valley, then delivered one of the best orations heard during the campaign. He showed up the corruption and want of business capacity of the Government. His speech was a thoughtful and lucid statement of the present situation, and was listened to with rapt attention.

Premier Farquharson followed. He went into ancient history and again announced his new policy of borrowing more money on debentures. He refused to say how he was going to pay the \$600,000 debt or stop the annual deficits.

Mr. Thos. A. McLean delivered a fine speech, and exposed the corruption of the Government in good shape.

Mr. Geo. Forbes' speech developed into a low personal unprovoked attack on Mr. McLean.
