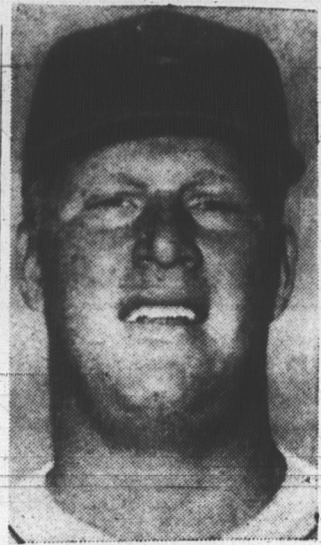


# McDowell Hurls 1 Hitter; Angels Are Devils To Sox

CLEVELAND (AP) — Sam McDowell pitched his second straight one-hitter Sunday, allowing only a bloop double by Don Buford in the second inning, as Cleveland Indians defeated Chicago White Sox 1-0 for their 11th victory in 12 games this season.

McDowell, outdueling Tommy John, struck out 10 in bringing his record to 4-0 and ended a White Sox winning streak at five. The only hit he permitted came with two out in the second inning when Buford blooped his double down the right field line out of the reach of first baseman Fred Whitfield.

BOSTON (AP) — Joe Adcock, Jim Fregosi and Jack Warner cracked homers in powering California Angels to a 6-1 victory over Boston Red Sox Sunday in the opener of a doubleheader.

Young Jim McGlothlin gained his second victory in three decisions with relief help from veteran Lew Burdette. The Angels infield helped McGlothlin and Burdette by pulling off six double plays.

With the Red Sox completing three double plays, the two teams tied the major league record for most double plays in a nine-inning game, with nine.

BOSTON (AP) — Jerry Stephenson became the first Boston pitcher to hurl a complete game this season, checking California on nine hits as Red Sox crushed Angels 9-1 Sunday and gained a split of their Sunday doubleheader.

Angels won the opener 6-1 with a three-homer attack. The two teams tied an American League record by pulling off a total of 12 double plays in the twin bill.

The California infield was flawless in working eight double plays in the twinbill. Boston had three in the opener and one in the nightcap. The total tied the league record of 12 set by Philadelphia and Cleveland in 1931, and equaled by Boston and Chicago in 1917, and New York and Kansas City in 1955.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Jim (Mudcat) Grant scattered eight hits and drove in two runs with a double, giving Minnesota Twins a 3-1 victory and a split of their doubleheader with Athletics won the opener 1-0

behind Roland Sheldon's three-hit pitching.

Kansas City had a 4-2 lead in the nightcap until White started the sixth with a homer off Chuck Dobson. Roger Maris followed with a walk, and Lew Krausse replaced Dobson.

NEW YORK (AP) — Roland Sheldon's three-hit pitching and a run-scoring single by Ken Suarez in the sixth inning led Kansas City Athletics to a 1-0 victory over New York Yankees Sunday in the opener of their doubleheader.

Ossie Chavarria scored the game's only run, rapping a double off Whitey Ford with two out in the sixth and coming in on Suarez's single.

DETROIT (AP) — Baltimore Orioles ran their winning streak to 10 Sunday, riding Boog Powell's two-run homer and a two-run single by Brooks Robinson to a 4-1 victory over Detroit.

Steve Barber, with relief help from Dick Hall in the eighth inning, got the victory, the Orioles 12th in 13 games this season.

Powell got Orioles started when he hit his second homer of the year, off Detroit starter Joe Sparras, in the fourth inning. Robinson was on base with a single.

## John Surtees Wins Second

SIRACUSA, Sicily (AP) — John Surtees, the ace British driver who was almost killed in a crash in Canada last year, scored the second straight victory in his comeback Sunday with a record-breaking performance in the Grand Prix of Siracusa.

Surtees led all the way as he drove his Ferrari over the 101-mile course at a speed of 114.8 miles an hour, a record for the race. The previous record was 110.6 m.p.h. by Jim Clark of Scotland last year.

Lorenzo Bandini of Italy, also in a Ferrari, was 24 seconds behind in second.

Surtees, world driving champion in 1964, was severely hurt seven months ago at Mosport, Ont., during a practice run. He posted the first victory in his comeback last week at Monza, Italy.

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## Who Rates 1st In Smythe Race

From a chump to a champ in five seconds. That's the way Ralph Backstrom summed up his winning goal in the jubilant Montreal dressing room following the fourth game in the Stanley Cup series. Backstrom had been previously benched by coach Toe Blake but he did not let any grass grow under his feet when he received his opportunity in the third period. His goal came as a result of a picture passing play that was typical of the Hab attack.

The Montreal strength in centers is starting to show as the experts predicted it would before the series. Big Jean Beliveau tipped in the other Hab marker and Henri Richard, although held scoreless gave the Wings a lot to think about as he stickhandled through them on several occasions and checked closely all the time he was on the ice.

