Hon. Mr. Foster on Prohibition.

OPPOSITION papers distorted the speech delivered by the Hon. Mr. Foster at the Prohibition Convention held in Montreal, and then severely criticised Mr. Foster's conduct as to the temperance question.

"1. That it would be a mistake to underrate the difficulties yet in the way of practical prohibition. Those who leave these difficulties out of account, and endeavor to persuade people that prohibition would, in a few weeks or a few months be an accomplished fact, are not, in my opinion, the friends of the cause they advocate."

"2. That there is no other way than the best possible enforcement of prohibitory legislation, has yet to be fought, and will be found a harder struggle than any that has preceded it. That effort which is based upon an all-round survey of the field and an intelligent consideration of just what is to be overcome, and the necessity and best means for overcoming it, is more to be relied upon than any amount of extravagant hopes, incited by appeals to sentiment alone, and warmed by even the most generous enthusiasm."

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The Situation in Quebec.