On the other hand Detroit center Norm Ullman continued to star but unhappily the same can not be said for Alex Delvecchio and newcomer Hall did not inspire the linemates to any heights of glory yesterday. Ullman could have knotted the score in the third period when he lifted the disc over a sprawling Worsley but it went over the net. Ullman was a pain in the side of the Habs and especially Worsley all afternoon. He beat the latter with what Worsley called a "change of pace shot" but was robbed a couple of times by both J. C. Tremblay and Worsley.

### WHO'S THE BEST

When speaking of stars one immediately begins to think of candidates for the Conn Smythe Trophy (awarded to the most valuable player in the playoffs) Diminutive Roger Crozier would have been this observers Detroit choice. However the goalie for the Wings injured his leg in a freak accident in the first period and whether he will return to the roster this season is now a big question mark. Crozier's heroics gave the Wings a victory in the second game of the series and he had made six sensational stops in the span of five minutes in which he played.

The Wings were fortunate in having Hank Bassen awaiting his opportunity in the "wings" for he played a magnificent game for them even if it was in a losing cause. However that is not going to make him a candidate for the Conn Smythe trophy.

Norm Ullman and Bill Gadsby have to be the other two prime candidates on the Wing roster for the award. Ullman has been playing terrific hockey on the Red Wing blue line and it seems a shame that a player of his caliber has been denied the privilege of having his name engraved on the Stanley Cup for 20 years. He has indeed been a standout for the Wings and a performance like he has been putting on is bound to inspire the youngsters on the club.

Ullman too has been going through the rigorous pace with honors and is well up among the scoring leaders.

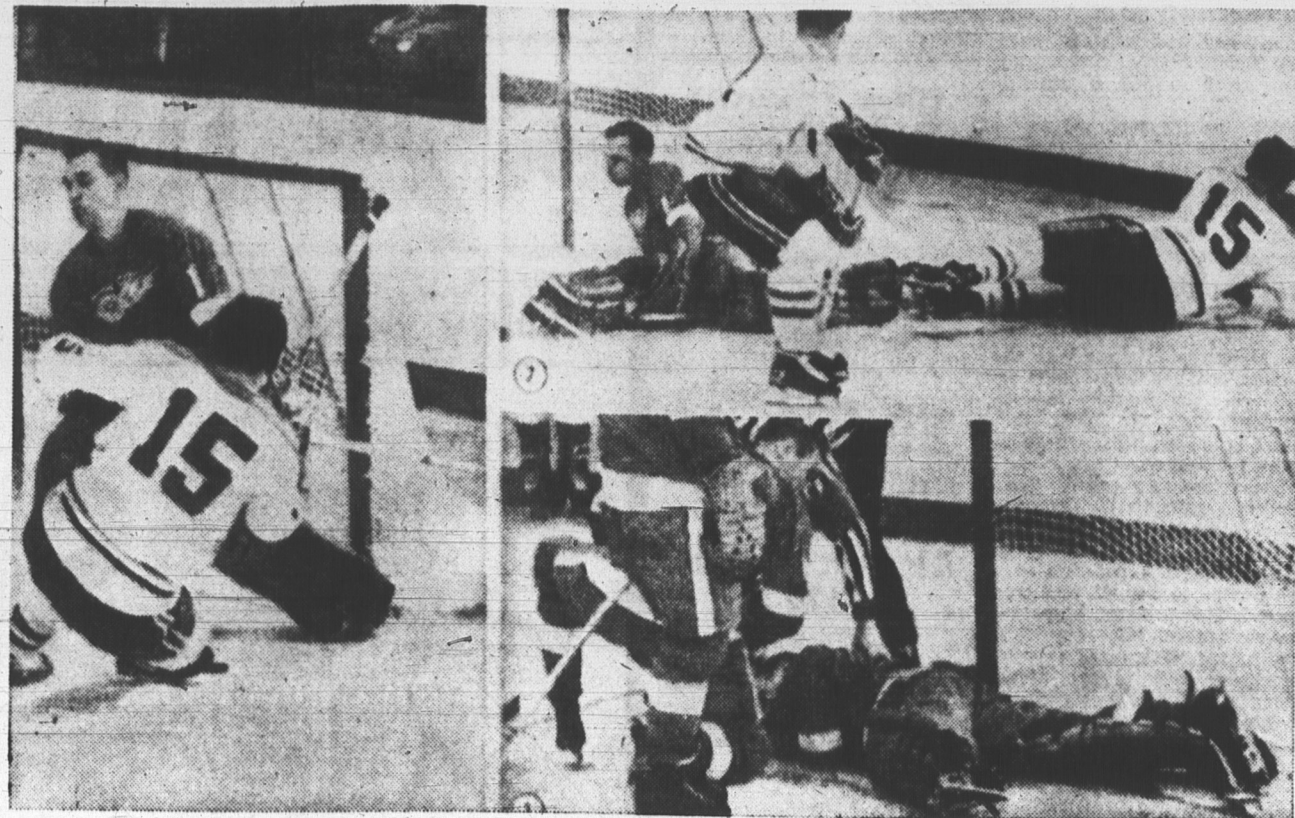
### HABS A PROBLEM

Picking candidates from Montreal poses a bit more of a problem for this observer for as most readers know if I had the final choice in star selections members of the Montreal team would occupy them all.

Nevertheless fans will have to agree that Jean Beliveau, Gump Worsley, Ralph Backstrom and J.C. Tremblay are the leading contenders, with the latter three corners favorite.

Beliveau, just shaking off the effects of the 10 day layoff has got the winning and tying goals in the last two games. JC has played tremendous defense throughout the series and generally when any marksmen slipped past him, Worsley was Johnny on the spot. Backstrom has had his ups and downs in the series but they have been mostly ups so he has to be considered.

The winner of the trophy does not have to be from the winning team but that is a big help to say the least. Having taken two pressure games in Detroit the Habs have to be favored. The closeness of the series can be indicated by the fact that the Wings have only one more goal than Montreal (11) but they have their work cut out for them from now on.

# Montreal Muzzles Wings In Big Comeback Effort

DETROIT (CP) — Centre Ralph Backstrom, used sparingly in the game, came off the bench to score late in the final period and gave Montreal Canadiens a 2-1 victory over Detroit that evened the best-of-seven Stanley Cup final at two games each.

Fifth game of the series will be in Montreal Tuesday at 8 p.m. EDT while the sixth will be in Detroit Thursday at 8 p.m. EST. The seventh game now is scheduled for Montreal Saturday.

Captain Jean Beliveau got the other Montreal counter after Norm Ullman had given Detroit a 1-0 margin. Both came in the second period.

STALLED MOMENTUM  
The loss not only stalled the momentum Detroit built in the first two games, but it was expensive in that goalie Roger Crozier, a series standout, was injured early in the opening period. He is a doubtful starter for the next game and could be through for the season.

Crozier was replaced by veteran Hank Bassen, who was beaten for both goals. On neither shot did he have much chance and he turned in a strong game.

A defensive lapse by winger Bobby Rousseau allowed Bruce MacGregor to set up Ullman in his goal. Gump Worsley in the Montreal net had little chance on the shot that slipped through a maze of players in front of the Montreal net.

Montreal held a wide edge in play, outshooting the Wings 33-23 in the game. Crozier made six saves before being injured, four of them brilliant close-in stops.

Rousseau tried to jam the puck by the right post and slammed into Crozier. The little Red Wing goalie suffered a strained left knee and a sprained ankle.

Coach Toe Blake had used Backstrom only once in each of the first two periods and until the shift that resulted in the winning goal, had not sent him

on the ice in the final 20 minutes.

DETROIT GOT PENALTIES  
Part of the reason was a series of early penalties to Detroit when Blake sent out his power play headed by Beliveau. In between he used a line established for the last game with Henri Richard at centre between Dave Balon and Leon Rochefort.

Several times in the games tempers appeared set to explode. In one outbreak in the second period play was delayed several minutes while officials broke up a wild shoving match. No penalties resulted.

The injury to Crozier marked the first time in two years that a starting netminder was forced to leave because of injuries. In the 1964 semi-final between Detroit and Chicago Black Hawks, Bob Champoux replaced Terry Sawchuk in the Wings' goal and Detroit went on to win the game 5-4.

The game also marked the first time in three games televised by NBC across the United States that Detroit has lost.

Backstrom said after the game "it's strange how you can go from a chump to a champ in five seconds."

He added Duff and Roberts made "a hell of a play to get the puck to me."

COULDN'T FAULT BASSEN  
Blake commented after the game that Bassen could not be faulted for the two goals that beat him. "They would have beaten anybody."

The early penalty-killing chores appeared to take a lot of steam out of Detroit, despite the fact they eventually got the opening goal. The Wings also appeared off their normal sharp passing game and Canadiens at times dominated the game with their forechecking and hustle.

After the scoreless first period, the Wings came out strong and held an edge for the first half—the only time in the game Canadiens appeared to sag.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — San Francisco's Gaylord Perry shut out St. Louis on four singles Sunday as Giants edged Cardinals 2-0 on an unearned run and a homer by Len Gabrielson.

Giants' centre fielder Willie Mays again failed to hit the 512th homer of his career and was forced to leave the game in the fourth inning after a collision with St. Louis first baseman George Kernek.

Mays, who somersaulted over Kernek in the fourth inning, was not seriously hurt but suffered a bruised left knee. The Giants' trainer said the injury was painful but gave no indication if Mays would miss any action.

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Bob Veale pitched a four-hitter and Roberto Clemente rapped four hits as Pittsburgh stopped New York Mets' three-game winning streak 8-0 Sunday.

Veale struck out nine and allowed only four singles, two by Jerry Grote.
